NEGRO LEAGUERS AND THE HALL OF FAME

The new system worked this year as the Veterans Committee heeded the words of Monte Irvin and Buck O'Neil along with the hundreds of people who wrote to support the selection of Leon Day to The Hall of Fame. Leon's death only emphasizes to us all that time is running out to honor these men in their lifetime.

We have the ** 1pg press release of 1-25-95, which covers the rules amendment. Also, a ** 1pg list of Negro League Veterans in The National Baseball Hall of Fame. There are now 17 players who played in the Negro Leagues in the Hall (12 from Veterans Committee elections.)

We must continue to go forward as leaders in Negro Leagues education. The NLC will present a unified front for upcoming elections. We will vote for our choices for election to the Hall of Fame. Everyone reading this newsletter can vote. All SABR Board members and SABR committee chairs are welcomed to cast their votes but not required to. I EXPECT everyone else to pass along their voting order right away. We should have complete results by the June Newsletter. Only 13 names can be voted on. When the original Negro League advisory committee was begun in the '70's 25 names were put on a list for consideration by the Veterans Committee. Although there are numberous reasons to argue about the make up of the list and the absence of many Hall of Fame players and executives, this is the list the Veterans Committee have worked with all this time. Please rank these men 1 thru 13 (the other 12 people are in The Hall). If you have additional

choices you may list them and pass along any supporting rationale or writings. For the time being however, the NLC will only back the top vote getters in the survey. Remember, members of this committee are required to vote. The players in alphabetical order are CHET BREWER, RAY BROWN, WILL! FOSTER, SAMMY T. We close with the remarks made by Todd Bolton at the funeral service for Leon. We are most appreciative of Todd for allowing us to use them.

He was a devoted family man who adored his wonderful family. He was loyal and true to his friends and always left you with a smile. And he loved that game of baseball. It was as a very young boy he decided he wanted to be a baseball player. He followed that dream and the dream came true. Not only did he become a baseball player but he became an exceptional baseball player. He became one of the alltime greats of the game. His peers have always known of his greatness. But unfortunately, others have been slow to learn. It was truly a blessing that last Tuesday, Leon was finally able to smell the roses, when he was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame. But it was a great tragedy that they waited so long. But even during the years that Leon was denied recognition, he was never angry, he was never bitter. Because along with being an outstanding athlete, Leon Day was an outstanding man. Anger and bitterness was never a part of this man. Leon Day was a quiet, kind, generous, and humble man. He had his own special charm and his own special wit and humor that we will always remember. That was Leon Day. He touched us all in a very special way and we will surely miss him.
