"A Victim of the Line" To Premier AT NLC 2000

After the printed version of the last issue of *The Negro Leagues Courier* had been sent to our printing center in Michigan, it was announced that the play "A Victim of the Line" written by NLC member and editor of *The Negro Leagues Courier* Sammy J. Miller will premier at the NLC conference in Harrisburg, PA this August. A dramatic reading of the historical fiction play, which tells the story of the life and career of Negro League pitcher "Crazy" Tony Williams, will be put on as part of the city's annual Negro League Commemorative Day, which this year, will coincide with the NLC conference.

The production will be a staged reading presented by Penn Owl Productions with founder Dorothy King directing. The staged reading, which will be open to the public, will take place on Saturday, August 5th, at the Carousel Pavillion prior to the Senators games.

Turkey Stearnes Joins Baseball's Elite

In a long overdue move, the Veteraris Committee of the National Baseball Hall of Fame selected Tennessee native and long time Detroit Star Norman "Turkey" Stearnes as it's choice for this year's Negro League inductee. Dick Clark, one of Stearnes' most ardent supports, had the following to say:

"It wouldn't be an overstatement to say I was very pleased to hear of the Veterans Committee's selection of Turkey Stearnes to The Hall of Fame. I received the news simultaneously, by phone, from Larry Hogan and John Holway, minutes after it was announced. Obviously, it made my day...my month.....actually my year. I called the Stearnes family later that evening to pass along the NLC's congratulations. They were ecstatic and greatly relieved that it had finally happened. I spoke with newspaper folks who had left messages and was able to assist in the process of educationg the media and public on the well deserved selection Stearnes was. A wonderful article had appeared the day before in the DETROIT FREE PRESS.

I am planning on attending the induction ceremony in Cooperstown on July 23rd. I hope to see many of you there that weekend. Every selection since Rube Foster to Stearnes this year, has had a ton of input from our committee and devoted individuals. Our hard work has paid off, slower than we would like but accomplished. I will not be retiring from promoting the other worthy candidates. We must continue to push for extension of the special Negro League vote. Biz Mackey, Mule Suttles and more for 2001 and beyond."

Charlie Tiano Joins Heavenly All Stars

Former SABR member and long-time friend of the Negro Leagues Committee Charlie Tiano passed on January 15th in Kingston, NY. He was 87. I met Charlie personally at SABR's National in Albany, NY, in 1989, after several years of letter writing. He was the sports editor of the FREEMAN for over 25 years and a sports writer most of his adult life. We continued to communicate until his death. Charlie was a very good baseball player and often played against barnstorming Black teams featuring the likes of Martin Dihigo, Dick Redding, Joe Williams and more. My favorite Charlie Tiano story is when he played WITH the Black team, unnoticed. Because of an injury to one of the players, Charlie, an Italian with a great tan was recruited because of his ability to play firstbase. No one thought he didn't belong on the team. We'll miss you Charlie.

Jesse Askew of the 1936 St. Louis Stars died on Jan. 4, 2000 in St. Louis Missouri of kidney cancer. He was 85 years old.

Charlie Biot died March 10,2000 in East Orange, New Jersey. Biot played outfield for the Newark Eagles, the New York Black Yankees, the Baltimore Elite Giants and other teams from 1939 to 1941. He was 82 years old.

Sanford Barnes passed away on March 6 in Yakima, Washington. Sanford was a star at Alcorn College in the mid Thirties, and in 1936 he toured with the St. Louis Blues, an all star team comprised primarily of players from the Piney Woods School, Piney Woods Mississippi. The Blues became the Washington Browns in '37 and played out of Yakima in '37 and '38. Willie Foster was the manager of that team in late '38.

Olympian Mack Robinson, Jackie's brother, passed away on March 12 in Pasadena, California. Mack had been bedridden since suffering a stroke in 1990 on Christmas day. He was 88 years old.

"Thought you might like to know that the Ohio History website with the Cleveland Gazette articles mentioned in the last newsletter is linked to American Memory, a searchable site run by the Library of Congress which is a giant repository of written material, photos, maps, etc., on American history.

By going to the American Memory page (http:memory.loc.gov/ammem/amhome.html) you can click on "search" to get the site's search engine. Entering the search terms "Sol White" and specifying "Match all of these word" and "Match words exactly" will produce a list of 15 Sol White columns from the gazette in the year 1919. Fun reading. I have prints of the columns and will send them to anyone who asks who isn't able to search them out on the web."

The Negro League section is three chapters, pages 43-90 which cover The Negro Leagues All-Star Team 1900-1925 and then 1926-1950, Another chapter is The all-time Negro League All-Star Team and the Negro Leagues Hall of Fame. At least eight of the numberous tables are related to the Negro Leagues. It is a McFarland Publication and the cost is \$29.95 retail and \$33.95 post paid and can be ordered at your local bookstore or any of the major on line bookstores. The book has 240 pages, 27 tables, and 86 photos. Highly recommended.

Recent Events

Max Manning was inducted into the New Jersey Sports Writers hall of fame at the annual dinner at Pines Manor in Edison, New Jersey on Feb. 6, of this year. Our congratualtions to Mr. Manning.

On March 8, Mamie "Peanuts" Johnson spoke as part of the Race and Gender Speaker Series at Miami (OH) University. *The Negro Leagues Courier's* roving reporter Rich Gibson was on the scene and submitted this report.

Oxford, Ohio - As a part of the Race and Gender Speaker Series, Mamie "Peanut" Johnson spoke at Miami University's College of Arts & Sciences, Departments of Black World and Women's Studies. Ms. Johnson, one of three women to play in the Negro Baseball Leagues, discussed her experiences within professional men's sports.

Ms. Johnson was a 105 pound right-handed pitcher who was taught to throw a curveball by Hall of Fame Pitcher, Leroy "Satchel" Paige, and played two of her three professional seasons (1953? 1955) with Henry "Hank" Aaron for the Indianapolis Clowns. Her small size led to her being nicknamed "Peanut." When not pitching, she

spent some time playing second base. During her three years, she collected a 33 - 8 record and maintained batting averages of .262 to .284.

During her talk, Ms. Johnson spent a brief amount of time discussing the path that led her into playing baseball on a men's team. She recalled being refused a tryout for a white, women's team from Alexandria, Virginia because "my skin was a different color." She went on, "I'm glad they turned me down. Otherwise, I would have been just another woman who played woman's baseball." She also showed the audience a short excerpt from a showed called P.S., that discussed her career and life after baseball. Following the video, she fielded questions from the enthusiastic audience.

A groundbreaker in other areas as well, Ms. Johnson had studied medicine and engineering at New York University before joining the Clowns. After retiring from baseball, she worked nearly 30 years as a licensed practical nurse. She currently travels most of the time making autograph and speaking appearances. When home, she works at the Negro Leagues Baseball Shop in Bowie, Maryland.

"Beisbol Behind the Veil: Latin Americans in the Negro Leagues opened Sunday, March 19th in Perth Amboy, NJ. The opening ceremony was at 1:00 PM. The Mayor's staff at Perth Amboy took Armando, Felix, my lovely wife Judy and me out for a wonderful dinner and an evening of bar hopping in Latino bars and clubs (Perth Amboy is 70% Hispanic) on Saturday evening. Armando was cutting the carpet at every stop! All in all, a very nice weekend.

The exhibit runs through April 30 at the Naval Reserve Center, Front Street, Perth Amboy, NJ.
