You will notice that we were able to eliminate two players. The nameless player who caught for the Brooklyn Eckfords on May 18, 1872 was actually George Clinton. That was certainly good news.

The story of Edward S. Taylor is even more interesting. Originally we listed Oak Taylor as playing with Hartford in 1877 and George Edward Taylor as the 1884 Pittsburgh player. Then I was told that Oak Taylor was actually Edward S. (Live Oak) Taylor who died in San Francisco in 1888. Fine, only that was the same date and place listed for the death of George Edward Taylor which I didn't notice at the time. When I noticed it was screwed up, I wasn't sure what to do about it. Then Tom Hufford sent me an obituary for none other than Oakley R. Taylor, a former catcher with the Cincinnati Red Stockings in 1869. In fact the real Oak Taylor was one of three players honored by the Reds during the 1919 World Series. According to the obituary, the other two players were George Wright and "some player named 'Cal'." Joe Simenic checked in to this mess and determined that Edward S. (Live) Taylor played in 1877 with Hartford and 1884 with Pittsburgh and Oak Taylor never played in the major leagues. Another mystery bites the dust at the hands of the bio committee.

It was sad to note the passing of Paul Otis, who was our oldest living ballplayer. Otis would have been 101 on Christmas Eve. He didn't quite attain the age of John Francis Daley, who is the alltime oldest. Our oldest living ballplayer is now Chester Hoff, who will turn 100 on May 8. Also turning 100 in 1991 will be Robert Cassius Wright, who reaches the century mark on December 13. As 1991 begins, there are currently 20 living ex-ballplayers who were born in the 19th century. That assumes that Charlie Hoover still isn't alive at 125.

We have more on the Valo game of September 30, 1939. Bill Deane checked the official scoresheets for the game and determined that Joe Haynes was charged with three walks, to Brancato, Dean, and Johnson. Dean pinch-hit for Lynn Nelson in the 4th inning and then took over on the mound. If Valo did play in the game he would have had to pinch-hit in the 4th inning. For the record, Dean hit .351 that year and was used as a pinch-hitter 35 other times. Can someone perhaps find more information from a Philadelphia paper?

I have a few more specifics on last month's mystery, Edward Cameron McLane. The family stated that McLane worked for Gulf Coast Securities Company, a land development firm buying up land in the Rio Grande Valley. There was another report that had him working for Stewart (Stuart) Land Irrigating Company, which was based in Omaha, Nebraska or Chattanooga, Tennessee. The last the family heard from Eddie was a picture taken by E. Moore photographers which was dated August 14, 1924. The photographers may have been in business in Nebraska, North Dakota, or the Rio Grande Valley. Since the family lost contact with him, he may have died shortly after the picture was taken. Various people have stated that they think Eddie may have died in either Omaha, New Orleans, or Nashville. My opinion is that the Gulf Coast Securities Company sounds like the name of a company that would be in New Orleans (I kind of doubt it's North Dakota). Of course, if they were buying up land in the Rio Grande Valley, they may have been based in Brownsville, McAllen, or Harlingen, Texas. If we can located these variuos companies, we would probably locate McLane.

From the international branch of the Bio Committee comes a couple of notes from Jamie (Why did I re-enlist?) Selko. Jamie reports that Otto Hess was actually born in the canton of Berne rather than the city. So apparently we still need a city of birth in Switzerland. Also there is no record of birth in Scotland for George Chalmers anywhere from 1886-90. Does anybody know anything about Chalmers?

Mystery of the Month

Buckle your seat belts. Our December mystery is a doozy. In 1979, Harold Dellinger wrote an article for the <u>Baseball Research Journal</u> on Matthew Sheldon Porter. And for the past 12 years, he and I have attempted to track him down. He is still missing.

Porter was born in 1859 in New York state, the son of Nathaniel and Cecilia Porter. In the 1870's, the family, including Matthew's brother, Horace, moved to Kansas City. It was in 1884 that Porter walked into my life when he had the audacity to appear in 3 major league games for the Kansas City Union Association team. In 1887, Porter married Rose Susan Shannon, granddaughter of Joseph Jarboe, one of Kansas City's earliest settlers. Porter was a druggist and owned various drugstores in Kansas City for a number of years. However in the early 1890's he got into the mining business near Joplin, Missouri and owned one of the richest calamine zinc mines in the state. The mine was grossing \$1000 a day.

But while Porter's fortunes were soaring, he also experienced personal tragedy. In 1887, his 7-month old child died. In 1893, his brother Horace drowned in the Delaware River near Philadelphia. Soon after, Porter moved to Wisconsin for a year or two before moving back to Kansas City where two more children died of memingitis. Porter lived in Kansas City and operated his drugstore until 1899 when he mysteriously disappears.

Porter's wife and three daughters, Mable (B. 12/90), Marguerite (B. 08/93), and Justine (B. 07/96) are listed in the 1900 census and Rose is listed as married. Matthew is not listed in any state. In 1905, the city directory lists Rose as a widow. When Porter's mother Cecilia died in 1903, Rose handled all of the arrangements and the estate reimbursed her for a telegram, among other things. I have wondered in she had actually wired Matthew of his mother's death. Rose lived in Kansas City until 1913 when she apparently moved away. Where did she go?

Rose had a brother, Leo Stewart, a local Kansas City undertaker, and a sister, Carrie Koogle. Stewart died in 1915 and Carrie Koogle died in Florida sometime in the forties. I spoke with Carrie Koogle's granddaughter who knew nothing of Matthew or Rose Porter. However, she did tell me that Carrie's husband abandoned the family. The last time he was listed in the city directory was 1899. My theory is that Porter and Koogle went off together, perhaps to locate another mine.

It's not like I have exhausted all possibilities on Porter but does anyone have any ideas on what I might try? I really don't want to spend another 12 years searching for this guy so all suggestions are appreciated.
