NATIONAL ASSOCIATION BOX SCORES - SABR is currently negotiating with member Michael Stagno for the purchase of his collection of National Association box scores. This collection covers better than 9% of all NA games from 1871-1875 and would offer a tremendous wealth of information to members. Lloyd Johnson also sees it as an opportunity to test out various methods of converting box scores into statistics.

The final decision on the purchase will be made by the Executive Board at its next meeting, September 19th. If you feel that SABR should have this collection, please contact the officers and directors as soon as possible to let them know.

If you might be interested in a major research project to extract stats from these box scores, please indicate that on the questionnaire.

RULES CIRCA 1860 - Richard Arpi of Columbus, Ohio, plays 1850's baseball with the Ohio Village Muffins (as featured in Sports Illustrated last April 27th). One rule they use is the "Commit", i.e., if a runner passes a base more than six feet, he is committed to try for the next base, and the defense can put him out merely by holding the ball on that base (like a force out). Rich is skeptical as to the authenticity of this rule, at least after 1848, and is wondering if any fellow 19th century committee member can help him confirm his suspicions or document the rule. 1880's BASEBALL - The St. Louis SABR Chapter recently staged a demonstration of baseball by 1887 rules before a crowd of nearly 200. The three-inning game was put on in conjunction with a SABR exhibit on baseball history at the Webster Groves Historical Society.

Bob Bluthardt is among a group that regularly plays 1880's baseball on the grounds of the Fort Concho Museum, San Angelo, Texas, where Bob works.

MANAGERIAL RECORDS - Richard Topp of the Biographical Committee is currently working on corrections for the next edition of The Baseball Encyclopedia by MacMillan. In addition to thousands of changes in biographical data, he will submit a greatly revised list of won-lost records for managers. Much of the work has been completed, but questions still remain concerning many 19th century managers. Anyone interested in assisting in the research in the next month or two, please indicate that on your questionnaire.

ATTENDANCE - Executive Director Lloyd Johnson gets numerous inquiries about attendance prior to 1900. He urges our committee to research that subject. anyone already having data or wiling to research 19th century attendance should please indicate that on their questionnaire.

Thank you for your letter and update of the 19th Century Committee activities.

The Minor League Committee, of which I am Chairman, has also begun a newsletter. Will add you to the mailing list.

A few comments:

In the interest of making as complete and accurate as possible, any stats compiled, may I suggest that the boxscores pitching material be listed in columns; and that even estimated attendance figures from news accounts of the game be included.

I am particularly interested in attendance figures and wouldn't mind seeing a team game-by-game listing along the format of material found in many of the contemporary major league club media guides. Considering there were many exhibition games played a column noting "official" games and "exhibition" games would go a long way in clarifying this issue. Home or ballpark game was played in would heap, too. A possible format might look like this:

DATE S ROAD at HOME S TYPE ATTENDANCE BOXSCORE/DATA LOCATIONS Aug 9 4 St.L @ Chi 5 D 4,000E Chi&StL papers with box S is for score of game and Type is for doubleheaders (1,2).

Anyway it is a suggestion .

Between SABR Board membering and chairing the Minor League Committee, I am afraid I wouldn't be able to offer you much in the way of actual research. However, do wish to be kept on mailing list andkept up to date. Vern Luse, the SABR expert on pre 1900 minor league material has plenty of material here. I've some, too, and see as a project a list or year-by-year leagues and cities and what material is available.
