COLLEGE WORLD SERIES NOTES

Larry Cochell won his first NCAA title with Oklahoma, but did you know that he is the only coach to take three different teams to the College World Series? Cochell led Oral Roberts University in 1978, California State-Fullerton in 1990 and Oklahoma twice, 1992 and 1994.

Central Missouri State University Head Coach Dave Van Horn won the NCAA-II title in his first year with the Mules. Van Horn took over the Warrensburg program after five seasons at Texarkana Junior College.

Attendance records fell again...A crowd of 21,530 filled Rosenblatt Stadium for the title game June 11 as Oklahoma defeated Georgia Tech, 13-5, in a game broadcast live nationwide on the CBS network.

Jim Brock--Memorial

The college baseball world lost one of its most respected members when Jim Brock, a veteran of 23 years as a head coach, succumbed to a yearlong battle with cancer. Brock made his 13th appearance in the College World Series last month, but was forced to leave his Arizona State team in Omaha when the illness escalated. His 1,100-440 record and two NCAA titles (1977 & 1981) rank among the all-time leaders.

Bob Bennett became the 11th NCAA Division I coach to claim 1,000 career victories. Bennett led Fresno State University to an 8-2 victory over Hawaii-Hiloto claim the milestone victory. Bennett has been in the dugout for 26 years.

Texas-Austin coach Cliff Gustafson became the all-time winningest coach in NCAA Division I history on April 22 when the Longhorns posted a 10-1 victory over Grand Canyon, giving "Gus" his 1,333rd win. Gustafson, in his 27th season, surpassed Southern California's legendary coach Rod Dedeaux.

Gordie Gillespie, head coach of St. Francis of the NAIA, is the alltime winningest coach in college baseball with more than 1,400 victories. The nation's second winningest junior college coach, Bill Griffin, announced his retirement after 37 years in uniform. The mentor at Howard, Panola and Northeast Texas Junior Colleges, Griffin collected 1,148 victories and claimed national championships at both Howard and Panola.

Miami's pitching coach, Lazaro Collazo, married Michelle Card on Feb. 5 during the seventh-inning stretch of the Hurricane's 3-1 victory over Tennessee. The wedding attracted 2,434 at Mark Light Stadium. The game attracted one other fan.

Future Hall of Famers Nolan Ryan and Carlton Fisk have ventured into the college coaching ranks. Ryan at Texas Christian, where his son Reid is a pitcher, and Fisk at Illinois State, where his son, Casey, is a catcher.

Four teams made their first-ever appearances in the NCAA Tournament this season, Illinois State, Wright State, North Carolina-Greensboro and Texas-San Antonio. UNCG has been playing baseball just four years, while UTSA recently completed its third season.

NEW COACHES CRASH INTO NCAA-I

The NCAA Division I welcomed 21 new head coaches in 1994. Of the first-year coaches, only seven posted winning records, but five led their current team to the NCAA Tournament.

AROUND THE HORN

Parity hit collegiate baseball this season. Among the 48 teams in the NCAA Tournament, only 23 were invited to the "Big Dance" last year.

Four NCAA-I teams won 40 games in 1994 but did not receive an invitation to the NCAA Tournament, including Delaware (41-13), McNeese State (41-16), Texas Tech (40-17) and James Madison (40-19).

Texas Christian University made its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 38 years. To put that in perspective, Head Coach Lance Brown was a star pitcher in Little League when the Horned Frogs received their last invitation.

Only three of the eight teams that hosted an NCAA Regional Tournament advanced to the College World Series--Miami, Florida State and Louisiana State.

The University of Texas has hosted an NCAA Regional Tournament 16 consecutive years.

Dallas Baptist University, which finished third in the NAIA World Series, won a tripleheader to advance tot he regionals. DBU defeated Tarleton State (5-3) in front of a doubleheader sweep over Lubbock Christian (9-7, 6-1). The first pitch was thrown at 10 a.m., with the final out recorded at 11:30 p.m.

