The Hand That Rocks The Crable

Our November *Mystery of the Month* comes from the files of Bill Haber.

George Crable pitched in two games for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1910. George was born in December of 1885 in Shelton, Nebraska, the son of David Perry Crable and Rosa L. (Faddis) Crable. He also had a brother, Louis. David Perry Crable died August 18, 1902 in Shelton. George married a lady named Musette (maiden name unknown) in 1907. Musette was born in Iowa.

In 1908, George Crable began his professional baseball career in the Texas League, playing with Austin, Waco, and Galveston. He continued with Galveston in 1909-10 until he was called up by the Dodgers. In 1911, he played with Atlanta and Savannah and in 1912, he was with Fort Worth and San Antonio. In 1913 he was apparently out of baseball. 1914-15 saw him in San Antonio before going to Shreveport the latter part of 1915. In 1916, he was with Hopewell in the Virginia League. In 1917 he was out of baseball again and then closed out his career in 1918 with Toronto of the International League.

After his baseball career ended, Crable became a vaudeville performer, appearing in a quartet called the "Baseball Four, Real Ballplayers in a Delightful Number." Other members of the act included former Detroit pitcher Frank Browning, Tom Dillon, a former player with Macon, and Billy Gleason, who had

played with Galveston.

At this point, the trail of Crable vanishes in a puff of smoke. Crable's mother died in Council Bluffs, Iowa December 2, 1938. Her obituary states, "...Two sons were born to this union, L. R. Crable, who lives in Fremont, Nebraska, and George Crable whose present address is unknown to relatives." Louis Crable died in Fremont September 6, 1958. His obituary makes no mention of George.

It seems that there are a couple of leads we could pursue. One would be to locate Musette Crable in the 1920 census. George was in the census in Oklahoma City, where he was performing at the time. He was listed as "married" but Musette was not with him.

The other possibility would be to trace the careers of the other members of the "Baseball Four." Browning died in San Antonio May 19, 1948. I do not know what happened to Dillon and Gleason. I do know they did NOT go on to Gunsmoke and The Honeymooners. Anybody want to jump into this?
