Larry Lester, Lloyd Johnson, Eric Newland, Jim Riley, and veterans Bill Cash and Monte Irvin were NLC members in attendance in Kansas City, October 27-29, 1995 for The 75th Anniversary Celebration of The Negro Baseball Leagues. Around 240 veterans attended the event which included press conferences, VIP receptions, "The Soul of Baseball" gala dinner, visits to the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum and a card and autograph show. NLBM President Randell Ferguson announced that the museum would move in April, 1997 to new quarters across the street from the present location at 18th and Vine. The reunion was a grand occasion which was poorly handled by the NLBM current leadership. Very poor public relations, high prices for events (because of no corporate sponsership) left many fans confused and dismayed. always, the players made the event special with hundreds of interviews, thousands of stories and millions of memories. I'm sorry I couldn't make it. Perhaps a change in direction will revive the goals and dreams of the NLBM before it's too late.
