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Preface

I began collecting minor league home run statistics over fifty years ago. I was fascinated by players such as Joe Hauser, Buzz Arlett, Nick Cullop, Ollie Carnegie and Ab Wright. At the time there were no published career records for these players, and I became curious about their home run totals. I started to work on a few players, but that project quickly expanded to include many more sluggers. And that project led me to another: collecting data on hitters with four home runs in a game, which in turn snowballed into everything relating to minor league home runs.

Then one Christmas, in the early 1950s, my wife gave me a run (from 1920 through 1939) of *Spalding Guides* to complement the guides from later years that I already owned. That put my research into high gear. Sometime during the late 1960s, I began to correspond and exchange information with Bob Davids and Ray Nemec.

When SABR was founded, I really struck gold! Many SABR members have helped me over the years. There are four members who have been, by far, the biggest help to me: Bob Davids, Bob Hoie, Vern Luse and Ray Nemec.

Others who have helped me enormously include:

John Benesch, the expert on yearly minor league batting leaders. John supplied me with some of the information in the Yearly Home Run Leaders section, and he was kind enough to proofread that entire section.

Art Cantu, who a few years ago took on the mammoth task of compiling a year-by-year alphabetical list of every player whose name appeared in the league averages section of the yearly baseball guides. When I first heard about the project, I estimated that it would take about fifty years to complete. Art finished it in only a couple of years! This index is invaluable in searching for a player for a given year when you have no idea as to his club or even what league he appeared in.

Jerry Jackson and Lloyd Johnson have catalogued every minor league, and all the clubs in those leagues. *The Encyclopedia of Minor League Baseball* is the result of that research, and that work has proved to be an indispensable tool for me.

This work attempts to list every player with 150 or more minor league home runs. It's very easy to miss a few players. Jamie Selko has been a tremendous help in this regard; he discovered many players whom I had inadvertently overlooked.

Davis Barker is a SABR member with whom I have been corresponding for a number of years. Davis travels all over Texas (and that is a lot of travelling) to research ball players with a Texas connection. The HR-by-HR record of Moose Clabaugh, which appears here for the first time, is Davis' work. In the same vein, I would like to thank Stew Thornley for letting me publish his seminal home run log of Joe Hauser's 1933 season. I would also like to thank those others who have graciously let me publish their work in this section: Larry Gerlach and Carlos Bauer for their home run log of Tony Lazzeri; the anonymous compiler whose Bob Crues record appeared in the 1954 West Texas–New Mexico League Record Book; and, especially, statistician Bill Weiss who culled his league sheets to put together home run logs for Joe Bauman, Frosty Kennedy and Dick Stuart (with much new added data supplied by Larry Gerlach).

During the Nineteenth Century, averages were not published for many leagues, and many of the ones that did get published were very incomplete, usually omitting extra base hits. This state of affairs continued into the early part of the Twentieth Century. Ray Nemec and Vern Luse laboriously compiled league averages for many of these leagues. A few other people have compiled league averages. Included in this group are Carlos Bauer, Jack Dougherty, Bob Hoie, Reed Howard, Tony Kissel, Bill Plott, Eves Raja, Tim Rask, Bob Richardson, John Spalding, Dick Thompson and Bob Tiemann. There would be major gaps in my work without the final league averages produced by these men.

A Research tool that has been extremely useful to me over the years is a year-by-year list of every league that has its box scores in *Sporting Life* and *The Sporting News*. This information was compiled by Frank Phelps.

Other members who have been a big help are: Jack Carlson, Ray Gonzalez, Jim Holl, Joe Overfield, John Pardon, Pat Rock, Art Schott, and Frank Williams.

Introduction

Not all home run records are created equal. Several factors are involved in determining the number of home runs that a player may be able to hit during a season. This is, of course, true in both the majors and the minors; however, the factors are much more pronounced in the minors.

The length of the schedule, obviously, can have a great effect on a player's total. Most fans will remember the famous asterisk on Maris's record of 61 home runs. The American League had just gone from a 154 games schedule to a 162 games schedule. Commissioner Ford Frick reportedly told some people that an asterisk should be placed next to the record to denote that it was set while playing during a longer schedule than the one in which Babe Ruth played when he set his record. Back in the 1920s, the Pacific Coast League had a 200-or-more-game schedule. When Tony Lazzeri set his then O.B.-record 60 home runs, he appeared in 197 games. At various times, the International and Western Leagues played long schedules, although not nearly as long as the longest of the PCL. At the other end of the spectrum, the Longhorn League played a 140-game schedule the year Joe Bauman set the all-time record of 72 in 1954.

Climatic conditions, including elevation above sea level, are factors. The barrage of home runs at Coors Field and Mile High Stadium in Denver over the last couple of years readily come to mind. During Denver's long history in the minors, more than a few players took advantage of the "light air" in the Mile High City. A few other cities offered a similar advantage.

The size of the ballpark has, naturally, always been a big factor. Infamous Hughes Stadium in Sacramento has to be the most extreme example of this (see section "*Top Ten Home Runs Per Game by Clubs*" for the gory details on this park). Other hitters' parks have been Sulphur Dell in Nashville, Nicollet Park in Minneapolis and Oriole Park in Baltimore.

One factor not always easy to pin down is the "rabbit" in the ball. It is known that one league—and suspected in several others—was using a "juiced" baseball for a few years right after World War II. At the Winter Meetings following the 1948 season, the National Association ruled that all minor leagues must use a ball of "uniform resiliency." Therefore, it was not much of a coincidence that the Big State League had a 27% drop in home runs from 1948 to 1949, or that the West Texas-New Mexico League had a 23% fall.

The last factor is the level of competition. During the heyday of the minor leagues there were six (and for a short period, seven) classifications. The pitching was obviously better in AAA (and especially in the Open Classification PCL) than in class D.

In spite of all these factors, we are lumping all minor league home runs together. To do otherwise would make this work so complicated as to render it unintelligible.

The first professional baseball league was organized in 1871 and bore the name of National Association of Professional Baseball Players. This loosely run league operated for five years. Baseball historians are divided on whether to consider this league a "major league." Needless to say, it happened to be the only game in town.

The National League succeeded the National Association in 1876. This league has operated continuously ever since, and has been considered a major league from its inception.

The International Association was formed in 1877 to compete

with the National League. Several additional leagues were formed over the next few years. At the time, the various leagues were not designated as "major" or "minor." Historians—retroactively—designated the National League as a major league, and all the others as minor leagues.

The American Association was formed in 1882 and successfully challenged the National League. The Association operated for ten years as a major league. Two additional leagues, the Union Association of 1884 and the Player's League of 1890 also operated as major leagues during the Nineteenth Century.

The number of minor leagues increased considerably during the latter part of the Nineteenth Century. Many of them were signatories to the National Agreement. This was an agreement which gave almost complete domination over dealings with players to the major leagues. Some leagues chose to operate independently of the National Agreement. We have arbitrarily decided to recognize all well-organized leagues during the nineteenth century, whether or not they were signatories to the National Agreement.

The American League unilaterally declared itself a major league in 1901. This, in turn, set off a war with the National League. The National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues formed in the Fall of 1901. This organization was created to give the minor leagues some protection from the warring American and National Leagues. Most recognized minor leagues joined this organization for the start of the 1902 season. The National Association remains in existence to this day and works closely with the major leagues. Collectively, the major leagues and National Association members are known as Organized Baseball. In this work, we recognize every league that has ever been a member of the National Association.

Many independent leagues have operated since the National Association was established, including some that eventually joined the National Association. Most of the well-known independent leagues of the Twentieth Century are listed in the *Yearly Home Run Leader* section and are identified as being independent leagues. The statistics for these leagues, however, are not used for any other compilations in this work. The independent leagues include the following:

Several compilations in this work use *Home Run Average*. This statistic was designed to reflect the number of home runs that a player would hit if he played a reasonably full schedule in a league with a somewhat standard number of games in its schedule. For this purpose, 600 official at bats has been selected to represent a reasonably full schedule.

The formula is as follows:

$$\text{HR Avg} = \frac{600}{\text{AB}} \times \text{HR}$$

Thus, if a player has 500 official at bats, and hits 30 home runs, then his Home Run Average will be 36.00. In other words, we assume that if a player had played a full schedule of games, he would have hit 36 home runs.

The San Francisco Missions of the Pacific Coast League (1914, 1926–1937) are referred to only as Mission. Mission is a district in San Francisco. This is similar to the case of Hollywood which is a district in Los Angeles.

When a player appeared with two clubs in a league during a single season, it is denoted by use of a slash (/) between the names of the two clubs. For example, Troy/Albany. The use of a dash (-) between two names can denote one of three things:

The club represented two cities. An example might be that of Fargo-Moorhead.

The franchise shifted from one city to another during the course of the season. For example, Charleston-Macon in 1923.

The dash could also be a city with a hyphenated name such as Wilkes-Barre or Winston-Salem.

When compiling minor league statistics, you can never be sure that your data is complete. However, we feel that the information in this volume is as complete and as accurate as possible. There is one notable exception to all the data being complete – the case of the 1910 Southern Illinois League. This five club league folded on July 9 of its initial season. As in the case with most leagues that fold during the season, no official or unofficial averages were published. Ernie Calbert and Clarence “Big Boy” Kraft, two very good home run hitters, played in the league. Only one town in the league had a daily newspaper and very few boxscores appeared on its pages. In an attempt to get information on Calbert and Kraft, we checked the weekly newspapers in the other town in the league

as well as newspapers in Chicago and St. Louis, the nearest large cities. From brief game accounts, we determined that Calbert hit at least one home run and Kraft at least three.

The names used for leagues in the *Yearly Home Run Leader* section of the book require some explanation.

A number of leagues have been formed over the years and resurrected the name of a league that had previously ceased to exist. Many times these newly formed leagues have operated in an entirely different area. With a few exceptions, we have chosen to group all leagues with the same name under one listing. There are ten cases where we have subdivided the league listing in order to give a clearer picture of the territory in which the league operated. The States and Canadian Provinces are given for each subdivision. These leagues are as follows:

Some leagues changed their names during the period of their operation while maintaining the same general organization and, basically, the same territory. These leagues are listed under their most widely known names. These leagues are listed on the following page.

There were, of course, other leagues that formed as the result of mergers or reorganizations, but their ancestry is not as clear cut as the leagues listed above, and , therefore, each of these leagues is listed separately.

The histories of the Eastern League, International League, New York-Pennsylvania League, South Atlantic League, Western Association and Western League are a little complicated and require some explanation.

Leagues named International operated in 1898, 1900 and 1908. Collectively they are listed as *International League I* in the *Year by Year Home Run Leaders by Leagues* section. The Eastern League organized in 1884 and with the exception of 1888 through 1891 it operated continuously under that same name until 1911. The league changed its name in 1912 to International League and has operated to the present under that name. The league, from its inception in 1884, is listed as *International League II*. A league named New York-Pennsylvania formed in 1923 and operated under that name through the 1937 season. It changed its name in 1938 to Eastern League and has operated under that name to the present. Collectively, these leagues are listed as *Eastern League II*. The International and Eastern Leagues should not be confused with leagues called International Association and Eastern Association.

The New York-Pennsylvania League of 1923–1937 is mentioned above. Another league named New York-Pennsylvania League was organized in 1957 as a full season league. This league is listed as *New York-Pennsylvania League I*. In 1967, the league changed to a short (summer) season league and has operated to the present with a short schedule. It is listed as *New York-Pennsylvania II*.

The original South Atlantic League had a long history as a strong league. The league, usually called the Sally League, operated from 1904 through 1963 with several breaks. It changed its name in 1964 to Southern League while adding two clubs and losing two. Collectively, the original South Atlantic League and the Southern League are listed as *Southern League*. A new South Atlantic League was formed in 1980, adopting five cities from the Western Carolinas League that had gone out of business the previous season. This league is listed under its own name.

The Western Association and the Western League had a mixed history during the 19th Century, moving from one territory to another and switching names. All leagues named Western Association during the 19th Century are grouped together and listed as *Western Association I*. The Western Association of 1901 was an entirely different organization and operated in a new territory. It is listed as *Western Association II*. This league operated for only one year. A new Western Association was formed in 1905 as a successor to the Missouri Valley League of 1903–04 and it operated off and on in a five-state area through 1954. This league is listed as *Western Association III*.

Several leagues calling themselves Western League operated through 1893. They are grouped together and listed as *Western League I*. Ban Johnson took over a new Western League in 1894 and this fairly strong league operated through 1900. It changed its name to American League in 1900 and declared itself a major league in 1901. This league is listed as *Western League II*. When Johnson's league changed its name in 1900, a new league adopted the name Western League. This league operated through 1937 and is listed as *Western League III*. The Class D Nebraska State League changed its name in 1939 to Western League and operated under that banner until it disbanded following the 1941 season. This three-year operation of the Western League is included under the *Nebraska State League* listing. Yet another Western League was formed in 1947 and continued through the 1958 season. This league is listed as *Western League IV*.

The California League and the California State Leagues also need some explanation. Several leagues operated under the banner of California League during the 19th Century through 1896. They are listed as *California League I*. Another California League operated from 1898 through 1902 and then became the Pacific Coast League in 1903. It is listed as *California League II*. Several leagues called themselves California State League during the 19th Century. Collectively, they are listed as *California State League I*. A new California State League organized in 1903 and operated through 1915 with one break in 1911. This league was not a member of the National Association for most of that time period. It is listed as *California State League II*. Another league operated in 1929 for one season and is listed as *California State League III*. Finally, a California League was organized in 1941 and has operated continuously to the present, except when suspending operations during World War II. It is listed as *California League III*.

