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THE BASEBALL PICTORIAL HISTORIAN'S LIBRARY


In a 1992 issue of Nineteenth Century Notes (the newsletter of SABR's Nineteenth Century Committee) Fred Ivor-Campbell published an excellent annotated bibliography entitled "The Nineteenth Century Baseball Researcher's Library." I've often wondered what a bibliography would look like for the baseball pictorial historian's library. Using my own baseball library as a model, I've come up with just such a list.

It should be understood that this list is *not* a compendium of books with the most photos, or the prettiest pictures, or the highest quality images. Instead, the bibliography is a list of books to which I find I often refer when doing baseball pictorial history research. Furthermore, I have omitted a number of excellent books that I use, but on a less frequent basis.

My own library is rather modest and I do not pretend to have every available source that would be of use to the baseball pictorial historian. If I've missed or skipped over sources that fit the above criteria and you feel should be included, or if you have comments or criticisms of my choices, please send them along so that I may publish an addendum in a future PHC newsletter.

Much as Fred had done for his bibliography, I have excluded published articles, allowing only published books. Obvious reference sources, such as baseball encyclopedias and annual guides are also not included. Books marked with an asterisk denote works that I consider to be absolutely essential for pictorial history research. (Note: Some books may have been reprinted at a later date than found in the list. All dates shown are from books in my collection.)

Alvarez, Mark. The Old Ball Game. 1990. A superb collection of images focusing on baseball prior to the major league era.

Dixon, Phil. The Negro Baseball Leagues: A Photographic History. 1992. Close to 600 photographs illustrate the history of the Negro Leagues and black ballplayers as far back as the 1860s. The photos are accompanied with remarkably complete identifications and the book is fully indexed. An absolutely outstanding work.

Gershman, Michael. Diamonds: The Evolution of the Ballpark. 1993. Along with Ritter's Lost Ballparks, a valuable resource for pinpointing where a photo was taken.

Hanks, Stephen. 150 Years of Baseball. 1989. Over 1000 photos, well researched by SABR and PHC member *Mark Rucker*, are reproduced in this, one of the best pictorial histories of the game.

Honig, Donald. Baseball in the '50s: An Illustrated History. 1987; and Baseball in the '30s: An Illustrated History. 1989. Illustrated histories of two of baseball's more popular decades. Each book is complete with hundreds of portraits of the era's most important and interesting players. Fully indexed.

Honig, Donald. The American League: An Illustrated History and The National League: An Illustrated History. 1983. Over 1000 photos of baseball's top players from the American and National Leagues. Alas, the 19th century is dismissed with a single picture of William Hulbert and a few hundred words of text.

Honig, Donald. The Boston Red Sox: An Illustrated History. 1990; The Brooklyn Dodgers: An Illustrated Tribute. 1981; The Chicago Cubs: An Illustrated Tribute. 1991; The New York Yankees: An Illustrated Tribute. 1987; The Philadelphia Phillies: An Illustrated History. 1992; The St. Louis Cardinals: An Illustrated History. 1991. Each

volume in Honig's series of illustrated team histories has hundreds of player photos, most of which are quite useful for the baseball pictorial historian/researcher. Invariably, Honig dismisses the 19th century history of National League clubs with a handful of photos and a minimal number of words. All except the Brooklyn book are fully indexed. The work devoted to the Yankees is not only the biggest of the lot (over 500 photos versus the usual 300 or so), but is also by far the best.

Honig, Donald. Baseball: The Illustrated History of America's Game. 1990. More than 1000 photos are found in yet another illustrated history. As usual, Honig gives short shrift to the 19th century: less than 2% of the pictures coming from that era.

Nemec, David. The Beer and Whisky League. 1994. Covering more than just the American Association, the book contains over 60 team pictures and 150 portraits from 1870 to 1896. I've said it before and I'll say it again: the best available source for the nineteenth century baseball pictorial researcher.

Okkonen, Marc. Baseball Memories: 1900-1909. 1992. A pictorial Who's Who for the first decade of the 20th century. Images of practically every ball player to wear a major league uniform during the era highlight the work. Okkonen's meticulous drawings of the ballparks of the day are without a doubt the best ever published.

Okkonen, Marc. Baseball Memories: 1930-1939. 1994. The third volume of the series, like the other two, contains thousands of images that are a gold mine for the baseball pictorial historian. The series is an absolute must for any baseball researcher, not just the picture buff. Let's hope that more volumes are on their way.

