Zowie!!!!!!!! Joe Dowie Found

Joe Dowie, outfielder for Baltimore in 1889, has been found by Jay Sanford. For this, Jay captures the July *Find of the Month* award.

At one time it was written that Dowie had been shot in a barroom brawl in the 1890s. Dowie was actually shot in the crossfire of a barroom brawl and a charity game was held to raise money for his injuries. Jay found that the umpire for this game was none other than Joe Dowie himself.

Tom Hufford had done quite a bit of research on Dowie and had suspected that Dowie had died in New Orleans in 1917. Jay made a trip to Louisiana and visited the Louisiana Archives in Baton Rouge. There he found Dowie's birth certificate as well as his death certificate. There was no obituary in the New Orleans papers. Dowie was buried in St. Vincent Cemetery in New Orleans in a plot with his second wife rather than with the rest of the Dowie family. This is one of the reasons Dowie was so difficult to find. Great work!

The Social Security Death Index

Great news! The Social Security Death Index is now accessible via the World Wide Web. I was able to locate several dead ballplayers by searching through it. You can search by any combination of last or first name, partial birth or death dates, place the SSNO was obtained, or last place of residence. This can save us lots of time. The address is:

Can Someone Solve The Riddle?

John Riddle played catcher and outfield for Washington in 1889 and Philadelphia in 1890. Despite a glowing .123 lifetime average, this was the extent of his major league career.

We list him as being born in February of 1864 in Pennsylvania. The 1900 New Jersey census lists a John Riddle that matches our birth information living in Camden with his wife Mary, and children, Harry and Mabel. He had that typical ballplayer occupation, saloon keeper. In the 1920 census, he was still living in Camden with his 37-year-old housekeeper, Nancy Middleton. No other family was mentioned. So far, we have found nothing on him in Camden after that time. This qualifies Mr. Riddle as our July Mystery of the Month.