Four active leagues have become short-season leagues after many years as full-season leagues. Because of the schedule differences, these leagues are divided into separate entities. The leagues in question are: *Appalachian League I* (1911–1955) & *Appalachian League II* (1957–present); *New York-Pennsylvania League I* (1957–1966) & *New York-Pennsylvania League II* (1967–present); *Northwest League I* (1937–1965) & *Northwest League II* (1966–present); *Pioneer League I* (1939–1963) and *Pioneer League II* (1964–present).

Notes for the following table

- The *Minor* and *Major* columns indicate the total number of home runs the player hit in the minor leagues and major leagues.
- A dash “—” in the *Major* column indicates that the player did not play in the major leagues.
- The *Total* column is the total home runs hit in the major and minor leagues.
- The *Years* column includes years played in both the minors and majors.
- The *Bats* column indicates whether the player hit right-handed (R), left-handed (L) or was a switch-hitter (S).
- The *Led* column indicates the number of seasons a player led a league in home runs and includes years in which the player led the league in home runs or tied for the lead.
- The *20+*, *30+*, *40+* and *50+* columns show the number of seasons a player hit 20+, 30+, 40+, and 50+ home runs. The *20+* column includes years with thirty or more runs. Likewise, the *30+* column includes years with 40+ and 50+ home runs, etc. When a player appeared in more than one league during a year, his total home runs were used to determine if he had a 20+, 30+, 40+, 50+ or 60+ season.
- The *Notes* column include: Notations of 60+ home run years; years in which the player led all minor leagues in home runs (LM); four or more home runs in a game; career home runs in the Japanese Leagues (JL), Negro Leagues (NL) and pre-1955 Mexican League (ML).

Some Interesting Facts about the Top 100 Career Home Run Hitters

- Hector Espino became the career home run leader during the 1977 season and he continues to be the leader 32 years later. Buzz Arlett moved to the top of the list in 1933 and held the title for 44 years until passed by Espino.
- Thirteen of the players on the list hit all or most of their round trippers south of the border in the Mexican League. The Mexican League joined Organized Baseball in 1955 and all of the homers by the 13 players were hit after that time.
- You would think that virtually any player who is good enough to make the top 100 list would get at least one shot in the big leagues. That has not been the case. Forty-two of the players on the list never appeared in a major league game.
- Joe Bauman played for only nine years in the minor leagues. Although he slugged 337 home runs in those few years, he never managed to get a real shot in Triple A, let alone the majors.
- Twenty-two of the players on the list played all or most of their careers prior to World War II.
- Vince DiMaggio hit the most major league home runs of anyone on the list (125). He is followed by Willie Aikens (110), Luke Easter (93) and Joe Hauser with (80).
- Scott McClain hit 71 home runs in the Japanese Leagues in addition to his minor league total.
- Prince Oana won 80 games in the minors and 3 in the majors as a pitcher.

The Interesting Case of Pete Kousagan

Pete Kousagan holds the record for hitting home runs in the largest number of individual leagues. Pete was an outfielder-first baseman who hit 179 home runs in sixteen different leagues during an eleven-year minor league career. He began his career in 1941, and finished up in 1954. He spent three years in military service during World War II. His home run totals in each league are as follows:

Five players hit home runs in thirteen different leagues during the course of their careers. They are Larry Barton, Wilbur Davis, Jim Poole, Dutch Prather, and John Streza.

The most home runs hit by a player who spent his entire minor league career in one league is 230 by Max West in the Pacific Coast League. He is followed by Ray Rohwer with 196, also in the Pacific Coast League. Reg Rawlings rounds out the top three with 183 homers in the Blue Ridge League.

Top Career Home Run Hitters by League

Players usually do not stay in one league very long with today’s minor league setup. This, however, was not always the case. During the first half or so of the 20th Century, it was not uncommon for a player to spend many years in one league, especially in the higher minors. Thus, these players had the opportunity to rack up impressive career batting stats. Among today’s leagues, the Mexican League is the only one that retains that continuity of personnel. Players, mostly Mexican natives, tend to spend long careers in the league and have the opportunity to post impressive numbers.

This compilation is divided into two parts. The first lists the top fifteen career home run hitters for each of six leagues, four of which are still active. These leagues have had a long history as strong minor leagues and have produced players with good career home run totals. An argument could be made for including the Eastern League II in this group. However, the league never had a player with 100 career home runs.

The second part lists the top career home run hitter for many other leagues, along with other players who had significant totals in a given league.

There are only four players on this list who were primarily minor leaguers: Hector Espino, Nelson Barrera, Joe Hauser and Andres Mora. A list such as this, compiled prior to World War II, would have contained many more minor league players. Times change. There are few career minor league players anymore except in the Mexican League. Note that three of the four players mentioned above spent most of their careers in the Mexican League. Almost every minor league club is now a major league farm club. If a player can't cut it in a few years, he is let go to make room for a new prospect.

Ernie Banks, Mel Ott and Dave Winfield never played in the minor leagues. Hector Espino and Nelson Barrera never played in the major leagues.

Players with 100+ Career Home Runs in Both the Major and Minor Leagues

Seventy-nine players have hit at least 100 home runs in both the majors and the minors. The first player to accomplish this feat was Gavy Cravath in 1921. He was followed by Tilly Walker in 1928, Tony Lazzeri in 1933 and Rip Collins in 1936.

Dick Stuart is the only player to reach the 200 level in each category. The best balance is by Dick Gernert with 103 in the majors and 102 in the minors, and by Don Hurst with 115 in the majors and 114 in the minors. Willie McCovey has, by far, the most major league home runs of any player on the list with 521. He is followed by Carlos Delgado with 431 and Rocky Colavito with 374. Willie Aikens has the most minor league home runs with 276. He is followed closely by Vince DiMaggio with 273. Six players—Wally Berger, Cecil Fielder, Willie Horton, Derrek Lee, Dan Pasqua and George Selkirk—barely made the list, each with 100 in the minors.

Interesting Facts about 50+ Home Run Seasons

- First accomplished in 1924. Three players hit more than 50 home runs that season, including teammates Stormy Davis and Wilbur Davis (no relation) of Okmulgee of the Western Association.
- Accomplished by teammates Heriberto Vargas and Pedro Hernandez of Guanajuato in 1966 and by Bill McNulty and Gorman Thomas of Sacramento in 1974.
- Hitting 50 or more home runs has been accomplished on 55 occasions by 48 different players. Joe Bauman reached the milestone three times while Joe Hauser, Bob Crues, Pud Miller, Frank Gravino and Steve Bilko each reached it twice.
- Thirty-one of the players batted right-handed, sixteen batted left and one (Buzz Arlett) was a switch-hitter.
- Outfielders accomplished the feat twenty-seven times, twenty-one times by first baseman, twice by shortstops and once each by a second baseman (Jesse McClain), catcher (Pedro Hernandez) and a designated hitter (Nick Castaneda)
- The Pacific Coast League leads all leagues in achieving the mark with nine instances. Both the International League and West Texas-New Mexico League did it five times and it was done three times each in the American Association, Southern Association, Texas League, Longhorn League and Mexican Center League.
- Hitting fifty home runs has been accomplished nineteen times at the highest classification (at the time) of minor leagues.
- Ed Kallina reached the fifty mark while leading the West Texas League in 1929 with 44 home runs after having tied for the lead in the Lone Star League with six that same year. The Lone Star League folded early in the season of 1929.
- Manuel Salvatierra also hit fifty while playing in two leagues in 1950 and Pud Miller improved his total from 52 to 55 as the result of playing in a second league in 1949.
- Pud Miller's 52 home runs for Lamesa in 1949 was one more than the total for all his teammates combined.
- Joe Bauman hit 72 home runs for Roswell in 1954 and the rest of his team hit 71. His closest competition on the team was Jim Day with fourteen.
- Clarence "Big Boy" Kraft, Bud Heslet, Frank Gravino and Pedro Hernandez retired from professional baseball following their fifty home run seasons.
- Dick Stuart hit 40 of his 66 home runs for Lincoln of the Western League in 1956 in just two months, June (23) and July (17). Stuart's 23 home runs in June were the most ever hit in one month in the entire history of Organized Baseball.
- The following players hit 50 or more home runs yet did not lead their respective leagues in home runs:

- Joe Bauman reached the fifty home run mark in three consecutive years. Bob Crues, Frank Gravino and Steve Bilko each did it two years in a row.
- Six different leagues had at least one player with fifty home runs in 1956.
- 1947 and 1956 had the most players reaching fifty home runs in a single season with seven.

- Twenty of the forty-eight players on the list never played in the major leagues. Eight others on the list reached the majors but did not manage to hit a big-league home run.
- For those who did reach the majors, Gorman Thomas had the most home runs in a major league season with 45 in 1979. Dick Stuart hit 42 in 1963. Hank Sauer hit 41 in 1954. Leon Wagner had 37 in 1962. Ron Kittle homered 35 times in 1983. Joe Hauser hit 27 in 1924 and Chuck Workman knocked out 25 homers in 1945.
- The best major league career totals were by:

- The sixty home run mark has been reached only ten times in the minor leagues.
- Fourteen of the players on the list had minor league career total of 300 homers or more. Buzz Arlett heads the list with 432. He is followed by Nick Cullop with 420 and Joe Hauser with 399.
- On the flip side, Pedro Hernandez had only 71 career home runs in the minors. Ed Kallina had a mere 80, and Cal Felix hit 97. None of these players ever reached the major leagues. Hernandez is the real mystery man. He played only two years and then dropped completely out of sight after his big year in 1966.
- Pat Wright and Jesse McClain each hit nineteen home runs in their second best season. Fifteen additional players hit fewer than thirty home runs in their second best season.
- An obituary for Frosty Kennedy stated that he waited until his last at bat of the 1956 season to reach the magic 60 home run mark. This makes a great story, however, it didn't quite happen like that. He did wait until his last game (September 6 at San Angelo) but he connected in the third inning. He came to the plate three more times in the game. He was the leadoff batter for Plainview in that game. Obviously, the manager wanted to give him as many opportunities as possible in his final game of the season to reach the sixty home run mark.

Perry Werden hit 45 home runs for Minneapolis in the Western League in 1895. This was an unheard of total for that time. Thirty-seven of his home runs came at his home park. Stew Thornley, the expert on ballparks in Minneapolis, estimates that both foul lines only measured about 250 feet at Athletic Park.

Jack Graham of the San Diego Padres, who led the Pacific Coast League in home runs in 1948 with 48, had 46 home runs when he was beamed by Red Adams of the Los Angeles Angels in the second game of a July 25 doubleheader at Wrigley Field. With two months left on the schedule, Graham had had an excellent chance to better Tony Lazzeri's league record of sixty. Even though the Padres rushed Graham back into the lineup a month later, he was only able to hit two more homers the rest of the season.

Notes

- Joe Bauman’s home run average of 58.39 is nothing short of amazing. For every 600 at bats during his career, he hit more than 58 home runs. To put it in another perspective, if we compress Joe Bauman’s 3,463 at bats into about six full seasons, he would have averaged more than 58 home runs per year. And he outdistanced his next rival on the list by an average of nearly ten home runs.
- Dick Stuart, the number two hitter on the list, is somewhat of a surprise. Stuart does not readily come to mind when thinking of great minor league home run hitters, though he did have that great 1956 season.
- Although the era of great home run hitting in the minors ended more than thirty years ago, there are several fairly recent players that made the list. Steve Balboni, Willie Aikens and Nick Castaneda all played in the 1990s; while Willie Darkis, Randy Bass and Roger Freed played as recently as the 1980s.
- For comparison, the major league list is headed up by, of course, Babe Ruth with an average of slightly more than 51. And seven other players (200 HR minimum) have reached the 40 mark.

- Joe Bauman made the list four times. Joe Hauser is on the list three times and Frank Gravino, Ron Kittle and Pud Miller each made it twice.
- Tony Lazzeri is the only player with sixty or more homers in a season who didn't make the list. He had 60 home runs in 710 at bats in 1925 for a HR Avg of 50.70.
- Bob Seeds started the 1938 season with Newark in the strong International League and hit 28 home runs, two short of qualifying for this list. He played in 59 games and had 230 at bats to give him a HR Avg of 73.04. Newark was the top farm club of the New York Yankees and the Yankees were loaded with good hitters so they sold Seeds to the New York Giants in June.
- Alex Cabrera, playing for El Paso of the Texas League, went on a tear early in the 2000 season. He hit 35 home runs in only 212 at bats for an amazing 99.06 HR Avg. His home run total was good enough to lead the league. Cabrera started the season with Tucson of the Pacific Coast League and was demoted to El Paso at the end of April. In 53 games with El Paso, he hit .382 and had 82 runs batted in to go with his 35 homers. During a six game stretch from May 9 through May 14, he was 16 for 27 with nine home runs, twelve runs, twenty runs batted in and a batting average of .593. He had at least two hits and a homer in each of the six games. During one period during the spree he hit five home runs in six at bats.

