It was a pleasure to meet for the first time with Bill Beverly, Clint Jones, Tommy Sampson, Rufus Lewis, and Ron Teasley. To again be able to spend time with friends, Leon Day, Wilmer Fields, and Max Manning was a special treat. We also had a chance to get together with a host of local veterans including Cecil Kaiser, Harold Gordon, Ted Rasberry, and Rooster Smith. NLC member Bob Retort was in attendance, helping with the event and meeting new players.

As the players exchanged pleasantries with each other and renewed friendships I was able to meet new folks and help a little in directing everyone to the proper location for signing the multitude of mailed in items.

Here Leon, Morris, and I answered questions and promoted the NLC book (we had unedited proofs with us). The kids were sincerely interested in hearing of Leon's career and had many good questions. After lunch Morris and I recorded an interview for the Allen Davis Show on the All-Sports Radio in Cleveland. At 6:00 PM Glenn Shumate gave us a tour of the wonderful Jacobs Field. I got to hang out on the field and in the dugout and make Indian players wonder "who this guy was". Leon was involved in the pregame ceremony in which Albert Belle presented Leon with his personal check to SABR to cover the costs of giving each Negro League Veteran a free copy of THE NEGRO LEAGUES BOOK.
