Twin honours for Fergie



He wore a blue jacket in Cubs blue for the unveiling of his statue (the artist prefers 'sculpture') outside Wrigley Field. On June 10, in his hometown of Chatham, he was resplendent in red.

Hundreds of people turned out on a beautiful sunny day to see a full-size replica of the Wrigley piece revealed outside the Chatham-Kent Civic Centre. The pride of Chatham, Ferguson Arthur Jenkins, was piped in by a full band, then took his place on stage to be honoured prior to the unveiling of the sculpture by his daughters.

Following a summary of Fergie's astonishing stats, Mayor Darrin Canniff explained how he was inspired to procure the piece for Chatham-Kent while attending the

Wrigley event. He also brought audio greetings from Wayne Gretzky.

Chatham resident Chris Dziadura, son of Gene Dziadura, gave an emotional speech about the close relationship between the Jenkins and Dziadura families, 'the story of Fergie and Gene'.

The elder Dziadura played briefly in the majors and was an area scout who brought Jenkins to the Philadelphia Phillies.

When he took the podium, Fergie talked about his childhood, throwing rocks and coal at passing trains. He mentioned going with his Father to his first major league game at Tiger Stadium. Seeing Larry Doby hit 2 home runs made him think, 'maybe there's a future for me in this game'.

He paid tribute to baseball friends and colleagues in the audience: Byron Browne, Doug Melvin, Larry Walker, Billy Atkinson and Jim Kern. He told stories about Leo Durocher and Billy Martin and outlined his loyalties: team, organization, family. He encouraged kids to pursue their athletic dreams with hard work. Then it was time for the unveiling by his daughters, two of whom may be seen in this photo. The sculpture is a beautiful piece of art and worth a visit to Chatham.





The next Saturday, June 17, brought another honour.





Fergie always attends the Induction Ceremonies at the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in the Town of St. Marys and this year was no exception.

But the 2023 event had an added attraction, the renaming of the approach to the Hall of Fame and Museum to Ferguson Jenkins Way.

Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum Induction Ceremony



On Saturday, June 17 there were 6 new inductees added to the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum.

Jesse Barfield, legendary Jays outfielder, Denis Boucher, MLB pitcher and longtime coach with Baseball Canada, former A's pitcher Rich Harden and long-time Manitoba coach and executive Joe Wiwchar were the 2023 inductees. Joining them in person were former Jays first baseman John Olerud and longtime Expos writer and broadcaster Jacques Doucet also got their long-awaited moment in the spotlight. Both were part of the 2020 class but couldn't make it in the past three years due to both the pandemic and other scheduling challenges.

Olerud, a two-time World Series champion with Toronto, remains the franchise's single-season batting average leader. He hit a career-best .363 at age 24 with the

club 30 years ago, sparking excitement when he hit .400 going into August of that season.

Jesse Barfield was thrilled to join his former teammates George Bell (2013) and Lloyd Moseby (2018) in the Hall of Fame, calling it 'a long time coming'. He was joined by a number of family members and friends, including his wife Marla, who he asked to stand during his speech, crediting her with supporting him throughout his career, and son Josh, now the Farm Director for the Arizona Diamondbacks and a former MLB player himself. His speech was warm, moving and peppered with a hidden talent – flawless impressions of players and coaches who he encountered along the way.

Olerud entertained the crowd with his humility and by sharing that the legendary 'Rickey Henderson' story was in fact - fiction. (read more here: https://www.mlb.com/cut4/john-olerud-told-the-origin-of-the-rickey-henderson-story-c265505404)

Denis Boucher was visibly emotional throughout his speech, frequently blaming his 'allergies' for acting up. Boucher pitched for both the Jays and Expos, but perhaps his greatest contribution is his years-long commitment to Baseball Canada, acting as pitching coach for the Senior Men's team.

Rich Harden too was equally as humbled and moved, with a career sadly cut short by injury. In his prime, Rich had one of the most impressive strikeout rates in MLB.

Jacques Doucet regaled the crowd in both English and French, and his contributions to growing baseball's popularity as beat writer and then broadcaster for the Montreal Expos can't be understated. Quebec now has one of the most thriving developmental baseball programs in Canada, and it's not a stretch to trace that path back to the people who helped the Expos gain prominence in the province in the early years after the team joined MLB.

Joe Wichwar as well is one of the most significant figures in Canadian baseball development, having devoted an incredible over 70 years to baseball in his home province of Manitoba, as a player, coach, volunteer, executive and administrator. His long and successful coaching career spanned from 1953-2013, a nearly unheard-of tenure.

Cooperstown in Canada founder and baseball historian Kevin Glew was also honoured with the 2023 Randy Echlin Lifetime Volunteer Achievement Award at the ceremony.



In Kevin Glew's own words: "On Saturday, I was very fortunate to receive the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame's 2023 Randy Echlin Lifetime Volunteer Achievement Award at the induction ceremony in St. Marys, Ont.