Okkonen, Marc. Baseball Memories: 1950-1959 1993. As is the case with the other two volumes of the series, ballplayers, reporters, and executives are all pictured and all fully indexed. Furthermore, broadcasters are pictured in this, as well as the third, volume.

Okkonen, Marc. Baseball Uniforms of the 20th Century. 1993. The source for dating baseball pictures. Quite simply, the most important book for the baseball pictorial historian.

Retort, Robert D. Pictorial Negro Leagues Legends Album. 1992. The photos in this hard to find volume are quite possibly the most thoroughly researched in the entire baseball genre. Close to 300 fully identified photos of Negro League players and teams from the turn of the century to the 1950s.

Ritter, Lawrence, and Donald Honig. The Image of Their Greatness: An Illustrated History of Baseball from 1900 to the Present. 1979. Hundreds of photos highlight this excellent illustrated history of baseball in the 20th century. Close to 500 different ballplayers are pictured.

- Ritter, Lawrence, and Mark Rucker. The Babe: A Life in Pictures. 1988. The best illustrated biography of a baseball player to date. Ruthian in content and in quality.
- Ritter, Lawrence. Lost Ballparks: A Celebration of Baseball's Legendary Fields. 1992. Great photos of ballparks from different angles and eras makes this work an invaluable resource for determining locations in other pictures.

Rucker, Mark. Base Ball Cartes: The First Baseball Cards. 1988. Over eighty photos of baseball carte de visites. Indispensable for pictorial research of 1860s and '70s baseball.

- Slocum, Frank. Classic Baseball Cards. 1987. Over 9000 reproductions from ninety different baseball card series are featured. Series date from as early as 1887 and as late as 1955. Only one drawback; it's unindexed.
- Slocum, Frank. Topps Baseball Cards. 1990. A compilation of reproductions of every Topps baseball card since 1951. Over 25,000 photos of over 4000 players are completely indexed. The book for identifying players from the latter half of the 20th century.
- Thorn, John, and Mark Rucker, eds. The National Pastime, Spring 1984. A superb, eclectic collection of images ranging from the 1840s to 1890s. The work would be invaluable if a

- researcher would complete (as near as possible) player identifications and supply an index. Any ambitious PHC members willing to take a stab at it?
- Thorn, John, and Mark Rucker, eds. The National Pastime, Spring 1986. Starting where the previous Special Pictorial Issue (above) left off, this work features photos from the turn of the century to 1920. As above, the work is begging for more complete identifications and an index.

Thorn, John, and Mark Rucker, eds. The National Pastime, Number 9. A third pictorial covers the era from the 1920s through World War II. Once again, indexing and more identifications would make for a fine research project.

Voigt, David Q. Baseball: An Illustrated History. 1987. Over 600 different baseball personalities are pictured in this popular pictorial history of the game.

Ward, Geoffrey C., and Ken Burns. *Baseball: An Illustrated History*. 1994. Hundreds of photographs richly illustrate this most recent pictorial history of baseball. The book is most useful for its many never-before-published photos and its admirable attempt to shy away from the hackneyed pictures of most other books of its genre.

THE NATIONAL POLICE GAZETTE SUPPLEMENT

Throughout the years, various publications have at one time or other inserted photos of popular sports personalities of their day, whether they be from baseball, boxing, horse racing, etc. *The Sporting News*, with their sepia photos, was and is a very popular example.

The granddaddy of them all was *The National Police Gazette* supplement. Since the supplement came out weekly, the photos must have accumulated to a great extent. The problem in cataloging the baseball players is that one has to sort through photos from boxing, wrestling, horse racing,

bowling, jujitsu, and any other sporting activity that appealed to the "sportsman."

The earliest print I have had is No. 1088, dated 6/25/1898, of one Gus Ruhlin, a heavyweight boxer. Five years and 131 photos later, I find the first baseball player photo, No. 1353, dated 7/18/03. This is labeled "Catcher [Red] Dooin, Philadelphia, National League." However, other baseball photos must have been published prior to this one, as a photo of George Davis shows him in a New York uniform, and he left New York in 1901. [Ed. note: Or this may be a picture of Davis during his short 4 game stint with the Giants in 1903.]


The following is a check list of the baseball players I have cataloged.

These first few early supplements have no number and no date:

No credit is given to the photographer or source of the print. At this time, I have a check list of 420 different sportsmen including 52 baseball players.
