NEGRO LEAGUERS AND THE HALL OF FAME

A brief recap of events in Cooperstown. I arrived on Friday July 24th and joined up with Rick Morris to begin recording the weekend for the Rogan family, son, Wilbur and his wife Maxine, grandson Carl and his wife, granddaughters Cassandra and Mary Kay and great-grandson Chris and his wife Christina. Rick Morris was the videographer and I was sort of a guide. Besides hanging out at the Otesaga Hotel and helping introduce different players to Mr Rogan, the first big event was a reception on the Otesaga Veranda. a great deal of mingling with famous baseball names followed by a fabulous dinner. Larry Lester arrived around 8:30 missing dinner but in time for the private Hall of Fame tour for all the invited guests and honorees. Sunday was the "Big Day" for the inductees. Sam Lacy led off the ceremonies with a splendid speech with great humor. After Jaime Jarrin accepted the Broadcasters Award, Wilbur Rogan

accepted his father's Wilber Rogan's plaque and gave an excellent acceptance speech, covering the major points. A large crowd was on hand and the event was by all counts a success.

The following on the SABR-28 Convention was written by

Jerry Malloy and is greatly appreciated.

A wonderful time was had, as usual, by SABR members attending the National Convention in San Francisco from June 25th to June 28th. Negro League Committee members who have never attended a SABR Convention should try to do so in the Research presentations, player panels, and various speakers are among the pleasures of these annual festivals of the Grand Old Game. The conventions also provide a great opportunity to meet and socialize with SABR members of all interests, and put faces to the names we encounter via letters, phone calls, email, and SABR-L. Besides the various formal gatherings, I've always had great times at SABR conventions getting together with members of various stripes at the local "Boom-Boom Room" of whichever hotel we occupy. I'm most grateful to Barry Mednich and all of his SABR colleagues in the Bay Area for their diligent efforts in putting together such a terrific event.

'On Thursday evening, June 25th, a forum open to all convention attendees considered and discussed a proposal that SABR devise a plan to create a "Hall-of-Fame"-style list to recognize the accomplishments of the most significant contributors to the historical evolution of the game of baseball. Gene Sunnen, former president of SABR, has been working on this project for some time. Gene envisions various voting procedures to be sure that all of baseball's significant figures would be included. A twotiered voting process (to nominate and elect) would enable all SABR members to vote on 20th century major league figures, but special consideration would be granted to four categories: African American baseball (to include both Negro League players and those who played prior to the creation of the black leagues), 19th century figures, the minor leagues, and umpires. Under Gene's plan, the NLC would be responsible for nominating, by a vote of committee members, five players/executives per year. As I understood the proposal, the committee's vote would be tantamount to placing these figures directly into SABR's roster of recognition.

In the discussion that followed, the proposal did not generate overwhelming support. Various objections to the plan arose. Jan Finkel spoke strongly against the measure, fearing that it would deflect attention from the task of persuading the Hall of Fame to eliminate the ridiculous restrictions currently placed upon commemmorating Negro League veterans. Furthermore, Jan felt that, by electing Black stars to a separate SABR entity, the society may be encouraging the Hall of Fame to disregard future inductions under the notion that Negro Leaguers have been recognized by SABR and, therefore, do not require similar accolades from Cooperstown. Jan applauded the Negro League Museum in Kansas City for steadfastly refusing to create a "Negro League Hall of Fame" for precisely this reason.

I think this is a valid concern. But the proposal of SABR recognition may not necessarily conflict with the committee's objective to throw open the doors at Cooperstown. The greatest value of Gene Sunnen's proposal is that those most knowledgeable about African-American baseball would be selecting the people who are most deserving without going through the tortuous procedure of educating members of the Hall's Veteran's Committee who know little and care less about the topic. It could possibly develop that SABR's Negro League Committee, by their informed endorsement of noteworthy Black figures, could assist the Hall of Fame by identifying key contributors, and serving a valuable advisory role. The issue of Gene's proposal remained unresolved at the conclusion of the convention, but may emerge again in the future. NLC members may want to consider the pluses-and-minuses of the project.

On the afternoon of Friday, June 26th, David A. Lawrence, who has served on the faculties of UCLA and Stanford, delivered a presentation entitled "The Negro

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Leagues: A Unique Problem in Historical Research." (**5pp) Dr Lawrence, who has been researching Negro League baseball since 1983, is a member of SABR, but not of the NLC. Unfortunately, I was not able to attend his presentation, since I was under strict orders by the NLC Co-Chairmen to participate in the "Historical Site and Bar Tour" en route to Candlestick Park for Friday evening (chilly) Rangers-Giants interleague tilt, and by adhering to this firm command, I missed Mr Lawrence's presentation. My understanding is that David's presentation encompassed attempts to utilize various SABRmetric statistical tools to assess and evaluate the performance of Negro League players. I'm sorry I missed this presentation, since I'm not aware of anyone having taken this innovative approach to examining African-American baseball.

NLC members who have received Dick's SABR Convention reports in prior years amy recall that he always attributes the early hour of our committee meeting to the fact that Larry Lester always insists upon meeting at 7 a.m. he's correct about this, since, with Larry not in attendance, the NLC was scheduled to meet at the relatively late time of 8:30 a.m. Unfortunately, however, the meeting was scheduled for half-an-hour only, as opposed to the usual Bill Williamson, Jan Finkel, and Rob Schober were NLC members among the present. There were others present, but I neglected to have them sign the attendance sheet-a shortcoming Dick and Larry never would permit. My estimate is that 15-20 people were present. David Marasco, of Evanston, Illinois, was present at the convention, taking the opportunity to scarf-down some of mom's home cooking, as his parents live in San Francisco. Unfortunately, he didn't realize how drastically the Bay Area's transit systems had changed in the ten years since he'd used them regularly, and missed the NLC meeting. In the brief time available, I urged those present to continue to send to Dick and Larry any statistical/roster data they may come across. LEAGUES BOOK is not cast in stone, but a work-in-progress and additional material is continually sought. Remember: no detail is too small in compiling this extremely valuable information.

The remaining time was mostly spent considering the Negro League Convention in Harrisburg, a grand event scheduled for August 6-8. Dick sent me a stack of fact sheets compiled by Ted Knorr for this ambitious and exciting gathering. I am among the many committee members who shall not be able to attend the Harrisburg event, and all of those present at the NLC meeting ooooh'ed-and-ahhhh'ed over the formidable list of fascinating papers to be read. I'm hoping that those papers that are composed on a word processor and can be converted into an email format that may be made available, to those of us who are online. The topics being addressed merit as wide an audience as possible, and I know I'd love to have them available, if at all possible. I also deeply regret not having the

opportunity to meet with Bob Peterson whose seminal work, ONLY THE BALL WAS WHITE, remains one of the cornerstones of Black baseball research. I met Bob at a SABR convention several years ago, and he's a delightful and gracious gentleman.

A tip of my Chicago American Giants cap to Jim Riley, for conceiving the notion of a Negro League Convention; to Ted Knorr, whose diligent efforts have brought it to fruition; and to the various presenters and participants, for contributing to such a valuable program. Heck. it's almost worth the trip to Harrisburg just to see Ted, resplendent in the magnificent HARRISBURG GIANTS jersey he wears to SABR conventions.
