Joe Dittmar has discovered another "record-setting" performance that never happened. Mike Kreevich, of the White Sox is listed as a co-holder of the AL, and major-league, record for having grounded into the most double plays in a game. He is supposed to have grounded into four, in a game at Washington, on August 4, 1939. In researching his forthcoming book, Joe found discrepancies in the various newspaper accounts of this game. Some said Kreevich hit into four double plays, and others said three. Thanks to some great detective work by Bill Deane, we now know that Kreevich grounded into only three.

Goose Goslin, of the Tigers, (4-28-34) is now the sole holder of the AL record, and Joe Torre, of the Mets (7-21-75) is the NL record-holder.