NCAA Champion Oklahoma did not appear in any of the preseason baseball rankings Top 25. Only *Collegiate Baseball* tabbed the Sooners as an NCAA participant.

Collegiate Baseball picked 13 of 30 conference champions along with five World Series participants in its preseason picks.

Baseball America picked 15 of 30 conference winners and tabbed four teams to the College World Series.

Mansfield University, an NCAA Division II school, just completed its 127th consecutive season of intercollegiate baseball. Arizona State went 274 games without being shutout, the fourth longest streak in NCAA history. Unfortunately for the Sun Devils, the streak snapped when USC and Grand Canyon blanked ASU in back-to-back games.

Mizuno's College Player of the Year, Ryan Jackson of Duke, hit .378 with 22 home runs, 63 RBI and a 34game hitting streak. In addition, he chipped in with seven wins as a pitcher.

The Dick Howser Trophy went to Georgia Tech catcher Jason Varitek. The 14th person selected in the June free agent draft, Varitek posted a .432 batting average with 16 home runs, 85 RBI and 74 walks.

A tip of the hat to Ila Borders, who became the second female in collegiate baseball history to pitch. The south-paw from Southern California College posted a 2-4 record with a 2.92 ERA in 49 innings. Opponents hit just .244 against Borders.

Northern Iowa freshman shortstop Kevin Sawtzky tied an NCAA record with three consecutive triples in his first three at-bats. He went six for seven with four triples and five RBI in his first collegiate game.

Jeff Staubach, son of NFL Hall of Famer Roger Staubach, hit a home run in his first collegiate at-bat for Duke. His long-ball came against--you guessed it--the Naval Academy, Dad's alma mater. Florida A&M pitchers Shohn Lewis and James Harris pitched back-to-back no-hitters in a doubleheader sweep over North Carolina A&T (7-0, 8-0). Florida State University is the only other team to post back-toback no-no when FSU turned the trick in 1968.

Robert Lopez of Oklahoma State set a Big 8 Conference record with 10 consecutive hits in a twin-bill sweep over Stephen F. Austin State.

Iowa freshman C.J. Thieleke hit a grand slam home run in consecutive innings in a 14-13 loss to Penn. State. Springfield College's Hassan Robinson had a 38-game hitting streak in 1994.

The seventh longest hitting streak in NCAA-I history was turned in by Portland State catcher Dave Vilan when he hit safely in 37 straight games.

Georgia Southern second baseman Matt Wilson set an NCAA record by playing 42 consecutive errorless games.

RECORD BREAKERS...

Santa Clara senior second baseman Lou Donati set an NCAA record when he was hit by a pitch for the 53rd time in his career. Believe it or not, he completed his freshman season without being hit by a pitch.

Bethune Cookman College second baseman King Lewis set an NCAA mark with eight stolen bases in a game against Savannah State.

Auburn senior right-handed pitcher John Powell became the all-time NCAA strikeout king on May 7 against Louisiana State University. The master of the split-finger fastball struck out his 542nd career batter, surpassing Derek Tatsuno of Hawaii (1977-79).

WAY TO GO DAD...

After missing a three-game weekend series to be with his wife at the birth of their first child (a daughter), Texas Christian University shortstop Shannon Coulter returned to the lineup in time to collect 16 hits in his next 21 at-bats over the next five games.

FINAL DRAFT NOTES...

In 1993, Texas A & M University featured a pitching staff that included a starting rotation of Jeff Granger (1993 first-round selection), Kelly Wunsch (1993 first-round selection), Trey Moore (1994 second-round selection), and Chris Clemons (1994 second-round selection). In the 1994 draft, only 12 collegiate players were chosen with the first 28 picks. However, the New York Mets made Florida State University pitcher Paul Wilson the first player selected.

Six first-round picks in the June draft played in the 1994 College World Series in Omaha.

Three first-round draft picks from last year's draft are currently pitching in the Major Leagues:
