Joe Lee has provived us a recap on the conference BREAKING BASEBALL'S COLOR LINE: JACKIE ROBINSON & FIFTY YEARS OF INTEGRATION 1946-1996, held in Daytona Beach, Florida, March 15-17, 1996. The BEFORE YOU CAN SAY JACKIE ROBINSON: BLACK BASEBALL IN AMERICA IN THE ERA OF THE COLOR LINE, 1885-1950, Larry Hogan's exhibit was instrumental to the success of the event and improves with each showing. Jules Tygiel's meticulous observations on society's state fifty years after the integration of professional baseball ignited a brief response from Joe Black. Mr. Tygiel's assessment was based on extensive personal research. Bill Schuman, a local historian produced and showed his video on Daytona's role in the Robinson story. Schuman and the local newspaper collaborated on a complement to Larry Hogan's exhibit. It featured the activities of the Negro Leagues in Florida. It was impossible to keep up with all the presentations on Friday and Saturday. Highlights for Joe were presentations by Arnold Rampersad and Jonathan Mercantini. There was also a round table discussion with Joe Black talking about being Jackie's rookie roommate. Black had a serious message related to his work with the Jackie Robinson Foundation. He did not hesitiate to name the players who contribute substantally nor fail to mention those who don't. Sharon Richardson Jones related her story from little girl in awe of some hero she did not fully comprehend to becoming an executive with the Oakland A's. Ed Charles drove several folks over to his old neighborhood to show people his house and the Kelly Field where he watched Jackie and his Montreal teammates work out in 1946. Charles crossed town to perch on the left field fence to see the famous game between Brooklyn and Montreal. On Sunday Mrs. Robinson dedicated a memorial plaque to honor the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Brooklyn-Montreal game and posed with admirers as families took endless pictures.

We have reviews of NICE GUYS FINISH FIRST by Monte Irvin and Jim Riley. BASEBALL AMERICA April 15-28, 1996 **1pg "Irvin biography covers many topics." PUBLISHER'S WEEKLY **1pg. NEW YORK POST, **1pg. KIRRUS REVIEW **1pg. Jim also had book signings in Merritt Island, Florida and Wilmington, Delaware and was on TV, the SUNDAY EDITION show and FOCUS programs in Melbourne, FL.

After reading NICE GUYS FINISH FIRST, Jim Passannante did a little research on Monte's javelin record. Monte Irvin held the All New Jersey High School Record of 192 feet in 1937 (with a wooden javelin). The record lasted for 7 years. Jim truly believes Monte could have made the 1936 Olympic Team if he had tried out and I wholeheartedly agree.

"Buyer Beware" if you purchase any "fiction" done by Ribowsky. We have a review from BASEBALL AMERICA, "Biography sheds little light on Gibson The Man". This was done by someone unfamiliar with the Negro Leagues. **1pg. PITTSBURGH POST-GAZETTE 4/14/96, Rob Ruck's review of THE POWER AND THE DARKNESS, **2pp. A scholarly thoughtful review by someone who knows Gibson. Ruck tells it as one should; the book is trash. Another review **1pg from MINNEAPOLIS STAR-TRIBUNE, 5/5/96, "Lack of data harms biography of great black ballplayer."

Bob Hoie recently checked out of the library Ribowsky's HISTORY OF THE NEGRO LEAGUES (a most misleading title). Bob said he was able to learn the following: The 1883 American Association had 13 clubs (not 8). Bud Fowler played with Birmingham in 1887 (not Binghamton). Fans were "gorging on hot dogs" in 1889 (years before they were invented). Chief Bender was signed by John McGraw in 1903 (not Connie Mack). Grover Cleveland Alexander was the ace of the Philadelphia Athletics. The NEW YORK AGE was a white paper, the OAKLAND TRIBUNE was a black paper. Jackie Robinson was an All-American football player at the University of Southern California (not All-Conference at UCLA). There was a car called the "Pierce Arrow Cadillac". Nashua was a Dodger Class AA farm (New England League was Class B). Hank Aaron went from the Indianapolis Clowns to Jacksonville in late June 1953 (who was that imposter with Eau Claire in 1952 and how did Hank get into 137 games with Jacksonville). Sportswriters (not the fans) picked the 1933 (White) Major League All-Star teams (how did Al Simmons get 346,000 votes?) Another highlight for Bob were quotes from Rogers Hornsby after Rube Foster faced the Cardinals in a 1910 exhibition game (it's not clear whether Hornsby was a player or spectator since he was only 14 years old). Bob Hoie closed by saying "I'm sure the same cutting edge research, scholarly attention to detail and informed analysis and commentary will characterize Ribowsky's book on Josh Gibson."
