Help on a Minor Leaguer

Bob McConnell is looking for further biographical information on a minor leaguer by the name of Daniel F. Cronin. Bob writes:

Cronin died in Manchester, New Hampshire on May 5, 1896. According to his obituary, he was 28 years old and he was born in Manchester. The New Hampshire Bureau of Vital Records has no record of a Daniel Cronin being born in Manchester during this time period.

Cronin's main claim to fame was a four home run game on May 31, 1892 against Salem while playing for Pawtucket in a New England League game. Cronin played in 48 games for Pawtucket that season and, oddly, he did not hit any other homers.

Cronin is first known to have played semi-proball in Keene, New Hampshire in 1888. He

played in Bellows Falls, Vermont in 1889. In 1890, he played in Dover, New Hampshire and Lawrence, Massachusetts - still semi-pro ball. He played for Manchester in the New England League in 1891. There is no known playing record for him after 1892. Cronin was a first baseman and probably batted right-handed. A player named Daniel T. Cronin played in the majors in 1884. However, he died in 1885, so he is obviously a different player.

Bob needs Cronin's middle name, date of birth, confirmation of place of birth, confirmation of bats and throws. Also, teams played for after 1892.

The Wrong Guy

The John Henry Murphy from Fitchburg, Massachusetts that we listed a few months ago turns out to be the wrong guy. While he was a ballplayer, he is not the Murphy who played with Altoona in 1884. The Fitchburg Murphy was playing with a local Fitchburg semi-pro team throughout 1884. The Altoona Murphy was from Philadelphia and pitched for the semi-pro Flowers of Philadelphia in 1883. (Was Pete Rose on that team?) Thanks to Bob Richardson for researching this.

A Player I'm Sure You Never Heard Of

It is always rather interesting to learn a little about the life of an obscure on-game major leaguer. Pete Cava learned the following about 1886 Louisville first baseman Jack Heinzman:

At the end of the 1886 Southern League season, Jack Heinzman returned to Louisville, where he hooked up with the J.A. Etheridge team, a semi-pro outfit. On October 1 in Louisville, the Etheridge squad played an exhibition game with the Louisville Colonels of the American Association. With Heinzman playing first base, Etheridge beat the Colonels 9-6. The Louisville Courier-Journal zinged the

Louisville players for losing to an "amateur" team.

The next day the Colonels played the Baltimore Orioles in a regular season game. Heinzman was in the Colonels' lineup, but with no explanation provided. The Courier-Journal mentions frigid temperatures, so maybe John Kerins - the Colonels' regular first baseman - opted to sit out the meaningless contest. Heinzman went 0-for-5 in a 7-3 Louisville triumph.

It would be Heinzman's only big league appearance. He played in the minors through 1889, then returned to Louisville where he played and managed at the semi-pro level. He eventually became the station keeper for Louisville's central police station. Heinzman was very popular with newspaper reporters, who were always able to get good leads from him. He served as treasurer for the police union for a couple of years. In February 1914 Heinzman suffered three broken ribs in a fall. These injuries led to heart disease, which eventually claimed his life that October. Heinzman's father was something of a legend in Louisville. The elder Heinzman, also named John, was one of the pioneers of organized baseball in the city and had once been a teammate of Pete Browning, the old Louisville slugger.

The First Firth

Bob Richardson also has a question about 1884 Richmond pitcher Ted Firth. We list him as dying April 18, 1885 in Marshalltown, Iowa, apparently the victim of a shooting. There was also a John E. Firth who died June 23, 1902 in Tewksbury, Massachusetts. He was originally from Lowell, Massachusetts and was playing in the late 1880s. Are we sure we have the right guy? Hopefully, someone will research this and come forth with the right Firth.

Frank Burt

Frank Burt played ten games in the outfield for the 1882 Baltimore(AA) club compiling a nifty .111 batting average. We list him as being born in Camden, New Jersey and he is among the missing.

Debbi Dagavarian-Bonar found a possible candidate in a Franklin Burt who was born June 4, 1859 in Cumberland County, New Jersey. His father's name was Daniel. I found another possibility in the 1880 New Jersey census. It lists an Edward Burt (56) and Lucy Burt (49) with their children, Bell (26), Frank H. (24), Eddie (13), May (12), and Clifford (9). Edward was a book binder, Bell was a book sewer, and Frank was a machinist. (You'd think he'd be a book maker.)

The 1900 Camden census shows Frank (05/1860) living at 834 Broadway with his wife Ella (07/1861) and son Frank (05/1886). Frank was an oil cloth printer and he and Ella had been married 20 years. In 1920, all three lived at 1818 S. 7th Street in Camden. Frank's age is given as 64. With these clues, it should be no problem to track down Burt, our December Mystery of the Month.
