"Barnstormin': The Negro Leagues: 1920 -1960"
Richmond, VA - On Friday, February 3, 2006, the Black History Museum and Cultural Center of Virginia opens the exhibition, Barnstormin': the Negro Leagues: 1920 - 1960.

This exhibition chronicles Negro Baseball Leagues including, the Negro Southern League, the Eastern Colored League, the American Negro League and the Negro National League.

Yvonne Hopkins, guest curator has designed the exhibition to include two hundred - fifty artifacts. Included are autographed photographs, baseballs, bats, and other memorabilia. The title Barnstormin' comes from the term barnstorm.

Throughout history, barns were used occasionally as auditoriums and places for local community groups to gather. Webster's New World Dictionary of American English defines the tern barnstorm: to go about the country performing plays about, giving lectures or

campaign speeches, playing exhibition games, etc., especially in small towns and rural districts.

The National Association of Base Ball Players formed in 1867 banned black athletes. Nevertheless, between 1865 and 1890 a few African Americans broke the color barrier and played alongside White athletes. After 1890, the color barrier would bar all African Americans for the next fifty-five years from the national association. As a result, more than 200 all-black independent teams formed throughout the country.

In 1920, the owner of the Chicago American Giants, Andrew 'Rube' Foster called midwestern team owners to Kansas City for a meeting, forming the Negro National League. Hank Aaron, Willie Mays, Ernie Banks, Satchel Paige, 'Cool Papa' Bell, Josh Gibson, Buck Leonard, and Richmond native and Hall of Famer, Ray Dandridge began their baseball careers in the Negro Leagues. These men paved the road for today's contemporary baseball players while facing the prejudices and injustices of the times.

Barnstormin': the Negro Leagues, 1920 - 1960 will begin on February 3, 2006 with an opening reception for invited guests from 6:00-7:30 p.m. The general pubic may begin viewing at 7:30 p.m. The exhibition will be on display until October 31, 2006 call 804-780-9093 for hours of operation, admission rates, and general inquires.
