# Marshall Locke Found

It was January 27 and I was bemoaning the fact that I had nothing for a Find of the Month. Then I opened a letter which was forwarded to me from the SABR office and received the biggest shock that I had since I watched Lonnie Smith round the bases once without falling down.

It was a letter from the great-nephew of Marshall Locke, outfielder in seven games for Indianapolis in 1884. He had read an article on SABR in the Cleveland Plain-Dealer and since he had noticed that the encyclopedias had listed no biographical data on Locke, he wrote to tell us his birth and death date and a little story of Locke's life. I knew from the 1900 census that Locke was a songwriter (Essentially all I knew about him) but his great-nephew informed me that Marshall Locke had written the lyrics to the famous song "The Big Rock Candy Mountain." Locke was born and died in Ashland, Ohio but lived most of his life in Indianapolis. He attended Phillips Exeter Academy in New England.

This is an absolutely amazing discovery and it makes a person wonder how many other people are out there wondering why their relative's birth and death isn't listed in the encyclopedia. I'm awarding the Find of the Month to Morris and John in the SABR office for getting that article into the Cleveland Plain-Dealer which prompted the great-nephew's letter. Terrific!

#### The Details, Please

There are two players who have been reported as being deceased for whom we haven't yet been able to find a date and place of death. Both broke into the big leagues in 1969.

Billy Wilson, Phillies pitcher, supposedly died in 1993. He had been living in the Tulsa

area, but Oklahoma does not have a death certificate on file for him. And Juan Rios, Royals infielder, apparently died in 1995 in Puerto Rico. If anyone can find out more information, it would be most helpful.

#### **Presidents**

I was wondering the other day how many ballplayers were named after U.S. presidents. So I did what every dedicated baseball researcher with time on his hands does. I counted them. There are 61. Interestingly, only one player who debuted after 1960 was named after a president. That was Max Venable, who was named after William McKinley.

Far and away the leader is George Washington with 18 namesakes. He is followed by Thomas Jefferson with 7, Andrew Jackson with 5, and Grover Cleveland with 4. Tied with 3 are James Madison, Franklin Pierce, Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S. Grant, Chester Arthur, and William McKinley. (Chester Arthur?) Coming in at 2 are Benjamin Harrison and Woodrow Wilson. Then with one apiece are John Quincy Adams, Martin Van Buren, William Henry Harrison, Calvin Coolidge, and Franklin Roosevelt. Of course, the player named after Calvin Coolidge is the only player named after a US president, a Roman emperor, and an Indian chief, Calvin Coolidge Julius Caesar Tuskahoma McLish. Alas, there has never been a ballplayer named after Millard Fillmore.
