The Hunt For Smokey Joe Williams

The following report came from Dick Clark.

The April edition of the Negro Leagues Committee Newsletter asked for any information on an obituary or a different death date for Williams. Jim Riley felt that a date later than the accepted 1946 one was highly possible. Shortly after this the question of where he was buried arose on the SABR-L since folks want to know Hall of Famers' final resting places. The Lincoln Memorial Cemetery was thought to be the place. It is located in Suitland, MD, right outside Washington DC. Bob Davids went there to search for the grave but he was working with the 1946 date of death and was told Williams was not there. In this same time frame Neil Lanctot informed me he believed the death date to be in 1951 and sent an article that said Williams died February 25, 1951. (Article available **1pg.) I relayed this to Bob Davids and he called Lincoln Memorial back with the new date and was told a Joseph Williams was buried there in 1951. Bob was given the exact site of the plot, also. Bob was unable to get back to the cemetery, so Todd Bolton and myself headed there on Monday, August 23rd. after we had attended the Negro Leagues Conference in Atlantic City, NJ. We hoped for the best but didn't get too optimistic. We spent a great deal of time talking to the folks at the Lincoln Memorial Cemetery. They located the journal containing the record of a Joseph Williams burial on March 3, 1951. The death date was the same as the article Neil Lanctot had sent. The journal notated Williams body had come from New York City. Things were looking good, but no birth date or notation of a marker. Finally we were taken to the actual site. Even when the locations are known it can be tough to find a grave. We finally found the site and HALLELUJAH this was it. It said Joseph Williams born April 6, 1886 died February 25, 1951. Our emotions at the moment are hard to describe but I'm sure most of you can imagine. Todd and I conducted an appropriate salute to the new Hall of Famer and took photos (being processed). A great mystery solved. However, an obituary is still needed. Also, many questions are still needed to be answered. How he got to Suitland MD. Who are the Smallwood and Crockett families. These are people also buried in the burial plot. And many more. A big thank you to all, especially Neil and Bob. Perhaps we can get The Hall Of Fame to erect a special marker to Williams at the site. More details later. A Great Day!

For the record, Todd Bolton came up with the following information concerning the Williams' death and grave site. Rollins Funeral Home (202) 399-2388 had the burial The cost of the grave was \$40 and Williams was interred March 3, 1951 in Section D, Lot 543, Site 8 in Lincoln Memorial Cemetery, 4001 Suitland Road, Suitland, Maryland 20746, (301) 568-8410.

The names on the tombstone are: (On front) Frank Smallwood - Dec. 12, 1868-March 23, 1946; Moses I. Crockett-December 12, 1878-June 11, 1955; Joseph Williams - April 6, 1886-Feb 25, 1951. On back appears: Mother: Emma S. Crockett - Sept 20, 1879-April 10, 1959, Resting In God's Care.

Chairman's Comments

The committee wants to address some areas we need to work at. First ALL OF US need to find the burial site for one player per year, at least. Ideally we will want this work to continue until we have a burial site for everyone. The cemeteries are important to know. We must locate these men to see that a grave marker is in place and also verify any birth and death dates. This is related to the second point. We must energize our efforts to find missing biographical data for all players. My mailing address (and E-mail) will be the repository for new information. Jim Riley's biographical encyclopedia is the essential point of reference for seeing what has been done. Many NLC members will be coordinating efforts to exchange their findings these last few years. This is an exchange of information NOT dissemination of info. Finally, we will also be speeding up our research to locate a photo of every player. I have begun this a few years back and shall attempt to get the listing up-to-date. Then I can send out a want list to all to find missing guys.

We must now begin to get all information gathered so we may put forth our candidate to the Veterans Committee (meeting in March). Top people from our recent top 40 voting are Stearnes, Mackey, Redding and Suttles, to name a few. The NLC does not want to wait to see the direction the HOF is taking in election of Negro Leaguers. We want to exert any influence now and perhaps things will break our way.

The following report is from Dick Clark.

A series of four lectures on Negro League baseball was presented at Penn State Downtown Center from June 8 through 17. Presenters included Eric Ledel Smith, Calobe Jackson, Fred Brillhart and Ted Knorr.

The third annual Harrisburg Negro League Commemorative Night was held on June 19 This year s honorees were the 1955 Harrisburg Giants. In addition to the regularly scheduled Harrisburg Senators game with the Senators wearing replica uniforms of the Harrisburg Giants, the following other features were offered: all fans received a Spottswood Poles baseball card with original artwork by noted sports artist Mike Mellet, youth were given Harrisburg Giant baseball caps, Negro League memorabilia and items were on exhibit, and surviving members of the 1955 Harrisburg Giants were in attendance.

The Williamsport Crosscutters held their inaugural Negro League Night on July 17 featuring former player Bernard Fernandez and free Kansas City Monarch caps. Both teams in the regularly scheduled New York-Penn League game wore a selection of replica Negro League uniforms.

The following book reviews come from Dick Clark.

I have recently read two additional books. CATCHING DREAMS: My Life in The Negro Baseball Leagues by Frazier "Slow" Robinson with Paul Bauer is an excellent read. Paul has done a wonderful job capturing Robinson's joyful spirit and determination to play baseball. Frazier's career was quite interesting and I believe everyone will thoroughly enjoy the easy going style that Bauer has used to make Robinson come alive. 230pgs 29 photos, (all personal ones). You should get it.

The other book is AWAY GAMES: The Life and Times of a Latin Ball Player. It follows Miguel Tejada's, currently the Oakland A's shortstop, young life. Also the book covers many aspects of early Black Latins and the inherent problems they encountered through the years. Very likely the best book ever in covering the entire Latin experience and obstacles in making the grade to the majors. 272pp 18 photos. Check it out.

Information on the book THE SANTURCE CRABBERS: SIXTY SEASONS OF PUERTO RICAN WINTER LEAGUE BASEBALL by Thomas E. Van Hyning available. **2pgs. I have read this book and it is both a complete history and an enjoyable read.
