## SAM THOMPSON AND THE 1885 DETROIT WOLVERINES

Hall of Famer Sam Thompson played 1,407 games in his big league career. The encyclopedias have always shown him with 1,405 games as an outfielder, one as a first baseman, and one as a third baseman. The one at third base was on August 27, 1885, Thompson's rookie season. The game was in Chicago, and Thompson scored the only run in Detroit's 1-0 victory.

But David J. Thompson, a SABR member and Sam's great nephew, wasn't convinced. Based on a story he'd read in the *Detroit Free Press* more than twenty years ago, David believed that Sam had played his usual spot in right field that day. The story, which ran on August 29, 1885, two days after the game, said:

The wires made a sad mess of the Detroit-Chicago game Thursday. They made Thompson play third base, whereas right field is his position. Bennett was reported in right field when left field was his place. McQuery and Donnelly were stationed in left field and first base respectively; yet McQuery played first base and Donnelly third. McQuery was credited with one putout when he should have had eight, and Donnelly was credited with thirteen when he made only three. McGuire was given but nine, when he made 12.

As indicated, the game story and box score in the *Detroit Free Press* (and also in the *New York Times*) were from wire service reports. Dave found that the hometown *Chicago Daily Tribune* had all the Detroit players at their normal positions, including Sam Thompson in right field. He then checked each of Thompson's 62 other games in 1885 to make sure he hadn't played third base in any of them. Not surprisingly, he hadn't. Also: Mox McQuery is credited with 68 games at first base in 1885 and 416 at first in his career. The one game he is credited with as an outfielder in 1885 is the only one of his career. This seemingly should be changed to all 417 in the outfield. Jim Donnelly is shown with two games in the outfield in 1885, so further study is needed on him.

We salute David for his persistence; as I said, this discrepancy has been bothering him for more than twenty years.

#### CUTTING HARVEY KUENN'S 1952 RUNS SCORED TOTAL IN HALF

Dixie Tourangeau discovered this error while working on a Harvey Kuenn feature for the 2000 version of his always informative "Play Ball" calendar. Kuenn, who would be the AL. Rookie of the Year in 1953, played 19 games for the Tigers in September 1952. Dixie noticed that while the encyclopedias show Kuenn with two runs scored for 1952, a list in the Detroit News credited him with only one. A check of the day-by-days by Scot Mondore at the Hall of Fame showed Kuenn with a run scored in Detroit's home game against Boston on September 11. It also showed no runs scored by the Tigers' Fred Hatfield in that game. At Dixie's request, I checked the Detroit Free Press, Boston Globe, and Boston Herald. All showed Hatfield scoring a run, and Kuenn scoring no runs. In fact, the Free Press describes Hatfield's run as the winning run. So drop Kuenn's lifetime Run total from 951 to 950. which courtesy of information supplied by Sean Lahman, drops him from 290th on the all-time list, where he stood alone, into a tie with Elmer Flick and Rick Monday, Hatfield goes from 48 runs in 1952 to 49, and from 258 lifetime to 259,

## DICK COFFMAN'S 1932 SHUTOUT WAS FOR BROWNS, NOT SENATORS

Pitcher Dick Coffman began the 1932 season with the St. Louis Browns. He had a 5-3 record when the Browns traded him to Washington on June 9. Coffman then went 1-6 for the Senators to finish the season with six wins and nine losses. Among his six wins was one shutout, correctly shown in the encyclopedias. However, Coffman is listed as having thrown the shutout for Washington, when he actually threw it for St. Louis. Walt Wilson sent along the article from the April 18, 1932 New York Times describing Coffman's previous day's 1-0 blanking of the Tigers at Detroit.

Benito Santiago, Jerome Walton, and Nomar Garciaparra had their streaks in their rookie seasons.


### HIGHEST BATTING NUMBERS FOR NON HALL OF FAMERS



#### CORRECTIONS TO TSN COMPLETE BASEBALL RECORD BOOK

The Sporting News 1999 Complete Baseball Record Book is out, and as usual is a joy to possess. Another great effort by Craig Carter and his staff, but, according to the indomitable Retro-researcher Greg Beston, not without the need for some additional data. While doing his research for Retrosheet, Greg found the following.

- 1. On page 10, the CBRB shows the National League record for Most first basemen used by both clubs, Game as five, accomplished five times, most recently in 1968. Greg found a sixth occurence. In the San Diego at Houston game of September 7, 1974, the Padres used Mike Ivie and Randy Elliott at first base, while the Astros used Cliff Johnson, Dave Campbell, and Lee May.
- 2. On page 21, the CBRB shows the National League record for Most doubles by pinch-hitter, three consecutive games as three, held by Brooklyn's Bert Haas (Sept. 18, 19, 20, 1937) and Philadelphia's Doug Clemens (June 6, 6, 7, 1967). Greg found that Pittsburgh's Bob Robertson equaled the record in three games against Atlanta in 1974. On July 18, batting for Frank Taveras, Robertson hit a ninth-inning double off Tom House; on July 19, again batting for Taveras, he hit a ninth-inning double off Danny Frisella; and on July 20, batting for pitcher John Morlan, he hit a seventh Inning double off Lew Krause.
