What baseball trips do you have planned for this season? Please share them with me (<u>rkapelus@gmail.com</u>) and I would love to include in an upcoming issue.



Chapter Leaders Message - March 2024

As I prepared this contribution to the spring edition of the Jenkins Journal, it was time to reflect on how quickly another fiscal year for the chapter is coming to an end.

This was the first year of a rejuvenated Chapter board system supported by a Planning Committee. This led to a successful year with excellent speakers at our meetings. The fall meeting featured Dom Dinelle, Owner and Harry Muir, General Manager of the expansion Chatham-Kent Barnstormers of the Intercounty League. Both speakers, with extensive backgrounds in major league baseball, provided a highly informative talk on how their collective experience was being applied to build an expansion team from the ground up.

Our SABR Day event featured Pat Hentgen as the Chapter recognized the 30 th anniversary of the Toronto Blue Jays 1993 repeat win of the World Series. Given only six other franchises in baseball history have accomplished this feat, Pat provided an informative talk as he discussed the season.

One final item requires comment. Board terms run for two years, hence, there will be no election given we are completing our first year of operations under a refreshed Board system. Jays alumni pitcher Jimmy Key and catcher Russell Martin along with former women's national team member Ashley Stephenson, former Blue Jays president and CEO Paul Godfrey, former national team pitcher Rod Heisler and longtime Toronto Leaside baseball executive Howard Birnie make up the 2024 class. All will be inducted in June (details on Induction Weekend can be found under the Upcoming Events section of this newsletter).

Jimmy Key is a native of Huntsville, Ala., and was a key member of the Blue Jays starting rotation for seven seasons. He was also a member of the 1992 World Series winning team.

Key was also selected an all-star in 1985 after posting a 14-6 record and 3.00 earnedrun average. He was named American League pitcher of the year by the Sporting News in 1987 after going 17-8 with an AL-best 2.76 ERA.

Russell Martin, born in Toronto, but raised in Montreal, spent parts of 14 seasons in the majors and played for Canada at the 2009 World Baseball Classic. He signed with the Blue Jays to be their primary catcher before the 2015 season and was part of the memorable 7th inning in game 5 of the 2015 ALDS.

He played for the Blue Jays through 2018 (memorably managing the final game of that season) before ending his career with one season with the Los Angeles Dodgers, the team where he spent his first five years in the big leagues.

Paul Godfrey was an integral part of the group who helped to bring an MLB franchise to Toronto and was involved in the project that led to the creation of SkyDome (now Rogers Centre), which opened in 1989.

He served as President and CEO of the Blue Jays in 2000 and remained with the team through 2008.

Ashley Stephenson was a member of the first women's national team in 2004 and went on to spend 15 seasons with the squad. She won Women's World Cup silver twice and took bronze on four occasions.

She is currently a position coach with the High-A Vancouver Canadians.

Rod Heisler, a native of Moose Jaw, Sask., pitched in a record 14 international competitions for the men's national team. He started Canada's first game at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles and also played at the 1988 Games in Seoul.

And Howard Birnie, a Toronto native, has quietly been an integral part of baseball in his home city for more than 70 years as a player, coach and umpire. He received the



Queen's Diamond Jubilee Award in 2012 in recognition of his 50 years of volunteering in amateur baseball.

Congratulations to all the inductees! We look forward to celebrating in June.

Upcoming Chapter Events

Speaker - Zak Ford - author of Called Up.

Zak is Chair of The Dusty Baker-Sacramento SABR Chapter. His book, Called Up, provides first person accounts of 109 players who debuted in the major leagues between 1961 and 2018. Zak's presentation can be tailored to include players of special interest to requesting Chapters. Hanlan's Point has a Board member who has read the book; hence, we will be submitting a request for a few specific players to be included in the talk. This is an early afternoon meeting to accommodate the time zone difference as Zak will be speaking to us from California.

Baseball and the Arts Committee

This committee focuses on research, education, and appreciation of the history of performance, literary and visual arts inspired by baseball as expressed in the areas of music, poetry, theatre, cinema, painting, sculpture and illustration.

The Committee periodically produces the SABR Journal of Baseball Arts, available through SABR in e-book or hardcopy format.

Baseball Index Project

The objective of this group, formerly known as the Bibliography Committee, is to locate, identify, evaluate, classify, and describe the literature of baseball.

The Baseball Index Project is on-going with an objective to maintain and expand a database of baseball literature. The database currently has 240,00 records.

The Committee also prepares bibliographies on baseball topics, indexes to baseball books, research into baseball literature and prepares reviews of baseball books.

In summation, whether you enjoy baseball entertainment through the arts, are an active baseball researcher or enjoy reading baseball books, please consider joining either or both of these committees as they will support your enjoyment of the game.

Baseball Canada's 2024 Women's National Schedule announces for WBSC Women's Baseball World Cup Finals

Canada will open play at the World Baseball Softball Confederation (WBSC) IX Women's Baseball World Cup Finals, presented by CARNEXT, against Mexico on July 28th at Port Arthur Stadium in Thunder Bay, Ontario before taking on Japan, USA, Venezuela and Chinese Taipei in the event that is set to take place from July 28 to August 3.

Canada earned their spot in the Finals after finishing second place with a 4-1 record last August in Thunder Bay at the Group A Stage qualifier with victories over Mexico, Hong Kong, Australia, and South Korea.

During the Finals, the six teams will play a single round robin, with the top two teams in the standings playing for the title of World Champion on August 3. Third and fourth place finishers will play for the bronze medal with August 2 serving as a rain day.

Japan has won the last six editions of the Women's Baseball World Cup including the last time the event was held in 2018 where Canada captured the bronze medal with an extra innings win over host USA.

All-time, Canada has captured six Women's Baseball World Cup medals including bronze in 2004, 2006, 2012 and 2018 along with silver in 2008 and 2016.

Canada hosted the inaugural Women's Baseball World Cup in 2004 and the fifth edition (2012) in Edmonton, Alberta, and will do so for the third time in history in Thunder Bay in 2024.



Prior to the World Cup Finals, Baseball Canada will hold a selection camp in Ottawa from July 3-7 where athletes will compete for one of 20 spots on the final roster. The team will then travel to Thunder Bay for a training camp from July 23-27 where they will hold daily workouts and play exhibition games.
