#### I HILLTOP PARK MARKER CEREMONY SET

We have received word that a ceremony and marker unveiling will take place for Hilltop Park, home of the Yankees from 1903 to 1912, on Thursday, September 30, at mid-day. Exact time and format of the ceremony will be known later this summer. Plans include bringing Chet Hoff, the oldest surviving ex-major league player, to the ceremony. Chet played at Hilltop in 1912. The 102 year old Hoff now lives in a retirement home in Florida.

The marker program had been stalled, but some swift action by the public relations firm that has both Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center (current owners of the park site) and the Yankees as clients put the event back on track. Once I receive the final arrangements, I will make a special mailing to all committee members in NY, CT, & NJ. If you live more distant and wish this mailing, let me know and you will be included.

The poll said that 65% are satisfied with the Stadium, but 28% would like to see the team move.

So much for fireproof construction... Fulton-County Stadium had a major pregame fire on Tuesday, July 20, before the Braves and Cardinals were to play. #### XI . NEWS IN DETROIT



### XIV <u>OTHER BALLPARKS NOTES & NEWS</u>

- \* SABR researchers documented the 10,000th home run at Tiger Stadium and its predecessors to 1901.
- \* Houston may add 10,000 more seats to the Astrodome (for football) or build a new domed stadium.
- \* The Padres-Phillies doubleheader of Friday Saturday, July 2-3, ended at 4:30 am, the latest finish in major league history. 1000 fans stayed the distance.
- \* The heat waves of this summer have caused players and officials to design ways of keeping cool, especially on astroturf. Field temps can reach 140 degrees. Boxes of crushed ice for feet, cabbage leaves for heads, spray bottles of water, etc.
- \* SF Candlestick Park became an art gallery for a day with a special exhibit of thirty baseball greats by artist Tom Rodrigues. "Legends at the Stick" featured people in period clothing, including Babe Ruth "chewing on a cigar with a women on each arm," and the "Who's on First" routine of Abbott & Costello on the stadium PA system. Rodrigues funded the entire cost, \$60,000, himself. Three hundred people attended.
- \* The first college football field to install artificial turf, Neyland Stadium in Knoxville, TN, will replace the turf with real grass after the 1993 season. The Vols and Georgia played a 17-17 tie on 9-14-68, the first college game on the artificial surface.

New York, November 24 Editor

"Sporting Life" Having just noticed in your issue of the 18th inst. a statement by your Birmingham correspondent, Mr. G. F. Hobart, that Mr. D. L. Bridges of that city, claims to be the champion attendant at ball games. I think I have it on Mr. Bridges on the point of long and continuous patronizing of the national game. I claim to have PAID to see more games than any man living. I started attending ball games in 1882 and have seen games on every diamond of the major leagues. I traveled up to 1896 and laid out my trips so as to afford myself the pleasure of seeing my favorite game in the various cities I have Visited. I figure that during the elapsed time since 1882 I have averaged 75 games a season, with the exception of the years 1900-01-02, inclusive, during which I was so disgusted with the way the National League team was run that I did not go to many games; but in 1903, when the American League started here, I was in my glory again and have missed few games since. During all those years I have not been a "dead head" more than 20 times. I sincerely hope that Mr. Bridges may live to enjoy the only sport for a great many years to come, as I hope to, being only 56 years old, and when I get to a ball game; I am easily 30 years younger than that. If Mr. Bridges ever gets to New York I extend to him an invitation to come and see me and we will go up to Hilltop together and enjoy our favorite pastime.
