The well-organized ceremony featured the officials of the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center, current owners of the property; SARM president David Pietrusza and SARM member & author Michael Gershman; and Gene Michael and Willie Randolph of the Yankees. The event received excellent print and tv coverage. The Texas Rangers unveiled the new name for the facility set to replace Arlington Stadium in the spring of 1994. "The Ball park in Arlington" did not receive rave reviews. A phone poll over the all-news KRLD radio station in Dallas stopped the calls as the vote was 35-1 against with some of the comments pretty caustic. A few press clippings for 50¢ for more details.

V FUN IN CLEVELAND

My congratulations to the organizers of the Jack Graney chapter meeting on Septembe 24-26 in Cleveland to mark the end of Cleveland Stadium for baseball and the start of Gateway. The tour of the new park was great. About 85 people came to the meeting and twice that for the Gateway tour. The official last weekend for the Stadium came on the next weekend.

VI LAST GAMES

The Rangers lost their last home contest in Arlington Stadium, 4-1, to the KC Royals in a game that marked the end of two great careers: Nolan Ryan for the Rangers and George Brett for the Royals. The announced attendance was 41,039, short of the capacity of 43,500. John Blake, VP for public relations noted that special passes not counted in the attendance account for some of the difference. The Indians also lost their last home contest at Cleveland Stadium, 4-0, to the White Sox before 72,390, almost 2000 short of capacity. VII KC GOES TO GRASS

Another sign that better years are coming for ballparks fans came with the announcement that the Royals will change from artificial turf to grass in the newly named Kauffman Stadium for the 1995 season. Send a 29¢ SASE for a wire story on the change.

VVII TICER STADIUM NEWS

The latest issue of "Unobstructed Views," the Tiger Stadium Fan Club Newsletter, outlines the arguments against the casino funding proposals meant to provide the revenue for a new stadium proposal. IX MORE SEATING?

A recent wire service story noted efforts in Baltimore to add between 1500 and 2500 seats to Camden Yards. The park now seats 48,079 and most games in 1993 were sold out or nearly at capacity. A new grandstand was proposed for a space beyond the left-center field wall with other seats squeezed into the existing bleachers. Send a 29¢ SASE for the story.

- 5. Bill Ballou of Whitinsville, MA, preports that a marker has been erected for the site of the first perfect game, pitched in Worcester, MA, in 1880, between Worcester & Troy, NY. "The stone obelisk is at the entrance to the Becker College administration building on Sever Street in Worcester, close to where the entrance was to the old ballpark." Bill said that there was a plaque on the side of a nearby house, but it burned down and was never rebuilt.
- 6. Congratulations to committee member Bob Carr whose informative and witty letter appeared in the Nov/Dec magazine of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Bob was correcting several mistakes in a previously published letter.
- 7. Diamonds magazine writer DougheDaniel called recently asking for info on Sulphur Dell. He kindly sent us some back issues of the fine publication for our files.
- 8. Andrew Gernhardt of Ft. Wayne, IN, thanks the members who responded to his inquiry about Rizal Stadium. Bob Carr (who spent time near the Stadium in WWII), Charles Wilson (ditto, but during Vietnam conflict) and Miles Wolf all responded to note that the place was in Manilla, named after Philippine hero Rizal. It was the site of several 1934 major league touring games with Ruth, Gehrig, etc. Bob notes that he saw a 1945 exhibition game with some big league stars at Rizal.
- 9. Another fire (Texas Stadium/Irving, TX) started in those %S(43 + luxury suites! Those things are dangerous--tear them out! Blaze took place on 10-12-93.
- 10. Gordon Thomas notes that the retirement of Carlton Fisk from the White Sox severs the last active-player link to RFK Stadium. Fisk played in several Sept/1971 game

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- 11. Cincinnati installed a glass backstop in 1965, measuring 54' 10" in length, 15' 4" high. The only previous major league park with a glass backstop was Seals Stadium. Installed in 1947, it was there for the SF Giants 1958-59 seasons.can anyone dispute this....it came to us with no source noted.
- 12. Did they expand the SkyDome? Playoff games vs. the White Sox reported attendance of 51,375; 51,889; 51,783. And for the Series vs. Philadelphia, they topped 52,000 with 52,195 for game 6? Previous crowds seemed to be under 51,000. At the Vet, crowds stayed steady at 62,889; 62,731; 62,706 for games 3-4-5.
- 13. The new Cleveland park, supported by a tobacco and liquor tax; may ban smoking in the facility.
