The third annual meeting of the Pictorial History Committee was held on Saturday, June 21st, at the SABR convention in Louisville. Topics of discussion included: a reminder for PHC members to turn in the form from the previous PHC Newsletter (March 1997); the status of the Player Image Index project and the superb minor league, semipro, and college ball research that Marc Okkonen has done to aid researchers working on the project; possible uses for the PII project in the distant future; the SABR photo collection from the Minneapolis Public Library. Francis Kinlaw spoke about the status of his Ballparks in the Movies project. His list of ballparks seen on the silver screen has grown considerably (see the "Articles and Research Available" column on p. 2 of this newsletter). Greg Rhodes had a wonderful idea for a project: we should attempt to collect notes on and locations of archives throughout the country which contain baseball-related photos. Many local historical societies, museums, and libraries have great photos hidden away. It would be very helpful to organize an annotated list of these collections. Is anyone interested in heading up the project? If so, contact the PHC chair.

THE BASEBALL PICTORIAL HISTORIAN'S LIBRARY **ADDENDUM**

A few more suggestions have come in for the bibliography of books most useful to the researcher of baseball's pictorial history. These additions are noted below.

A number of people have suggested the addition of Speed Johnson's Who's Who in Baseball series, as well as The Sporting News' Baseball Registers, various baseball guides, etc. Of course, all of these are great sources and are integral for the baseball pictorial historian's library. However, they were not included in the original list because I considered them to be readily available reference sources, a category I chose to exclude for purposes of brevity.

Tom Cline points out that Donald Honig authored a pictorial on the Boston Red Sox that predates the one previously noted. The earlier version is The Boston Red Sox: An Illustrated Tribute and was published in 1984 by St. Martin's Press.

Bill Loughman suggests the inclusion of David Phillips' That Old Ball Game (1975) as well as a series of book published by Jordan & Company from 1976-1981 about the Dodgers, Pirates, Reds, and Phillies.

Stephen Milman would like to add Bert Sugar's Baseball Picture Quiz Book (1980).

Bob Littlejohn notes two publications that are overloaded with player pictures: Baseball Photo and Autograph Album (published yearly from 1960-63) and Old Timer's Baseball Photo Album (pubished in 1961, '63, '66, and '71). Both series were published by JKW Sports Publications, Inc., Bronx, New York.

Another great resource is a pamphlet researched and compiled by John Spalding entitled Minor League Team Photos in Baseball Guides. The pamphlet contains no photos, but is a complete index of which minor league teams are pictured in what guides. See the "Articles and Research Available" column below for information on how to order this pamphlet.

Finally, David Icenogle's picture indexes for two pictorial issues of SABR's The National Pastime are super resources. See page 6 of this newsletter for more information.

ARTICLES AND RESEARCH AVAILABLE


Francis Kinlaw continues to make great progress in the Ballparks in the Movies project. The latest compilation lists nearly 100 different movies and television episodes featuring major or minor league ballparks, and gives titles, production dates, ballpark info, etc. For a copy of this 13 page list send along a 78¢ SASE to the PHC chair. As noted above, John Spalding has compiled a complete list of all minor league team photos that are found in baseball guides (TSN, Barnes, Commissioner's, Reach, Spalding, and Spalding Record Books). The index is absolutely invaluable for the baseball photo researcher. Note that the index does not include citations of major league team photos, player portraits, etc. Only minor league team photos are listed. (A great project would be to add major league team photos and/or other team photos. Anyone want to volunteer for this?) gleaned from the rather bland uniform. Note that the batter uses a hands-apart grip on the bat. The less-than-ideal reproduction above is due to the poor quality of the original. The inset is an enhanced enlargement of the player's head.

The image at right, an enlarged portion of a wonderfully clear cabinet card, was sent in by Jon Speed. The original card is $8^1/2^{\circ} \times 6^{\circ}$, with the photo measuring $5^1/2^{\circ} \times 4^{\circ}$. The player pictured is unknown, though a clue may come from the photographer's stamp which reads:

Freeman Norfolk, Virginia

Since the player's jacket is decorated with an ornate "N," it is possible that the fellow played with a Norfolk club. According to Peter Filichia's book *Professional Baseball Franchises*, Norfolk fielded the following minor league clubs during the era of the photo:

Year(s)	Club name	League
1885	Norfolk	Eastern League
1885-86	Norfolk Clams	Va. League
1894	Norfolk Oystermen	Va. League
1897-98	Norfolk Jewels?	Atlantic League
1900	Norfolk Mary Janes	Va. League
1901	Norfolk Skippers	VaN.C. League



Of course, there's no guarantee this fellow was a member of a Norfolk club, or even a professional organization. One more clue: it appears as if the fellow's right shoe has a toe plate, suggesting that he may have been a pitcher.



Shawn Murray sent in the above picture of three White Sox players (left to right: Mule Haas, Jimmy Dykes, and Al Simmons) and an unidentified man dressed in street clothes. The photo was taken by Shawn's grandfather, photographer Bruce Murray, and was probably shot at Shibe Park. The trio of White Sox were purchased from the Athletics at the end of the '32 season for \$100,000 and had played together in Chicago from 1933-35. So who is the fellow second from left?

THE SABR-OTTOSON PHOTO ARCHIVE

Last year the Minneapolis Public Library donated a large collection of photos and newspaper clippings to SABR. The collection contains baseball-related material from various defunct Minneapolis newspapers. There are approximately six to seven thousand photos and perhaps four to five times as many clippings in the collection. Photos date from the early 1900s to the early '50s, though most of the photos are from the '20s through '40s. The photos are currently being cataloged by the PHC chair.

At the June 23rd SABR Executive Board meeting in Louisville, it was unanimously decided that the collection officially be named the SABR-Ottoson Photo Archive and the SABR-Ottoson Clipping Archive. These names were chosen to honor the late Ken Ottoson, a longtime SABR member from Minneapolis who, along with Ted Hathaway, was instrumental in SABR's acquisition of the collection.