I want to thank Scott Crawford, Jeremy Diamond and the Hall's board for this great honour. I knew Randy Echlin as a passionate Canadian baseball fan. We had many discussions about the Blue Jays and Expos before I even knew he was a judge. He was also one of the first supporters of my blog.

I miss him, but I'm honoured to receive an award in his name. Most of you know that the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame has been a passion of mine for over two decades. My first involvement with the Hall came at a breakfast meeting organized by Chris West at the Westover Inn in 1996. I was a young buck writing notes during the meeting and I wrote St. Mary's (with an apostrophe) in my notes. Suddenly, Lorne Eedy (who I had just met) reached over and scratched out the apostrophe.

"No apostrophe," he whispered.

Ever since then, St. Marys (no apostrophe) has had a special place in my heart. I'm not important enough to write something this long about an award I received. But I wanted to make sure to thank Scott and the Hall of Fame and ensure that people remember Randy Echlin and let them know how important he was to me.

Please go and visit the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in St. Marys. P.S. Also, thank you to my mom and dad for instilling in me both a love of baseball and a love of history."

Scott Crawford would also like to include a huge thank you to the 75 volunteers who gave their time and energy to ensuring a successful induction weekend. The event simply could not run without them.

Chicago 2023 Convention Summary

Our chapter has had a lot of new members join in the past few years who have not had an opportunity yet to attend a convention. For those who have attended at least one convention in the past, I'm sure you would agree a written summary could not cover all the interesting topics covered. This summary will highlight interesting items from the conference agenda. SABR Facts

Founded August 10, 1971, by 16 individuals who met at the National Baseball Library in Cooperstown New York. The objectives were:

- foster the study of baseball;
- stimulate interest in baseball;
- establish an accurate historical account of baseball; and,
- disseminate baseball information.

From these roots, the organization has grown to 7,435 members with 84 chapters world-wide and 34 research committees.

Agenda in Brief

Wednesday included the annual Research Committee Chairs and Regional Chapter Leaders meetings, an opening reception and a Chicago Downtown Baseball Walking Tour.

Thursday began with the annual general meeting and opening remarks. The featured speaker this year was Chase Carpenter, Senior Director, Strategy and Analytics, Chicago Cubs. The balance of the day included 8 research presentations running in two tracks, 10 committee meetings, a session on how to do baseball research and three panel/general sessions covering the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League; The Negro Leagues are Major Leagues: Two Years Post Launch; and a Player Panel featuring Ozzie Guillen.

The evening offered a choice of attending a screening of the film covering the final season of the original Comiskey Park or the preliminary round and quarterfinals of the trivia contest.

Friday during the day included 17 research presentations, 8 committee meetings, additional how to do baseball research sessions and 2 general sessions covering: A



Veeck Family Legacy; and Poster Presentations. The evening event was attending the game between the White Sox and Cardinals.

Saturday featured 6 research presentations, 7 research committee meetings and 3 general sessions covering Analytics and Coaching in Baseball; Black Baseball in Chicago; and Reimaging Wrigley. The day also included the Friends of SABR Doner Breakfast and SABR Awards Luncheon. The evening activity was the trivia contest semifinals and finals.

If you have not been to a convention, I hope the above provides a better idea of the convention experience. The location for 2024 has not been decided, however, once announced attending is well worth consideration.

Schedule announced for WBSC Women's Baseball World Cup Group A



Team Canada starts their series at the World Baseball Softball Confederation (WBSC) Women's Baseball World Cup Group A against Mexico on August 8th at Baseball Central in Thunder Bay, Ontario. Next games see the team taking on Hong Kong-China, USA, Korea, and Australia. The Women's Baseball World Cup takes place between August 8-13.

Hosted by the Thunder Bay International Baseball Association (TBIBA), the round robin tournament will see six nations taking part, and excitingly - Canada is the host team.

In addition to Canada's opening game against Mexico, the August 9th contest versus Hong Kong-China will also be played at Baseball Central before the tournament moves to Port Arthur Stadium for the remainder of the event.

Group B will be playing from September 13-18 in Miyoshi City, Japan featuring Chinese Taipei, Cuba, France, Puerto Rico, Venezuela, and host country Japan.





The top two finishers in each group plus two wild cards advance to the WBSC Women's Baseball World Cup Final Stage which will be played in Thunder Bay in 2024.

Prior to the Group A stage, Canada will hold a training camp in Halifax, Nova Scotia on August 1^{st,} and 2nd before moving to Thunder Bay from August 4-7 where they will play a pair of exhibition contests against the Thunder Bay Lakers on August 5th and 6th at Baseball Central.



Canada's Women's National Team is currently ranked as the No. 3 nation in the world based on the latest WBSC world rankings. This is its first, sanctioned international baseball competition since the 2019 WBSC Americas Women's Baseball World Cup qualifier.
