The delay in publication was the result of the process of review and evaluation carried out by the SABR board. The following guidelines were established:

The publication shall be coordinated through the Minor League Committee. The publication will be a special publication of the committee and will not be marketed as a SABR publication. Distribution will be carried out by the Minor League Committee. Each member should contribute to the Minor League History Journal along with considering submission of their work to the general SABR publications, Baseball Research Journal and the National Pastime. The Publications Director will contribute to the creation of the MLHJ withl editorial comments and direction. The cover of the MLHJ will be more "commercial" in nature. The Minor League History Journal was created in order to provide an expanded means for deseminating information and research on the history of the Minor Leagues. The MLHJ will continue to carry out this purpose.
