A new owner of the title oldest living Negro Leaguer has been found and come to find out, he should have held the title for sometime. A former member of the New York Lincoln Giants and the New York Cubans, Silas "Si" Simmons was attending elementary school when Ted "Double Duty" Radcliffe, once thought the oldest living Negro Leaguer, was born.

A five foot ten inch, 165 pound left handed pitcher and hitter, Simmons was born in Philadelphia on October 14, 1895 and currently resides in a nursing home in St. Petersburg, Florida.

The birth date is NOT a typo. Mr. Simmons is 110 years old.