He was brought up to the Arizona Diamondbacks in late June and it appeared that he was going to tear National League pitching apart. His first at bat came as a pinch-hitter on June 26 and he hit a homer run. He received a start the next day and tripled in his first at bat of the game making him only the second player in major league history to hit a homer and a triple in his first two at bats. After one week, Alex was hitting .571 with four homers and thirteen runs batted in. He was injured in early July and spent two weeks on the disabled list. After a two game rehabilitation assignment in the Arizona Rookie League, he returned to the Diamondbacks lineup. Shortly thereafter, he went into a slump. After going 2 for 22, he was sent to Tucson. A week later he returned to the Diamondbacks where he finished the season. He hit five home runs while with Arizona. Adding his totals for the Pacific Coast and Arizona Rookie Leagues drops his minor league season HR Avg to 79.32.

Cabrera started his minor league career in 1991 and played in seven different leagues prior to 1999 without showing any great home run power. He spent the 1999 season playing in Taiwan. Arizona sold him to Seibu of the Japan Central League in December of 2000. He played for Seibu in 2001 and we have no record of him playing anywhere after that.

- The Cordele club of the Georgia-Florida League hit one home run in 1952. Ralph Betcher drove one out in the club's 73rd game. Cordele played in 139 games with 4,679 official at bats. The eight-club league hit a total of 186 home runs—therefore, somebody must've been hittin'em!
- Ed Konetchy hit 41 home runs at age 40. His big year came in 1925 while playing for Fort Worth in the Texas League.
- Bill Serena was the talk of the minor league world in 1947 when clubbed 57 home runs (in only 137 games) for Lubbock of the West Texas-New Mexico League. That would have been enough of a season for anyone, but Serena didn't stop there. He went on to hit another thirteen round-trippers in ten playoff games, leading Lubbock to the league championship.
- Lou Limmer hit 29 home runs for St. Paul in the American Association in 1950, with only one of them coming at his home field, Lexington Park. The park measured 365 feet down the right field line. Limmer's lone blast at home came on August 10th, and traveled some 400 feet.
- Amazingly, in the dead ball era of 1895, a pitcher by the name of Chick Fraser (Minneapolis, Western League) hit fifteen home runs.
- Batters only racked up only 58 home runs in the 1906 Pacific Coast League (the year of the earthquake), but eleven of them were hit by pitchers, including three by San Francisco hurler Nick Williams, and two by Benny Henderson of Portland. Both were always considered good-hitting pitchers. In fact, Berkeley graduate Nick Williams became a catcher later on when his arm gave out. He also discovered the Waner brothers . . .but that's another story. . . .
- When Bud Heslet set the season home record for the California League in 1956 with 51, he never hit more than one in any game.
- Clarence "Big Boy" Kraft had nine two-home run games for Fort Worth in the Texas League in 1924 when he 55 HR.
- Rip Repulski of Columbus hit only nine home runs in 1951, but homered in all eight American Association parks. Box scores in *The Sporting News* gave both players 23 homers. After much debate it was decided to use the official figures of 22.
- Winnipeg of the Northern League had eleven grand slam home runs in 1958. Bobby Moegle and Jim Schaffer led the way with three each.
- Frank Roth is credited in several publications with 36 home runs in 1901 while playing for Evansville in the Three I League. This was the top figure that year for all minor leagues. A careful check of all box scores and game stories revealed that his correct total was only 27. This was still the top total for the minors.
- When Bob Crues tied the minor league record of 69 home runs in 1948, he added a couple more during the playoffs. The fences at Gold Sox Park in Amarillo that year measured 324 feet down both foul lines, and a short 360 to dead center.
- Ike Boone hit 55 home runs for the San Francisco Mission of the Pacific Coast League in 1929, and his brother, Dan, hit 46 for High Point of the Piedmont League. This total of 101 is the highest for two brothers in the same year.
- In 1907, Walter "Rosy" Carlisle of the Los Angeles Angels of the Pacific Coast League hit 10 of his league-leading thirteen home runs at Rec Park in San Francisco, which included the first three-home run game in Coast League history on August 18th. He only hit 2 home runs at home at Chutes Park, and another at Portland's Vaughn Street Grounds.
- Carl Sawatski of the Nashville club set a Southern Association record with five grand slam home runs during the 1949 season, and, to top it off, added another one during the Dixie Series against Tulsa.
- Jack Harshman hit six grand slam home runs for Nashville in 1951 to break the Southern Association record of five, which had been set only two years earlier by Carl Sawatski, who also played for Nashville.

Home Runs in a Single Season (cont.)

- Chuck Weatherspoon of Wilson in the Carolina League hit seven grand slam home runs in 1961. Two of them came in one game on May 2nd.
- Indianapolis of the American Association had thirteen grand slam home runs in 1995. Number eleven came on July 26th, but the club only managed to hit two more the rest of the way. Steve Gibraltar hit three, and Dave McCarty and Chad Mottola hit two apiece.
- Ray Perry won his seventh consecutive home run title in 1954. His streak started with the Far West League from 1948 through 1951, then the Cotton States League in 1952 and the California League for the final two years. The seven titles tie him with Bunny Brief. Butch Nieman had previously held the consecutive record with five (through 1951).
- Phoenix of the Pacific Coast League hit home runs in 42 consecutive home games during the 1959 season. George Brunet of Portland stopped the streak on July 22nd when he allowed only five singles.
- The official averages of for the 1920 International League credit Frank Brower and Mike Konnick, both playing for Reading, with 22 home runs to tie for the league lead. Joe Herring, a baseball researcher from Reading, has discovered that both Brower and Konnick hit 23 homers. These figures have been verified by a second source. It is amazing that errors were made on the leading home run hitters and that with the corrections they are still tied for the leadership.
- Adam Dunn hit 51 home runs in 2001, including nineteen for the Cincinnati Reds. He hit twelve for Chattanooga of the Southern League and twenty for Louisville of the International League before moving up to the majors. He was the second player to reach double digits in the majors and two minor leagues during a single season. Erubiel Durazo hit eleven for the Arizona Diamondbacks, fourteen for El Paso of the Texas League and ten for Tucson of the Pacific Coast League in 1999. Dunn was 21 years old at the end of the season. That made him the second youngest player to hit fifty home runs in professional ball during a single season. Calvin Felix was four days younger (assuming that the season ended on the same day for both) when he hit 52 in the 1947 Sunset League.
- Indianapolis of the American Association hit thirteen grand slam home runs in 1995. This may be a minor league record. Steve Gibraltar led the team with three followed by Dave McCarty and Chad Mottola with two apiece. Jerry Brooks, Brian Dorsett, Keith Gordon, Brian Hunter, Keith Mitchell and Craig Worthington each hit one.

The 200 home run mark has been reached nine times by clubs in the Pacific Coast League, but only two times in the pre-1958 National League invasion of the territory. Interestingly, only one coastal team, Los Angeles, is on the list. Two of the PCL clubs on the list, Omaha and Arkansas, are half way across the country.

The defunct West Texas-New Mexico League had clubs reach the mark six times, five of them by Amarillo. The Minneapolis club is on the list four times while playing in hitter friendly Nicollet Park. Baltimore surpassed the 200 mark three times over a six year period (1930-1936) while playing in another hitter friendly park, Oriole Park.

The 1947 season was the biggest year ever, with seven clubs racking up more than 200 homers apiece. The second biggest year was 1956 when five clubs did it. Surprisingly, only two Mexican League clubs are on the list despite the high totals achieved by individual batters in recent seasons.

The top team on the list, Sacramento, returned to the Pacific Coast League in 1974 after an absence of fourteen years. The club had to scramble to obtain a playing field and Hughes Stadium was selected. Hughes had been built in 1928 as a track and football stadium. When the baseball field was laid out, right field measured a reasonable 330 feet down the line. However, left field turned out to be an absurdly short 232 feet down the line. In an attempt to cut down on cheap home runs, a 40-foot screen was erected from the left field foul pole to the power alley in left-centerfield. Nevertheless, it still took little more than a pop fly to clear the left field fence.

Sacramento hit 305 home runs that season and 250 of them were hit at Hughes. Visiting batters chipped in with another 241 for a grand total of 491 homers at Hughes Stadium. On two occasions, fourteen home runs were hit in a game. Right-handed hitting Bill McNulty led the league that season with 55 homers, 44 of which were hit at home. He was followed by teammate Gorman Thomas with 51 home runs.

The Pacific Coast League appears on the list thirteen times. It has made the list in eight out of the past ten seasons. The International League and the American Association are distant runner-ups with seven and six appearances on the list, respectively.

32 percent of the occurrences on the list have been during the past ten seasons (1999–2008).

Only two leagues on the list, the 1924 Western League and the 1936 Northern League, played prior to World War II.

Home Runs in One Inning

Buffalo hit five home runs in the second inning of an International League game against Albany on May 15, 1934. Butch Meyers hit the first one with a man on base. Then, with two outs, Greg Mulleavy, Les Mallon, Jack Smith and Bill Regan hit consecutive homers. It is interesting to note that these five batters accounted for only 36 home runs the entire season.

Ellis Burton clubbed switch-hit home runs in the eighth inning of the opening game, on May 3rd of the 1961 International League season. Playing for Toronto, Burton hit a two-run homer while batting left handed against visiting Jersey City. He came up for a second time in the inning with the bases loaded and connected from the right side for a grand slam. This was the first known time that a batter ever hit homers from both sides of the plate in an inning during a minor league game.

Gary Pellant of Alexandria in the Carolina League hit switch-hit home runs in the seventh inning of a game on April 30, 1979, against visiting Salem. Batting right-handed, Pellant hit a leadoff homer. He then came up later in the inning with a man on and clubbed one from the left side of the plate.

Dwayne Hosey, playing for Pawtucket of the International League, hit home runs from each side of the plate in the third inning of a game against Ottawa on August 10, 1996. This was the first game of a double header. One of the homers was a grand slam and the other was a two-run homer, giving Hosey six runs batted in for the inning. He also connected for another home run later in the game.

Omaha of the American Association hit four consecutive home runs against Oklahoma City on May 7, 1993. With two outs in the bottom of the eighth, Karl Rhodes, Terry Shumpert, Russ McGinnis and Bob Hamelin rocked Gerald Alexander.

Oscar Vitt and Paul Strand of Salt Lake City each hit two home runs in the third inning of a home game against the Vernon Tigers on May 13, 1923. This was the first game of a Pacific Coast League double header. Salt Lake City scored twelve runs in the inning.

Roy Peeler and Len Cross of Knoxville in the Tri-State League each hit two home runs in the fifth inning of a game on August 14, 1947. Knoxville scored ten runs in the game against Reidsville. Interestingly, Peeler was a pitcher.

For only the third time in minor league history, teammates each hit two home runs in the same inning. Alex Ochoa and Brent Miller of the Bowie club in the Eastern League each connected in the fourth inning as Bowie rolled up fourteen runs against Harrisburg on the way to a 28–10 win. The game was played at Shipley Field at the University of Maryland on June 5, 1994. This field, with its short fences, was being used temporarily by the Bowie Baysox.

Three players have hit two grand slam home runs in an inning. Ken Myers was the first, hitting his pair in the third inning of a game on May 2, 1947, while playing for Las Vegas of the Sunset League. Armando Flores, of Laredo in the Gulf Coast League, did

it in the eighth inning of a June 25, 1952, game. Lance Junker of Redwood in the California League hit two in the ninth inning, on June 30, 1983, his first two home runs of the season.

Frank Shofner and Jerry Witte of Houston hit back-to-back home runs in the fifth inning and then repeated the feat in the sixth inning of a May 12, 1951, game. This was a Texas League game played at Tulsa.

Brothers Kitty and Roy Brashear of the Vernon Tigers hit back-to-back home runs in the first inning of a Pacific Coast League game on August 3, 1910, at Chutes Park in Los Angeles. What makes this feat even more unusual is that neither brother was much of a home run hitter. While both had long minor league careers, Kitty only hit 36 career home runs and Roy hit 69.

In the first game of a doubleheader at Tulsa on July 1, 1923, the first four batters of the game for Wichita (Western League) hit home runs. The batters were Lyman Smith, Jocko Conlon, Wes Griffin and Jim Blakesley. Wichita did not score any additional runs in the inning, but those four home runs were the margin of victory in their 11–7 win. Karl Black was the starting pitcher for Tulsa, and the manager yanked him after the fourth homer. Black really wasn't as bad a pitcher as that game indicated. He wound up the season with 29 wins, enough to lead the league in the category. Black's real name was Lautenschlager.

On May 28, 1921, Frank Schulte, Arthur Smith and Jewel Ens of Syracuse (International League) hit three consecutive pitches from Reading's Dean Barnhardt for home runs. This is the first known time that this feat has been accomplished. Since then, however, it has been duplicated several times. In a Pacific Coast League game on August 8th, 1952, three successive batters hit home runs off three successive pitches by Fred Sanford of Portland. The batters were Tookie Gilbert, Sam Chapman and Piper Davis. All connected in the first inning. The feat was performed twice in 1946. In the fifth inning of a game at Sulphur Dell in Nashville on July 8th, Pete Thomassie, Cy Block and Bill Manning hit three consecutive pitches off Bob Raney of Little Rock for home runs. The first three pitches thrown by Stan Knet of Eau Claire (Northern League) in the sixth inning of an August 23, 1946, game were hit over the leftfield fence. Hal Schadt, Ed Gittens and Tony Jaros of St. Cloud did the damage. On the fourth pitch of the inning, Bruts Welsch singled.

Will Clark, playing for Fresno in the California League, hit a home run on June 21, 1985, in his first at bat in the minor leagues. Clark also hit a home run on his first at bat in the majors. That occurred on April 8, 1986, and came off Hall of Fame pitcher Nolan Ryan.

Pitcher Touchstone of Greenville (Carolina Association) hit a home run in the sixteenth inning of an August 4, 1908, game, defeating Greensboro, 1–0.

Pitcher Bunny Hearn of Springfield (Three I League) hit two solo home runs in the seventh inning of a game against Danville on August 28, 1912. Hearn also hit a home run in the first inning.

In the seventh inning of a home game against Omaha on August 9, 1952, Bill Pinckard of Denver (Western League) hit a long drive to left field. Dick Cordell made a frantic grab for the ball as he crashed into the fence. The ball bounced out of his glove, hit the wall, rebounded, and caromed off his head and over the fence. After a lengthy dispute, the umpires ruled that it was a home run. This gave Denver a 1–0 win.

In 1962, Jackie Warner, a nineteen-year-old youngster playing for San Jose of the California League, hit home runs in his first two at bats in organized baseball.

Bernard Lake of Sanford (Florida State League) pitched a nineteen-inning shutout against the DeLand club on July 19, 1947. He hit a home run in the last inning to win his own game.

Roger Haines of Richmond (Blue Grass League) was reported to have hit two grand slam home runs in the seventh inning of a game against Mt. Sterling, on July 1, 1912. This feat was reported in *Sporting Life* and in the *Louisville Courier Journal*. However, Richmond scored only ten runs in the inning. A minimum of eleven runs must be scored in an inning in order for one batter to hit two grand slams. Scratch him from the list!

Las Vegas of the Sunset League hit three grand slam homers in the third inning of a game on May 2, 1947, on the way to rolling up sixteen runs. As mentioned above, Ken Myers hit two of them. Pitcher Ned Klingensmith hit the third.

Steve Prihoda of Wichita (Texas League) may have set a minor league record by giving up five home runs in one inning of a home game against San Antonio on August 19, 1998. While a number of teams have hit five home runs in one inning, none are known to have hit them all off of one pitcher. Prihoda entered a scoreless game in the 11th inning. He quickly loaded the bases to set up a grand slam by Angel Pena. Pena later hit a solo home run as San Antonio pushed across twelve runs in the inning.

Indianapolis hit four home runs during a ten run fifth inning in an International League game at Pawtucket on May 20, 1998. That, in itself, is not rare in the minor leagues. However, the ten runs were the result of a one-run homer, a two-run homer, a three-run homer and a grand slam. This is probably a first. The sequence was as follows: Pete Rose, Jr. hit a solo homer, Jason Williams hit a three-run shot, Glenn Murray hit a grand slam and Guillermo Garcia hit a two-run homer. The big inning gave Indianapolis a 10–4 lead.

Joe Pignatano of Fort Worth (Texas League) had an unusual experience in a game at Shreveport on May 29, 1955. Batting in the seventh spot of the batting order, he hit a homer in the second inning. Unfortunately, the lineup card had him hitting eighth. Shreveport appealed and the proper batter, Maury Wills, was called out. Pignatano then batted in his proper slot and hit another ball over the fence at about the same spot.

Albany of the Georgia-Florida League scored six runs on three consecutive pitches in a game at Moultrie on July 23, 1952. Denver Rikard belted a grand slam. On the next two pitches, Bob Murphy and Ron Plaza connected for homers.

Joe Carolan, a 21-year old youngster from Detroit, bought a ticket to a ballgame at Columbus, Georgia (Sally League), on

April 24, 1954. He then obtained a scorecard to learn the name of the general manager of the club whom Carolan then asked for a tryout. When field manager George Kissell saw the 230 pounder send drives out of the park, he offered him a contract and put him in the starting lineup. Carolan came to bat for the first time in the second inning with the bases loaded and hit a grand slam off Calvin Howe of Macon to put Albany in the lead, 4–3. Carolan would go on to hit .231 in 33 games with four home runs.

Modesto hit five home runs in the second inning of a California League game against Visalia on June 26, 1954. Gus Suhr, Jr. son of the former major league first baseman, hit two of them. Ed Fairman, Frank Kerr and Herman Reich hit consecutive homers. Jerry Crosby had already hit a home run in the first inning to give Modesto a total of six through the first two innings of the game. Modesto won the game 13–0 as Al Ibanez threw a one-hitter.

Elmo Plaskett of Las Vegas knocked the ball out of the park in the second inning of a California League game at Fresno on August 10, 1958. After circling the bases, he realized he had not touched first base. He then made another trip around the bases. A new ball was put in play and pitcher Tom Fitzgerald took his stance on the mound and then threw to first base. Fresno appealed to the umpire and Plaskett was called out. Umpire Joe Fluery pointed out that the batter was required to circle the bases in reverse order in this situation.

Denver hit four home runs in an American Association game versus Louisville on June 27, 1960. After the first two batters were retired in the first inning, Steve Boros, Jim McDaniel, Larry Osborne and Ozzie Virgil blasted home runs. Later in the game, Denver batters collected three more home runs. Louisville knocked out three of their own to make a total of ten home runs in the game.

Joe Abernethy, Newton-Conover's playing manager, hit a high fly to rightfield in a game against Belmont (Western Carolina League) on June 7, 1961. Young Eddie Montellanico camped under the ball then lost it in the park lights. The ball hit him on top of his head and bounced over the fence for a home run. Eddie was knocked unconscious briefly but stayed in the game.

Chad Moeller of Salt Lake City (Pacific Coast League) hit two home runs in the sixth inning of a game against Oklahoma on June 12, 2000. This was the second time that Moeller had accomplished the feat. He first turned the trick on May 23, 1998 while playing for Fort Myers against Daytona in a Florida State League game.

Twin brothers Oreste and Vilato Marrero of Helena (Pioneer League) each hit a homer in the second inning of a game against Billings on June 25, 1987. This is believed to be a first for twins.

Ernie Lombardi has been reported to have hit two grand slams in an inning while playing for Ogden of the Pioneer League in 1927. A check of the entire season determined that this never happened. Ernie hit only four home runs all season.

Ron Carlyle of Oakland in the Pacific Coast League hit a ball which was reported to have traveled 618 feet. It went over the clubhouse at Emeryville Park in Oakland. This was a July 4 game in 1929. The pitcher for Mission was Ernie Nevers, the great football player.

Three Shots of Rye

In the most explosive inning by any hitter in the history of Organized Baseball, Gene “Half-Pint” Rye, playing for Waco in the Texas League, hit three home runs in the eighth inning of a contest on August 6, 1930. Most players spend their entire careers without even getting to bat three times in an inning. The odds are staggeringly against any player getting three hits in an inning, let alone three homers. In fact, only four major leaguers have managed to get three hits in an inning, and none, of course, hit three home runs.

The big fireworks display occurred during a night game at Katy Park in Waco against rival Beaumont. Waco scored eighteen runs in the big inning to turn a close game into a rout, ending up with a winning margin of 22 to 4. With Jerry Mallett on the mound for Beaumont, Rye led off the eighth inning and gave an indication of things to come when he drove the ball over the right field fence, but the ball curved foul by a couple of feet. Rye then stepped back in and hit one over the left field fence. Half-Pint came up for the second time in the inning with two men on base. By that time, Walter Newman was on the mound, having relieved Mallett. Rye stepped into one of Newman’s offerings and the ball sailed out over the right field fence. Poor Walt Newman was still in there when Rye came to bat for the third time that inning. This time the bases were full, so Newman was really under pressure to get something over the plate. One of the pitches was to the batter’s liking, and Rye slammed another one over the rightfield fence. Rye was not the only Waco player to have hit a homer that inning. Tony Piet and Charley Stuvengen also connected in the eighth.

When the dust cleared, Rye had set four Organized Baseball records for one inning: Most total bases (12); most extra bases on long hits (9); most runs batted in (8); and most home runs (3). Only the 8-RBI mark has been equaled during the following seventy-eight years.

Rye had a single earlier in the game, which gave him four hits in six at bats for the evening. He had no hand in his team’s scoring other than during that one big inning.

The left-hand hitting Rye, whose real name was Eugene Randolph Mercantelli, garnered 26 home runs and drove in 92 runs over the course of the 1930 season. If one looks at his amazing inning on a percentage basis, an incredible twelve percent of his home run output and nine percent of his RBI output was produced in one single inning!

Rye began his Organized Baseball career with Waterloo in the Mississippi Valley League in 1925. Prior to that, he played some semipro ball in and around Chicago. After breaking in with Waterloo, he had stops at Rock Island, Cedar Rapids and Winston-Salem before showing up in Waco in 1929. His 26 home runs for Waco in 1930 were the most he hit in any one year in his career. The Boston Red Sox purchased Rye from Waco for delivery in 1931. Rye got injured early in the spring, which limited his playing with the Red Sox to 17 games. In those 17 games, he had a lowly .179 batting average and failed to hit a home run.

The Red Sox shipped him back to the minors later that season, to Galveston of the Texas League, and he never made it back for another try in the majors.

From Galveston, Rye went on to Houston (Texas League), Elmira (New York-Penn) and Davenport in the Western League, where he finished his professional career with 101 career home runs. That was not the end of Half-Pint, though, as he continued playing semipro ball in the tough Chicago leagues for a number of years thereafter.

Home Runs in One Game

Phoenix set a Pacific Coast League record by hitting ten home runs in the second game of a doubleheader on July 6, 1974. The game was played at bandbox Hughes Stadium in Sacramento. Sacramento added three homers to tie the league record for most home runs in a game by both teams. The record had been set just a month earlier by Sacramento and Spokane in the same park. The record didn't last very long, however. Sacramento and Tacoma each hit seven on August 6th for a total of fourteen. This mark was tied on August 20th when Sacramento hit nine home runs and Spokane added five home runs. *See details of the Sacramento park in the section on season home runs.*

Oreste and Vilato Marrero, twin brothers, each hit a home run in the same game on two occasions. The first time was in 1988 while playing for Helena in the Pioneer League. The second time came when both were with Beloit of the Midwest League during the 1990 season. Both of the homers came in the same inning and gave Beloit a 2–1 victory over Cedar Rapids.

In a Sunset League game at Las Vegas on May 2, 1947, the home team scored thirty runs against the visiting Ontario club. Olin Kelly began things for Las Vegas with a leadoff homer in the first inning. The club scored sixteen runs in the third inning, with twelve of those runs coming on three grand slams, two by Ken Myers and one by Pitcher Ned Klingensmith. Myers added two more homers in the game, Klingensmith added one more, Cal Felix chipped in with two and Sy Gregory hit one to give Las Vegas a total of ten home runs for the game.

Kansas City set an American Association record by hitting ten home runs in one game on June 29, 1952. It was the first game of a doubleheader played in St. Paul. Six of the homers came in the third inning, including four in succession.

Phil Alotta and Vince Pascale each hit four home runs in a Sunset League game against Ontario on June 1, 1947. Tom Lloyd added three more homers and Jim Boulanger hit one to give Reno a grand total of twelve home runs for the game. Ontario chipped in with four homers to give the two clubs a total of sixteen home runs in the game.

Albuquerque of the West Texas-New Mexico League hit twelve home runs against Lamesa on June 30, 1948. Len Attyd hit four. Will Dixon, Ron Bowan and Les Mulcahy each had two and Frank Shone and Len Pill had one apiece.

Douglas of the Arizona-Mexico League hit nine home runs in a game against Chihuahua on August 19, 1958. This, of course, is not a record, but the club did set a record that may be equaled but never broken. Each of the nine players in the line up connected for a homer. The game was called due to darkness in the eighth.

The first player known to have hit two grand slam home runs in a game was Dan Gunshannon of the Bristol club in the old Connecticut State League. On May 26, 1897, he hit balls over the center field fence in the first and third innings. Pitcher Parson Clune of Bridgewater settled down after that but Bristol still held on to win the game 8 to 5.

John Cantley, the pitcher for Opelika of the Georgia-Alabama League, has been credited in several publications with hitting three grand slam home runs in a game. The game in question took place at Opelika on June 5, 1914, and the opponent was Talladega. The original source for the information was the *Talladega Daily Home*. Opelika won the game 19–1. The line score credits Opelika with seven runs in the first, seven in the second, one in the fourth, two in the seventh and two in the eighth. If the line score is to be believed, then Cantley could not have hit three grand slams.

Ed Kneuper and Les Witherspoon of Texas City (Big State League) hit back-to-back home runs in two consecutive innings, the 8th and 9th. The game was on May 31, 1955, at Corpus Christi.

Three Quincy (Three Eye League) players performed the rare feat of hitting back-to-back-to-back home runs twice in the same game. Jack Killoren, Wayne Cummings and Spike Wyatt belted consecutive homers during a seven-run first inning. They repeated in the fourth as Quincy scored eight more runs. To add to the fun in the fourth, pitcher Bill Banker followed Wyatt with a home run to give the team four consecutive homers. Needless to say, Quincy won the game, 20–1, over Peoria.

It is not rare for a player to hit two grand slams in a game. However, it is unusual for it to occur twice in one day. On August 1, 1955, Bill Dennis of Lawton (Sooner State League) did so against Ardmore while Bob Quinn of Pulaski (Appalachian League) hit his pair against Johnson City.

Kearney of the Nebraska State League produced three grand slams on July 30, 1956, against Holdrege. Jay Ward hit two of them and Deron Johnson slammed the third as Kearney won the game, 20–1. Pitcher Hal Reniff had a no-hitter going into the ninth inning but it was spoiled with a homer by Tom Plath.

Los Angeles broke one Pacific Coast League record and tied another when they blasted Sacramento, 22–5, in a home game on June 22, 1957. The team set a record with five home runs in one inning. Bert Hamric hit two of them and Bobby Dolan, Steve Bilko and Jim Baxes had one apiece. Hamric hit one earlier in the game as sis Jim Fridley, Sparky Anderson and Tom Saffell. The nine home runs in a game tied the mark set by Vernon in 1923. It is interesting that starting pitcher Roger Osenbaugh was not pulled from the game until all 22 runs had been scored.

The Mexico City Reds and the Poza Rica Oilers set a Mexican League record with twelve home runs in the first game of a doubleheader at Merino Park in Poza Rica on June 15, 1960. The Reds hit seven of the round-trippers while winning the slugfest, 16–11. Four of the Oilers homers came in one inning including two by Also Salvant.

Steve Manning of Holyoke (Eastern Association) hit home runs in three consecutive innings off three different Bridgeport pitchers on June 2, 1912. While this has been accomplished a number of times in more recent years, it is probably a first for the Deadball Era.

Eric Hinske and Marcel Longmire of Williamsport hit back-to-back home runs in the second inning and then repeated in the third inning of a game on June 28, 1998. This was a home game against Watertown (New York-Pennsylvania League).

Buzz Arlett was one of the great minor league sluggers. For many years he held the career home run record with 432. Yet, he started his career in 1918 with Oakland of the Pacific Coast League as a pitcher. On June 23, the Oakland club found itself short of pitchers, and Buzz was called on to pitch both games of a doubleheader at Los Angeles. He won the first game, 1–0, allowing only four hits. He lost the second game, 3–2, giving up nine hits. Both were nine inning games. A little over a week later, on July 3rd at San Francisco, he pitched a three-hitter and won, 2–0. The two Oakland runs were the result of a two-run homer in the ninth by Arlett.

On Opening Day (May 4th) of the 1952 Northern League season, Aberdeen blasted twelve home runs and Fargo-Moorhead added three. The twelve by Aberdeen tied the known record set by Reno of the Sunset League on June 1, 1947. The fifteen by both clubs is one short of the sixteen hit by Reno and Ontario in the above 1947 game. The game was played at Redfield, South Dakota because the Aberdeen field was not quite ready for play. Although the fences at Redfield were 300 feet down the foul lines, the batters were aided by a strong wind. Four Aberdeen players hit two homers each including Ed Cholakian, who hit two in the seventh inning. Ed did not hit any more home runs that season in a total of 102 at bats.

Bill Bottenus of Springfield hit two home runs in the fourth inning of an Eastern League game against Binghamton on July 25, 1893. Bottenus then proceeded to hit another one in the fifth inning. Just prior to his home run in the fifth, he started an argument with umpire Doescher over a called strike. After circling the bases on his homer, Bottenus renewed his argument with the umpire. Doescher first fined him ten dollars but this only enraged Bill even more and then the umpire then tacked on an additional twenty-five dollar fine. When the second fine didn't work, Doescher threw him out of the game. Bottenus wouldn't leave and was forcibly escorted off the field by a policeman.

The table listing players with four or more home runs in a game does not include the feat being accomplished in independent leagues. However, a feat worth mentioning is a five home run game by Vince Barton (Hickory-Carolina League), who connected in the third, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth innings of a game on August 28, 1938, against Kannapolis at Hickory. He grounded out in the first inning but then there was no stopping him. He had nine runs batted in and his longest homer was estimated at 500 feet. Barton played in 102 games for the Chicago Cubs in 1931 and 1932 where he hit a respectable sixteen home runs. He led the International League in 1934 with 32 homers.

Carl Dunagan, a pitcher for Des Moines of the Western League, hit home runs from both sides of the plate in a game on May 6, 1930.

Jesse Ibarra, playing for Jacksonville of the Southern League, hit grand slam home runs from each side of the plate in a home game against Memphis on July 25, 1997. This is believed to be a first for a switch-hitter.

Lu Blue, a future major leaguer, reportedly accomplished the left-right grand slam feat in 1917 while playing for Martinsburg of the Blue Ridge League. A check of all Martinsburg games revealed that it never happened. Martinsburg was a low scoring club and scored as many as eight runs in only a few games.

Irving Young, pitching for Minneapolis of the American Association, hit a home run in the tenth inning to win the second game of a doubleheader against Milwaukee on July 13, 1909. That capped a day's work for Young as he pitched shutouts in both games.

Kansas City set an American Association record with ten home runs in a game at St. Paul. This was the first game of a doubleheader on June 29, 1952. Six of the homers came in the third inning for another record. The team added three doubles and seven singles for 53 total bases as they won, 17–4. Roy Partee hit three of the homers, including two in the big inning. Vic Power, Kal Segrist and Bill Renna had two each and Andy Carey had one.

Tom Kanapkey of Columbus (Alabama-Florida League) hit home runs in three consecutive innings (sixth, seventh and eighth) in a home game versus Graceville on June 13, 1958. He had collected two singles earlier in the game.

Thirteen home runs were hit in a Pacific Coast League game at Colorado Springs on May 7, 1987. A combination of the 6,000 feet altitude plus winds gusting to 41 MPH toward the outfield fences was a contributing factor. Luis Medina and Ron Tingley of Colorado Springs each hit two of the eight for their club. Charlie Hayes clubbed two of the five by visiting Phoenix.

Steve Souchock hit home runs in three consecutive innings in the first game of a doubleheader at Los Angeles on April 16, 1950. Steve, playing for Sacramento of the Pacific Coast League, hit his first homer in the seventh off Bob Muncrief and his second off Jim Atchley in the eighth inning. He then came up in the ninth with the bases loaded and connected off Dutch McCall. Souchock came to bat for the second time in the ninth with a chance for a four home run game but the best he could do was hit a measly single.

Two Houston players hit back-to-back home runs in two consecutive innings. Frank Shofner and Jerry Witte connected in the fifth and sixth innings of a May 12, 1951 Texas League game at Tulsa.

Three consecutive home runs plus a grand slam featured a big eighth inning for Topeka on July 23, 1951. Manager Butch Nieman, Don Annen and Dick McConnell started the fireworks. Solly Drake later unloaded a grand slam as Topeka routed Salina, 18–5, in the Western Association game.

Rafael Fernandez of Texas City (Gulf Coast League) hit home runs in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings of a game on May 7, 1952. Fernandez drove in seven runs but that wasn't enough as Lake Charles won the game, 10–9.

Home Runs in a Series of Games

Bob Sanguinett of Midland (West Texas League) hit at least one home run in each of the ten games he played in from June 25 through July 7, 1928. He hit a total of twelve home runs during the home run spree.

Former Michigan gridiron star Allen Weygandt (Topeka-Western League) went on a home run spree in May 1956. He hit two homers in the first game of a doubleheader on May 13th at Albuquerque then connected for three in the nightcap. He hit three more the next day. Weygandt ended the Albuquerque series with two HR on May 15th. At Tingley Field, Weygandt hit ten home runs in four games. The club then moved on to Runyon Field in Pueblo where he clubbed four more homers in six games. In these ten road games, the Yankee farmhand connected for fourteen home runs. For the year, Weygandt hit 49 HR and had a .304 batting average.

Bert Ellison (San Francisco, Pacific Coast League) hit eight home runs in three games in 1924. Ellison socked three home runs on Saturday May 24th. The next day, he connected for two in the first game of a doubleheader. He then proceeded to hit three more in the second game. The series was played at hitters' paradise Bonneville Park in Salt Lake City. Both teams combined for 38 HR during the seven game series.

Slugging third baseman Gene Lillard (Los Angeles, Pacific Coast League) hit eight home runs in six games between April 18 and April 22, 1935. Lillard led the PCL in home runs that year with 56.

Outfielder Bill Renna (San Francisco Seals-Pacific Coast League) also had a week to remember. During the week of August 3 through 9, 1959, he hit eight home runs in seven games.

Bob Bauer (Auburn, New York-Pennsylvania League) hit eight home runs in eight games in 1959. His spree began on June 13th and lasted through June 20th. For the year, Bauer only hit 22 home runs.

For many years, Tony Lazzeri (Salt Lake City, Pacific Coast League) had been credited with slugging eight home runs in five games from September 11 through 15, 1925. Recent careful checking of newspaper accounts, however, has shown that he only hit seven home runs in those five games.

Tom Winsett (Columbus-American Association) hit 21 home runs during the month of June 1936. Winsett wound up the year with 50 home runs, and he added one more with Brooklyn of the National League.

Bob Crues of Amarillo (West Texas-New Mexico League) also had a great month on the way to tying Joe Hauser's season home run record of 69. In August, 1948, Crues hit 20 home runs.

Dick Stuart (Lincoln-Western League) hit 23 home runs in the month of June 1956. He added another 17 in the month of July, making an incredible forty home runs in a two month period. If you add the sixteen home runs he hit in May, Stuart had an even more mind-boggling 56 homers in three months.

Phoenix of the Pacific Coast League hit at least one home run in 42 consecutive home games in 1959. George Brunet of Portland held them to five singles on July 22nd to put an end to the streak. The club hit a total of 196 HR, led by Willie McCovey with 29. Others on the club: Bill Wilson (23 HR), Bobby Prescott (21 HR), Bob Speake (20 HR) Benny Valenzuela (20 HR) and Jose Pagan (19 HR).

John Reider (Springfield-Western Association) had a very merry month of May in 1926. In a game at Okmulgee on May 4, he hit three home runs. The following day at Ardmore, he slammed two triples and a pair of home runs. The scheduled game on the 6th was rained out. On the 7th, still at Ardmore, Reider hit three more homers. In three consecutive games, he had thirteen at bats, ten runs and ten hits, good for 38 total bases. On May 17th and 18th versus McAlester Reider hit safely nine consecutive times. Included were three doubles in each game. And in spite of missing a week due to injury, John Reider hit eight doubles, three triples and eleven home runs during the month.

Harry Nolan (Rayne-Evangeline League) hit three home runs in each game of a doubleheader on August 25, 1934. The opposing team was New Iberia. Nolan hit a total of 25 home runs that year. The two players who finished as runners-up had only twelve. Nolan led the league with 101 RBI and finished third in batting with a .338 average.

Mike Calise (Louisville-American Association) failed to hit a homer on June 25, 1982, after homering in his previous eight games.

Elmer Smith (Portland-Pacific Coast League) hit nine home runs in eight games during a six-day period from August 19 through August 24, 1926. During the streak, Smith had two three home run games.

Louis Munn (Richmond-Blue Grass League) hit home runs in seven consecutive games in 1912, with the last one coming on August 16th. This was an amazing feat, and even more so for the Deadball Era.

Dave Hall (Waterloo-Midwest League) hit thirteen home runs in the first twenty games of the 1961 season. Teammate Bob Lawrence hit ten, while the club as a whole hit 41 roundtrippers. Hall was leading the league when promoted to the Eastern League. He hit only four more home runs that season. Meanwhile, Bob Lawrence went on to hit a league leading thirty home runs.

Rance Pless (Denver-American Association) hit four grand slam home runs during a 34-day period, from July 3 through August 5, 1957. Pless wound up the year with only 15 home runs and 82 RBI. In 1958, he got a 49-game shot with the Kansas City A's.

Former Olympic star Ty Griffin (Arkansas-Texas League) hit leadoff home runs in four consecutive games from August 11 through August 14, 1995. Griffin, a switch hitter, clubbed his first batting right and the last three batting left.

Charlie Gilbert (Nashville-Southern Association) hit seven home runs in the first four games of the 1948 season. He just

barely missed an eighth homer when a drive bounced off the top of the fence and dropped back onto the playing field.

Infielder Mickey Burnett (Oakland Oaks-Pacific Coast League) was pinch-hit for twice during a six-day period in 1947. Glenn Crawford hit for him on August 15th, socking a grand slam home run. On August 20th, Will Hafey was sent in to pinch-hit for Burnett and also hit a grand slam home run. One would think that Burnett was not much of a hitter, but he finished the season batting .295. His manager was none other than Casey Stengel.

Joe Gordon, manager of the Pacific Coast League Sacramento Solons, put himself in to pinch-hit in each game of a doubleheader on September 16, 1952. On both trips to the plate that day he hit home runs. The first one was a grand slam that gave Sacramento a 4–1 victory. The former-Yankee standout second baseman hit 16 home runs that year, but had reached the end of his career.

Wes Westrum played in 51 games for Jersey City of the International League at the beginning of the 1949 season, before being called up to the parent New York Giants. During that span, Westrum hit five grand slam home runs, shattering the league record of three in a season. His grand slams were hit on April 21st, the first game of a May 15th doubleheader, May 16th, June 6th and June 8th.

In mid-May, 1951, Dick Greco was sent down to Montgomery of the Sally League by Birmingham (Southern Association). In his first sixteen games with Montgomery, Greco hit eleven home runs. Greco had been hitting .321 with three HR for Birmingham. He wound up with 33 HR and a .310 batting average with Montgomery.

Jack Parks (Natchez-Cotton States League) hit eight home runs in five consecutive games from June 4 through June 8, 1948. He batted in an amazing twenty runs during the streak.

Austin Kearns (Dayton-Midwest League) had a hitting streak in which he hit home runs in each of eight games. The streak was from July 17 through July 24, 2000, and he went 18 for 25 with ten home runs, twenty runs batted in and nineteen runs scored. In one three game stretch, he was nine for nine with two doubles and five homers.

Dan Collier of Tulsa hit home runs in seven consecutive games through June 19, 1997 to set a Texas League record. Russ Burns in 1949 and Daryle Ward earlier in 1997 held the old record with six.

Dan Rohrmeier (Tacoma-Pacific Coast League) hit seven home runs during an eight game period from August 21 through 28, 1997. He connected five times during a four-game series at Salt Lake City and twice during four games at Edmonton. For good measure, he added three doubles and a triple during the spree.

Bill Serena, Lubbock, hit thirteen home runs in seven West Texas-New Mexico League playoff games in 1947.

Al Rosen hit five consecutive homers on July 26 and July 27, 1948 while playing for Kansas City against St. Paul (American Association).

John Romano (Waterloo-Three Eye League) hit home runs on nine consecutive days. He failed to connect in one game of a doubleheader during the streak, which went from July 25 to August 2, 1955. On August 3rd, he hit a drive that appeared to be over the fence but the Peoria outfielder made a leaping catch at the top of the barrier.

Glenn Cox, a pitcher (Buffalo-International League), went on a batting spree in early 1957. He hit two homers, one a grand slam, on May 26th while pitching a shutout against Rochester. Five nights later, he hit two more home runs plus a double as he beat Rochester again. This time he allowed one run. One June 5th, he defeated Miami, 2–1. In this game, he hit a single and a game-winning home run. He knocked in ten runs during his three game spree.

Claude Westmoreland of Albuquerque (Pacific Coast League) hit home runs in seven consecutive games from June 27 through July 3, 1977. He hit two on June 30th and two on July 3rd to give him nine homers during the streak.

Brothers Mike and Frank Skaff each hit two home runs for Baltimore on May 8, 1945, in a game at Buffalo. Mike also chipped in with a single and a double and he batted in six runs. Frank added a single to his collection and had five runs batted in. In his two previous games (a doubleheader on May 6th), Frank had three homers; two in the first game and one in the second.

Perry Werden (Minneapolis-Western League), hit eleven home runs during an eight game period from July 19 through July 27, 1895. He hit two on the 19th, two on the 22nd and four on the 23rd. He did not hit any on the 21st and 24th. During the streak he had 41 at bats and 23 hits with one double.

John Rodriguez, playing for Memphis of the Pacific Coast League, hit four grand slam home runs within a span of 22 games between June 15 and July 9, 2005.

A story has appeared in several publications, including the first edition of this book, about a rare home run feat by Roy Ostergard of Galveston in the 1923 Texas League. According to this story, Ostergard hit five home runs during a short period of time and they were all grand slams. Based on research over eighty years later by Tom Kayser, President of the Texas League, it never happened. Ostergard went on a home run spree during a seven day, nine-game period late in the season where he connected for eight homers. However, only two were grand slams. With two earlier in the season, he finished the season with four grand slams.

Odell Hale hit seven home runs on six consecutive days while playing for Alexandria of the 1929 Cotton States League. The last one came on June 10th versus Meridian.

Four or More Home Runs in a Game

Ninety-three players have had games in which they hit four or more home runs. One player performed the feat twice. One player hit eight home runs in a game, and four others hit five in a single contest. Forty-two of the players on the list made the majors, but only twenty-five of them played in as many as 100 major league games, and only six played in 1,000 or more big league games. George Kelly, a Hall of Famer, is probably the best known player on the list. However, Tom Brunansky and Matt Williams are more recognizable to contemporary fans. Williams is the top major league career home run hitter on the list with 378. He is followed by Brunansky with 271, Jim Lemon with 164, and Kelly with 148.

Buzz Arlett is the player with two four-homer games. They came within 33 days of each other and they both came against Reading, one at home and one on the road. Jay Clarke hit eight home runs in a single game. Pete Schneider, Lou Frierson, Cecil Dunn and Dick Lane had the five-homer games.

Fifteen major league players have hit four home runs in a game. All of them, with the exception of Bobby Lowe, can be considered as genuine home run hitters. Lowe hit his in bandbox Congress Street Grounds in Boston. Lou Gehrig, Willie Mays and Mike Schmidt are among the greats. This is not the case with the minor league hitters with four home runs in a game. Only fifteen, or seventeen percent, reached the 200 home run career level in the minors. Another twenty-seven reached the 100 level. Arlett is the top man on the list with 432 career home runs in the minors. He is followed by Joe Bauman with 337, Ab Wright with 323, Pud Miller with 268 and Keith Little with 265.

At the other end of the spectrum are players such as John Gillespie, Earl Waltz, Don DiChiara, Dick Lane, Frank Askland, Dan Cronin and Tommie Harris. Gillespie had only six career home runs, but he was a pitcher and, therefore, can be excused. Waltz had nine home runs in a four-year career and seven of them came during a three-game spree. DiChiara was in the minors for only two years and he hit a total of thirteen. Lane is an interesting case. He is the last player to hit five homers in a game. He hit only eighteen in a four-year minor league career and none during a twelve game stretch with the Chicago White Sox in 1949. Incidentally, three of Lane's five home runs on his big day were hit off former major leaguer Walter "Boom-Boom" Beck. Askland hit just eight home runs during a six-year career.

Dan Cronin and Tommie Harris are the mystery men on the list. SABR member Bob Richardson, an expert on baseball in New England during the 19th Century, found that Cronin played semi-pro ball in several New England states from 1888 through 1890 and then went on to play in the New England League in 1891 and 1892. That is all we know about his playing career. He died in Manchester, New Hampshire on May 5, 1896. Cronin did not hit any home runs during his two years in the New England League other than on his big day. There is no explanation as to why he caught fire that day. The ballpark was certainly not a home run haven. We know even less about Tommie Harris, even though he is a player of more recent vintage. Harris played in 29 games for Terrell in the Texas Association in 1926 without connecting for a homer. There is no record of him playing anywhere in 1927.

Then in 1928 he hit fourteen home runs for Midland of the West Texas League. That is the extent of our knowledge of Mr. Harris. Even our Texas baseball expert, Davis Barker, has been stumped on this one.

The most dramatic four home run game was played on August 31, 1954 at Roswell, New Mexico. Joe Bauman was shooting for the single season home run record of 69. Going into this Longhorn League game, Bauman's chances looked bleak. He needed six home runs in seven games to break the record. After the fireworks had concluded in the game, Joe's chances appeared much brighter. He then needed only two in the remaining six games to set a new mark. As minor league followers know, Bauman went on to hit four more home runs, pushing his season total to 72, a minor league record that still stands.

An amazing performance was turned in by Jay Clarke of the Corsicana club of the Texas League. Clarke hit eight home runs in a game on Sunday, June 15, 1902. Sunday ball was not allowed in Corsicana during those times, so the game was played in nearby Ennis. Very little is known about the Ennis ballpark. In an interview many years later, Clarke said that the right field fence was only about 210 feet down the foul line. There have been several versions of the box score of the game and none of them "prove out." They do, however, all agree that Corsicana clobbered Texarkana, 51 to 3.

Junior DeWitt pitched the entire game for Texarkana. There is an interesting story—whether it is true or not—that states that Junior was the son of C. B. DeWitt, a part owner of the Texarkana club. As the story goes, C.B. arranged to have his boy join the club and instructed the manager to let his son pitch. The somewhat perturbed manager put Junior into this particular gam and let him pitch and pitch and pitch. After the game, the manager was asked why he didn't change pitchers. He gave the simple reply, "The club owner told me to let the boy pitch, so I let him pitch".

Another story about the game is that the copy editor for the *Dallas Morning News* thought that the 8 home runs credited to Clarke must have been an error, and changed it to a "3." The copy editor reasoned that an 8 looks similar to a 3 and that it would be impossible for anyone to hit 8 home runs in a single game. A brief game story that accompanied the box score in the News indeed credited Clarke with three home runs. This is probably the source of the note that ran shortly thereafter in *Sporting Life* that gave an account of the game and credited Clarke with three home runs.

George Moreland, a noted historian, devoted two pages in his 1927 book, *Balldom*, to explaining why Jay Clarke should be credited with only three home runs. However, the official scorer of the game attested to the eight home runs under oath and this was published in the *Dallas Morning News* in 1916. In addition, William Ruggles, author of *The History of the Texas League*, stated that J. Doak Roberts and J. Walter Morris verified the eight home runs. Roberts was the managing director of the Corsicana club at the time of the game and he went on to serve as president of the Texas League for twelve years. Morris was the shortstop for Corsicana in the game, and he, also, served as president of

the Texas League. Of course, Jay Clarke certainly agreed with the eight homers during numerous interviews in later years.

Another point of dispute is the number of runs batted in that Clarke had in the game. Figures of sixteen, twenty and twenty-two have been published at various times. Clarke thinks that he had about twenty. RBI were not an official statistic in those days and, thus, were not in box scores. Since there was no play-by-play of the game, we will never know.

Clarke's teammates chipped in with another thirteen home runs in the game. On the other side, Texarkana batters did not even hit one.

Jay Clarke was a full-blooded Indian from Ontario, Canada. 1902 was his rookie season, and he managed to hit only three more homers that season. His career in pro ball lasted through the 1925 season, with some time out during World War I to serve in the U. S. Marines. He spent six seasons in the majors, hitting only six home runs. His minor league total numbered only twenty-two. Clarke died of a heart attack at his home in River Rouge, Michigan, on June 15, 1949. Ironically, this was the anniversary of his big game.

The Vernon Tigers of the Pacific Coast League played a game at Salt Lake City's Bonneville Park on May 11, 1923 and "squeezed" out a 35 to 11 victory. Pete Schneider of the visiting team hit five home runs in the game. Pete could have asked the question, "What if?", about his performance in the game. Below are his at bats for the game:

Hit a home run in the first inning with one man on base.
Flied out in the second inning.
Hit grand slam home run in the third inning.
Hit three-run homer in the fourth inning.

Hit a ball in the sixth inning that struck two feet from the top of center field fence with Schneider winding up on second with a double. "What if I had the ball a little harder?" "What if I had hit the ball a little more to the left?"

In his second at bat in the sixth inning, hit a solo home run.

Hit a grand slam home run in the seventh inning.

Came up for the last time in the ninth and hit a terrific liner to the centerfielder. "What if I would have gotten under the ball a little more?"

Oh, well, sometimes you never get the breaks!

At first glance, Ab Wright's four home run feat might not seem so extraordinary. After all, his home runs were hit at bandbox Nicollet Park in Minneapolis. The only problem with that scenario is that Wright batted from the right side and Nicollet was friendly only to left-handed batters. Down the leftfield line it was a normal 324 feet and it jutted out to a deep 432 feet in center. The following is a rundown on Wright's four homers:

A 400-foot drive over the wall in deep right-center in the third inning.

Hit one an estimated 450 feet over the center field fence in the fourth inning.

Hit one over the left-center field wall which hit a building across the street in the fifth inning.

In the seventh inning, hit one even further than the previous one with the ball landing on the roof of the same building.

Bob Seeds, playing for Newark of the International League, had one of the greatest two-game batting sprees in the history of the game. On May 6, 1938, at Buffalo, Seeds hit four home runs and two singles, knocking in twelve runs. His homers, including a grand slam, came in four consecutive innings. The next day he added three more home runs to his collection.

Seeds tore up the International League during the first part of the 1938 season. After 59 games he was batting .335 with 28 home runs, 73 runs and 95 runs batted in. However, the New York Yankees owned the Newark club and they decided that Seeds did not fit into their future plans. They sold him to the New York Giants in June. Projecting Seeds' performance over a 154 game schedule, he would have hit 73 HR, scored 191 runs, and driven in a mind-boggling 248 runs.

Of the four players with five home run games, three chipped in with an additional hit. Schneider, as mentioned previously, had a double. Dunn and Lane each had a single. Surprisingly, in almost half of the four home run games, the player had at least one additional hit. Len Cross collected three singles and Bob Seeds added two singles. Twenty-one players had an additional single and one player had a double. Four players (Henry Bateman, Tommie Harris, Ab Wright and Derek Bryant) each added a triple to their collection.

Babe Paul, Lew Ford, Al Mallonee, and Micah Hoffpauir got minimum mileage out of their four homers. They all were solo home runs. Paul had an excuse—he was the leadoff batter and one of his shots came in the first inning.

Reno (Sunset League) teammates Phil Alotta and Vince Pascale each hit four home runs in the first game of a doubleheader on June 1, 1947. Another teammate, Tom Lloyd, chipped in with three homers. The Reno Silver Sox had a total of twelve home runs in the game and their opponent, Ontario, hit four. Six more home runs were hit in the second game of the doubleheader, giving the two teams a total of 22 home runs for the day. Both foul lines at the Reno Park, Moana Field, measured 320 feet. The catch is that every point on the outfield fences was equidistant from home plate. In other words, centerfield also measured 320 feet.

John Gillespie is the only pitcher in Organized Baseball to have hit four home runs in a game. Gillespie had an eight-year career in pro ball, including a one-year stint with the Cincinnati Reds in 1922. On August 9, 1923, he hooked up with Gary Fortune of Springfield in a seesaw battle at Bridgeport. The score after nine innings was knotted at nine. Bob Tecarr relieved Fortune to start the tenth. Gillespie was the first batter in the inning. In his first four appearances, he had singled once and homered in the third, sixth and eighth innings, batting in four runs. Against Tecarr, Gillespie hit the ball over the short rightfield fence for his fourth homer of the day. Tecarr got out of the inning without any more damage. Then George Abrams came in to pitch for Bridgeport, relieving Gillespie. He preserved Gillespie's hard-earned victory.

Three of the games on the list were not regular season games. Jim Lemon hit four home runs in an All-Star game. This, like many minor league All-Star games, was played between a group of all-stars from around the league and the club leading the league at the time of the game. Lemon was one of the all-stars playing against host Birmingham at Rickwood Field. Rickwood was one of the game's more spacious parks with a distance of 407 feet down the leftfield line and 470 feet to dead center. Lemon, a right-hander, hit two to left-center and two to right-center.

Dixie Upright hit four home runs for Waco in a Big State League semi-final playoff game in 1949. Waco won the game, the series, and the finals. More recently, in 1999, Eric Battersby hit four for Burlington in a semi-final playoff game in the Midwest League.

Quentin Martin, playing for Rocky Mount of the Coastal Plain League, almost made the four home run game list. In a game at Goldsboro on July 3, 1949, Martin hit his fourth home run of the game in the ninth inning. Shortly after hitting his home run, it began to rain. The rain kept coming and the game had to be called. Rocky Mount was ahead at the time, so all ninth inning stats were wiped out, including Martin's fourth home run.

Bubba Trammell of the Toledo (International League) club hit four homers against Richmond on August 9, 1997. They resulted in only five runs, but he really made them count. He hit one in the ninth with a man on to tie the score at ten and force the game into extra innings. He connected again in the thirteenth inning to win the game, 11–10.

Tyrone Horne of Arkansas in the Texas League hit for the cycle on July 27, 1998. No, not that kind of cycle. He hit a solo home run, a two-run homer, a three-run homer and a grand slam – not in that order.

Henry Bateman of Paris (Texas League) pitched a no-hitter against Fort Worth on July 11, 1903. This was less than two months after his four home run game. Bateman was normally an outfielder and first baseman.

Jerry Crosby hit home runs in four consecutive innings (4, 5, 6 and 7) in his four home run game in 1953.

A number of publications over the years have carried lists of four home run games. Many lists were incomplete and they all contained errors, particularly erroneous dates. In addition, a number of players have been incorrectly credited with four home run games. They are as follows:

Perry Werden – May 28, 1894. As per an article in *Sporting Life*, Werden did play in the game for Minneapolis, but the box score in *Sporting Life* credited him with only three home runs. The game story and box score in the *Minneapolis Tribune* also gave him three home runs.

John Crooks - 1898. The December 3, 1898 edition of *The Sporting News* reported that Crooks had hit five home runs for St. Paul in a game at Minneapolis during the past season. A check of all box scores for the season failed to come up with anything close to five.

Henry Beckendorf - 1904. A note in the September 24, 1904 edition of *Sporting Life* stated that Beckendorf of Kingston in the Hudson River League had recently hit four home runs in a game. A check of the two daily newspapers in Kingston revealed that Beckendorf had 4 hits in a game on August 17, but never had four home runs in a game that season.

— McElvey – April 10, 1912. The 1914 edition of *Balldom* credited McElvey with a four home run game on April 10, 1911 while playing for Minneapolis. The second edition of *Balldom* in 1927 changed the year to 1912 and specified that the club was Minneapolis of the American Association. Minneapolis opened the 1911 season on April 12. No player named McElvey appeared in the line up for Minneapolis and no home runs were hit in the game. The 1912 season opened on April 10 and, again, there was no McElvey in the line up. The name McElvey did not appear in the final American Association averages for either 1911 or 1912. The 1912 Central Kansas League had a club in Minneapolis, Kansas. The club transferred to Newton on July 12. Again, a McElvey did not appear in the league's final averages.

Pete Kilduff—1916. From an unknown source: Kilduff played for Omaha of the Western League in 1916 and hit only three home runs the whole year.

Daubert—July 16, 1921. As per the 1927 edition of *Balldom*, Daubert played for Eveleth of the Mesabi Range League. This was a semi-pro or independent league and not a member of the National Association. Incidentally, Jake Daubert, the well-known major leaguer, was with Cincinnati that season.

Fred Merkle—April 12, 1923. As per the 1927 edition of *Balldom*, Merkle played for Rochester of the International League on April 12 and hit four home runs. This was an exhibition game against the Philadelphia Athletics. There have been many four home run games by players in exhibition games.

Richard Bazinet—1962. As per an article in the May 11, 1963, edition of *The Sporting News*, Bazinet, playing for Auburn of the New York–Pennsylvania League, hit four homers in a game in 1962. This did not happen according to Leo Pickney, sports editor of the *Auburn Citizen*.

Miscellaneous Facts

- Sixty-one players were right-handed batters, twenty-nine were left-handed and three were switch-hitters.
- Of the switch-hitters, Walter Holke hit all of his homers batting left. Buzz Arlett hit his first three batting left and his last one batting right in his first four home run game. In his second four home run game, his first and last home runs were hit from the right side and the middle two from the port side. Jerry Crosby hit his first home run while batting right and the last three while batting left.
- Most home runs in a season (season in which player had his four home run game): Joe Bauman, 72; Pud Miller, 55; Buzz Arlett, 54; Cecil Dunn, 47; Keith Little, 47.
- Fewest home runs in a season (season in which player had his four home run game): Dan Cronin, 4; John Gillespie, 4; Frank Askland, 5; Waldo Jackley, 7; Pat Garman, 8; Curtis Roberts, 8.
- Most consecutive years with at least one four home run game: 6 (1997–2002).
- Most consecutive years without a four home run game, Deadball Era: 9 (1904–1912).
- Most consecutive years without a four home run game, lively ball era: 8 (1989–1996). After almost a nine year stretch (May 25, 1988, to May 21, 1997) without a four home run game, four players connected during a two year period.
- Number of four home run games in seven inning contests: 4.
- Number of four home run games in highest classification (at the time) leagues: 21 (International League, 7; Pacific Coast League, 7; American Association, 5; Mexican League, 2).
- Fifty-four four home run games were played at home (including Clarke's game at Ennis) and forty were road games.
- There were twelve four-home run games in leagues located in the Southwest during the ten-year period following World War II.

A dash (—) in any column indicates that the information is not known. A plus sign (+) after the number in the RBI column indicates that the player may have had additional RBI in the game. The YR column is the player's home run total for the year. Under Notes are other batting statistics for the game, including single (S), double (D), triple (T), base on balls (BB), hit by pitch (HP), sacrifice hit (SH), grand slam home run (GS), and inside the park home runs (IPHR). Also noted is if a player's home runs came in four or five consecutive plate appearances (4C or 5C).

The latest year for any player on the above list is 1959 (Tom Hamilton). Today’s players like to swing for the fences and it doesn’t bother them to strike out. During the recent 2008 season, the best ratio for a 20 home run hitter was 0.634. Half of the 20 home run hitters struck out over one hundred times. One player, who shall remain nameless, struck out 200 times.

Homerless Streaks

John Griffiths

Hit a home run on June 25, 1930, and did not hit another one until June 19, 1940. That amounted to homerless streaks of 1,337 games, and 4,936 at bats. John “Bunny” Griffiths was a 5 foot 6, 155 pound shortstop. He began his organized baseball career in 1925 for Martinsburg (Blue Ridge League) in 1925 and finished up with Hagerstown in the Inter-State League in 1947. Griffiths never made it to the majors, but did play two years for San Diego in the Pacific Coast League. He batted .282 in twenty-three seasons, and he managed to hit nineteen home runs.

Albert E. Wright

Hit a home run on September 1, 1935 (first game of a doubleheader for the Pacific Coast League San Francisco Mission), and did not hit another through the end of his career in 1946. Wright’s homerless streak lasted for 1,321 games, and 4,611 at bats. This player is not to be confused with Albert O. “Ab” Wright, who hit 323 minor league home runs. Both played during the same time period.

San Francisco native Albert E. Wright began his career at home with the Pacific Coast League Missions in 1930 and played almost exclusively with Bay Area teams until he joined Portland in 1941, hitting between .250 and .288. Throughout his career, Wright played at second base. He ended his career with Bremerton in the Western International League in 1946. In his career, Wright only socked four home runs.

John O’Neil

Hit a home run on June 12, 1942, and did not hit another one through the end of his career in 1953. The homerless streak was 1,330 games, and 4,541 homerless at bats. It has recently been discovered that O’Neil played in 84 games for Salina of the California League in 1954 and hit two home runs. It will require some research to determine when he hit his first home run that season. In any event, we will be able to add to his homerless streak.

John O’Neil played in 46 major league games, racking up 94 at bats during his minor league streak. He did not hit a homer in the majors either, so that would give O’Neil an Organized Baseball homerless streak of 1,376 games, 4,635 at bats.

O’Neil began in 1939 in the Georgia-Florida League with Tallahassee, quickly moving on that season to Greenville in the Appalachian League, where he hit two of his five career home runs. A shortstop, O’Neil spent most of his career in the Pacific Coast League. It has recently been discovered that O’Neil played in 84 games for Selina of the California League in 1954 and hit 2 home runs. It will require some research to determine when he hit his first homer. In any event, he will be able to add to his homerless streak.

Lee Stebbens

Stebbens hit a home run on September 5, 1932, during the first game of a doubleheader, and never hit another one in his career, which concluded after the 1941 season. Added up, that gave Stebbens 1,123 straight homerless games and 4,263 homerless at bats.

In contrast to the other homerless streak players, Stebbins was a first baseman who hit seventeen home runs in his first year in pro baseball with Blackwell of the Southwestern League. Stebbins hit over .300 four times in the Texas League in the early to mid-thirties. After hitting .245 for Forth Worth in 1940, he finished up his career with Rayne (Evangeline League) in 1942. In all, he hit 36 home runs in his career.

Gene Hassell

Hassell never hit a home run in Organized Baseball. His career lasted from 1951 through 1961. He played 1,058 games, and racked up 3,323 at bats.

Gene Hassell began as a second baseman-third baseman with Wilson of the Coastal Plain League. Between 1952 and 1954, he never stole less than forty bases in a season. In his eleven-year career, Hassell hit over .300 on six occasions, including twice for Denver in the American Association. His career came to an end in Des Moines (Three I League) when he hit .198 in 25 games.

Luis Suárez

Luis Suárez also never hit a home run during his whole career, a career that began in 1944 and ended after the 1952 season. He appeared in 896 homerless games, and had 3,304 at bats in the minors.

Luis Abelardo Suárez was born on August 24, 1916 in Alto Songo, Cuba, and died in Havana on June 5, 1991. Suárez began his career at the top. He got into one game for Washington in 1944 before being shipped out to Chattanooga in the Southern Association, where he played 86 games at short with a .251 batting average. After being out of Organized Baseball for the 1945 season, he began a four-year stint as a third baseman-shortstop in the Florida International League, primarily with the Havana franchise. After getting off to a slow start in 1949 (.194 batting average), he joined the Big State League. He also played in the West Texas-New Mexico and Longhorn Leagues.

Ernie Sierra

Ernie Sierra played in 987 games through 1942 through 1954 with three years off for military service. He did not hit a home run in 3,507 at-bats during his entire minor league career. He also played in 53 games with 158 at bats in the pre-National Association Mexican League without a homer.

Big Boy Kraft

Clarence "Big Boy" Kraft led the Texas League in home runs from 1922 through 1924, with totals of 32, 32 and 55, respectively. In 1924, he scored 150 runs, batted in another 196, and had a batting average of .349 to go along with his gaudy 55 homers.

Then he retired.

Kraft was 37 years old at the time of his retirement. He had started his pro career in 1910 and managed a three-game cup of coffee with the Boston Braves in 1914, but that was the extent of his major league career.

Big Boy Kraft was one of many pre-World War II players who tore up minor league pitching, yet could not make it in the big leagues. He quit to become an automobile dealer in Fort Worth, Texas.

Bud Heslet

Harry "Bud" Heslet came up through the Yankee farm system during a period when the system was loaded with promising players. After playing two years at Newark, the Yanks' top farm club, Heslet was cut loose, and caught on with Toronto for the 1950 season. He played in the International, Texas and Pacific Coast Leagues through 1955 without ever having played in a major league game.

In 1956, at the age of 36, he went to Visalia in the California League. Heslet had a "pretty good" season there, with 147 runs scored, 172 runs batted in, a .334 batting average and 51 home runs.

And with that, Bud Heslet decided to hang them up and pursue a career outside of baseball as a firefighter.

Butch Nieman

Elmer "Butch" Nieman played for Topeka of the Western Association from 1947 through 1951 and he led the league in home runs every one of those years!

Nieman quit baseball before the 1952 season, though he was still relatively young at age 33.

During World War II, he played for the Boston Braves for three years and posted fairly good numbers. Nieman returned to the minors in 1946—never to go back up to the big leagues despite some great numbers in the bush leagues.

Pedro Hernández

Pedro Hernández del Angel was a catcher and sometimes outfielder whose career only lasted two years in Organized Baseball. He played both seasons for Guanajuato in the Mexican Center League. The circuit was a feeder league for the Mexican League and was also a member of the National Association.

Hernandez' first year was good but not great: 21 home runs and a .275 batting average. It was his second and final year, 1966, that turned out to be an incredible one. Hernandez banged out fifty home runs to go along with 173 RBI and a batting average of .425 as a full-time catcher.

But that's where the story ends. A number of inquiries over the years have drawn nothing but blanks. The people at the Mexican Hall of Fame do not have any information on him. In fact, they were surprised as the rest of us that Hernandez never got a shot in the Mexican League.

This will probably remain the mystery of mysteries.

Frank Gravino

Like Stan Musial two years before, Gravino broke in as a pitcher with Williamson of the Mountain States League in 1940. Returning from World War II, he, like Musial, switched to the outfield, but unlike Musial, he never made it to the majors, topping out at Rochester in 1948.

Gravino never hit more than 21 HR until he led the Provincial League with 42 at St. Jean in 1951. After hitting 37 HR in 1952, including a Northern League leading 32 in 94 games at Fargo-Moorhead, Gravino may have had the most dominant home run season in history: 52 HR for Fargo-Moorhead in 1953. This figure was 34 home runs more than the runner up and 43 more than teammate Roger Maris collected. The following season he raised his home run total to 56, but his lead shrunk to "just 23" over runner up Dave Roberts.

Perhaps Gravino felt that he was slipping, since he retired at the end of the 1954 season. He was just 31 years old.

The Evolution of the Season Home Run Record

The National League began play in 1876, and is recognized as a major league by all baseball historians. Several other leagues formed in the next few years, starting with the 1877 season. While they were not exactly major leagues, they were never viewed as minor leagues, either. In a way, they were merely competitors of the National League.

Statistics are somewhat sketchy for those leagues. Three players are known to have hit one home run each in the 1877 International Association. George Derby of Hornell, in the 1878 International Association, hit two homers. Six players in the 1879 Northwestern League are known to have hit two home runs each. No other players are known to have hit two homers in a season through 1882.

Our story will begin with the 1883 season, when the Inter-State League and the Northwestern League were fairly stable leagues, and are recognized as legitimate minor leagues. The Inter-State League was the first of a number of leagues around the country using that name. This 1883 league had teams in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware. Frank Fennelly, playing for Camden and Brooklyn, finished the season with a league leading six home runs. Since there have not been any home run stats compiled for the 1883 Northwestern League, we will consider Fennelly as the first season home run record holder. Fennelly went up to the majors the following year and remained there for the next seven years. In all, he collected 34 major league home runs, a very respectable number for the era. After his career in baseball ended, he went on to become a noted New England politician.

Tom "Oyster" Burns (another Tom Burns played in the National League for thirteen years during this same period) hit eleven home runs for Wilmington of the Eastern League in 1884 to set the new mark. The Wilmington team dropped out of the Eastern League in mid-August and joined the Union Association, replacing the Philadelphia club. Oyster Burns had an eleven year major league career and he led the National League in homers in 1890.

The record was again broken after one year. Dick Johnston of Richmond (Eastern League) hit sixteen home runs in 1885. Johnston had started his pro career with Richmond in 1884. Late in the 1884 season he went up to the majors for 39 games. Again in 1885 he started out with Richmond and then went up to the majors late in the season after having set a new minor league record. Johnston played in the majors for a total of eight years.

Walt Andrews, playing for Memphis in the Southern League, slugged 28 homers in 1887. This not only set a new minor league standard, but also bettered the major league record of 27 set by Ned Williamson in 1884. Williamson's major league mark stood until Babe Ruth came along. Andrews played in the minor leagues from 1884 through 1895 with only one 26-game stint in the majors in 1888.

Andrews' mark held until 1894 when Perry Werden, one of the top minor league players of the 19th Century, hit 43 home runs for Minneapolis of the Western League. This was an unheard of total for that era. No other player in the majors or minors reached

the 40 mark until 1917. A short fence in Minneapolis undoubtedly helped Werden. His career lasted from 1884 through 1908, which included all or parts of seven seasons in the major leagues. He ended his minor league career with 171 home runs.

In 1895, Werden, still playing for Minneapolis of the Western League, upped the record to 45. Moreover, his team hit an amazing 220 home runs, a total exceeded by only a dozen minor league teams in the 20th Century.

Werden's record stood for twenty-eight years. Then, in 1923, Moses Solomon of Hutchinson in the Southwestern League hit 49 home runs. This was Solomon's third year in pro ball and he went up to the Giants for two games at the end of the season. But that turned out to be the extent of his major league career. He played in the minors through the 1929 season, but managed to add only another 29 home runs to his career totals.

Clarence "Big Boy" Kraft hit 55 home runs for Fort Worth (Texas League) in 1924. To say that he had a great year would be an understatement. Kraft scored 150 runs and drove in 196 while compiling a solid .349 average. The 1924 season was Big Boy's last year in pro ball and his best. He turned 37 years old just before the season so he was near the end of his career. Kraft had begun his career in 1910 in the Central League with his hometown team, Evansville. All said, what a way to go out!

Tony Lazzeri reached the magic sixty home run mark in 1925, two years before Ruth. Tony played for Salt Lake City in the Pacific Coast League. The long PCL schedule helped Lazzeri set his record. He played in 197 games for the Bees that year. In mid-year, he had been sold to the Yankees for delivery the following Spring (1926), when he would join Ruth, Gehrig and company. When Babe Ruth hit his 60 home runs in 1927, Lazzeri finished third in the league in home runs with 18 (Gehrig was second with 47). Lazzeri hit 178 home runs in the majors and another 135 in the minors.

In 1926, Moose Clabaugh of the Tyler club in the East Texas League hit 62 home runs to eclipse Lazzeri's year-old record. Home runs were becoming a lot more common in the 1920s as evidenced by this being the fourth consecutive year to have a new home run record set. Clabaugh, who managed to play a few games in the majors in 1926, was one of the truly great minor league home run hitters, winding up with a career total of 346.

Joe Hauser upped the record to 63 in 1930 while playing for Baltimore of the International League. Hauser had been a very good hitter for the Philadelphia Athletics from 1922 through 1924. However, he broke his leg just prior to the start of the 1925 season and missed the whole campaign. Hauser did come back in time for the 1926 season and played three more years in the majors but he was not the same player he had been prior to the injury. Nevertheless, it did not appear that his hitting in the minors was affected at all.

In 1933, Joe Hauser, then playing for Minneapolis in the American Association, broke his own record by hitting 69 home runs. He is the only minor-league player to hit sixty or more home runs twice. Hauser finished his minor league career with 399 homers.

Bob Crues, playing for Amarillo in the West Texas-New Mexico League, matched Hauser's single season record by hitting 69 home runs in 1948. This is the only time the single season record has been held jointly by two players. The West Texas-New Mexico League was known as a home run league. However, to put Crues' record into perspective, the runner-up that year hit only 38 homers. Crues started out as a pitcher, and a good one at that. He had a 20–5 record in 1940, plus 3 wins in the playoffs (two of them shutouts). Then fate intervened. While at spring training with the Red Sox in 1941, he injured his arm. He gave up pitching, and turned to hitting home runs. During a three-year stretch, from 1946 through 1948, Bob Crues hit a total of 150 home runs.

Joe Bauman wrote the final chapter of this story. Bauman clubbed 72 home runs for Roswell of the Longhorn League in 1954. Seventy-two is a lot of home runs, but what is even more amazing is that he did it in only 138 games. Projecting that to a season with 600 at bats, he would have hit 87 home runs. Joe Bauman never played in the majors. In fact, he only got into one game at the Triple A level. Nevertheless, he sure tore up the leagues of the Southwest. He hit 221 home runs over one four-year period and led his league five times in his short nine-year career.

Bauman's record may stand forever. Of course, that statement has been made several times before and look what happened. Walter Johnson's strike out record went by the boards, as did Ty Cobb's career hit and stolen base records, Babe Ruth's career home run record and Lou Gehrig's consecutive game streak. The face of minor league ball has changed dramatically in the past 30 or 40 years. Today there are few "career" minor leaguers. There are virtually no independent teams today and co-op teams can't wait until they get real working agreements. In such an environment, the player who doesn't show promise of moving up is let go and replaced by another prospect, although this has changed somewhat in Triple A the last few years. When a player starts out fast during a season, he is moved up way before he has a chance to set any records.

The minors would have to revert back to what it once was for there to be a chance to top Joe Bauman's record.

Tony Lazzeri's 1925 Home Run Log

Salt Lake City (Pacific Coast League)

Home Park—Bonneville Park

Tony Lazzeri was the first player in Organized Baseball to hit 60 home runs, two years before Babe Ruth. In fact, he broke Babe Ruth's record of 59 set in 1921 with the New York Yankees. The minor league record he beat belonged to Clarence "Big Boy" Kraft with 55 home runs, set the previous year with Fort Worth in the Texas League. Lazzeri played for the Salt Lake City Bees in the Pacific Coast League and the high altitude made Bonneville Park a noted offensive park throughout its history. Lazzeri's 60th home run has been a topic of controversy. In 1946, one of the players in the game stated that Sacramento "gave" Lazzeri his last home run of the season (an inside-the-park homer). The fielders ran the wrong way and didn't try very hard to get to the ball. In checking the Sacramento Bee for that game(the game was played in Sacramento), the beat reporter stated that the game was only unusual for its lack of any unusual plays. The following sentence blandly stated that Tony Lazzeri hit his 60th home run of the season.

Tony Lazzeri’s minor league home run record lasted but a year. Clabaugh’s record was the fourth straight year that minor league home run records were set: 1923 Moses Solomon with 49; 1924 Big Boy Kraft with 55; and Lazzeri’s 60 home runs the year before. One of the most striking things about his record is that Clabaugh hit his 62 home runs in a league where his team only played 122 games, Moose appearing in all but one. Clabaugh’s record would stand for four years.

Joe Hauser broke Moose Clabaugh’s four-year old record by one. Oriole Park in Baltimore was a great park for left-handed batters. The dimensions seemed at first glance to be about normal with 310 feet down the right field line. However, the right field power alley was only slightly longer than down the foul line. It is surprising that the left-hand hitting Hauser hit only 34 of his homers in friendly Oriole Park against 29 on the road.

Joe Hauser’s 1933 Home Run Log
Minneapolis (American Association)
Home Park—Nicollet Park

In 1933 Joe Hauser became the only player ever in the mnor leagues to hit 60 home runs twice in a career. The Minneapolis park, Nicolett Park, had a notoriously short right-field fence, 279 feet down the foul line. Hauser took advantage of his home park to an extent he did not in Baltimore (an amazing 50 HR hit at home). One of the most amazing things about his record is his hitting 31 home runs off of left-handers, even more amazing when you consider that Hauser batted from the port side. During one stretch, he hit 23 of 31 home runs off lefthanders. His record would be tied fifteen years later and then beaten in 1954 by Joe Bauman.

But too much can be made of “rabbit” baseballs in the 1948 West Texas–New Mexico League and of Bob Crues' record in particular. The runner up to Crues, Virgil Richardson, only had 38 home runs, some thirty-one fewer. Bob Crues also set a record which has a chance of remaining on the books for a good long time, if not forever. He drove in an incredible 254 runs in 1948.

Joe Bauman did what many thought would be impossible just a week before the season closed: Beat or even tie Joe Hauser and Bob Crues’ all-time minor league home run record. On August 30, with only 63 home runs, Sweetwater rolled into town for a two-game series. Bauman hit his 64th home run in the first game. On the 31st, Bauman went from an also ran to a contender. He hit four home runs and a double bringing his season home run total to 68, within one of the record. He tied the record on September 2, but went homerless at Big Spring on the 3rd and the 4th of September, managing a lone single in 7 at bats. The club traveled to Artesia, with its large dimensions, for a season-ending doubleheader. Bauman broke the record in the first game, becoming the first and only player ever to hit seventy home runs in a season. In the final game of the season, he added two more for good measure.

Dick Stuart had the finest home run month ever in Organized Baseball: 23 home runs in the month of June, 1956. He followed that up with 17 home runs in July. A total of forty home runs in two months has to be a record and he hit an even more incredible 56 in just three months. In August, the press started speculating on Stuart hitting eighty home runs for the year. Always streaky (he had four 3-HR games and six 2-HR games), Stuart went cold at the end of the season and didn't even threaten Joe Bauman's minor league record. One of the notable things about Stuart's totals is that he hit a great many more home runs on the road than at home (38 homers on the road, 28 at home). Stuart hit an additional two home runs in the playoffs against Hugh Blanton and Jim Turgerson of Amarillo.

- Yam Yaryan won five home run titles during a minor league career that stretched from the 1917 season all the way through the 1940 season. Yaryan won his first title in 1919 and his last one in 1937.
- Chet Laabs won a home run title in 1935, his first year in pro baseball, and his second title in 1950, his last year in pro ball. Laabs spent most of the years between in the majors. Clarence "Big Boy" Kraft also won a home run crown in his first and last years in pro ball, a stretch of fourteen years.
- Rick Lancellotti led three leagues in home runs, each in a different decade. He led the Eastern League in 1979, the Pacific Coast League in 1986 and the International League in 1991.
- Rudy York holds the record for most years between first and second home run titles. It took him sixteen years to win his second title. He won the Texas League title in 1935 and won the Middle Atlantic League title in 1951. Zeke Bonura went fifteen years (1933 to 1948) between his only two titles. As mentioned above, Laabs also went fifteen years between his only two titles. The only other player with thirteen or more years between his only two titles is Austin Knickerbocker, who won the Northern League crown in 1940 and later won the Kitty League title in 1953.
- Leo "Muscle" Shoals won his first of seven titles in the Appalachian League in 1939 and his last, also in the Appalachian League, in 1955. In between, he played in seven other leagues.

Frank Roth is credited with 36 home runs in 1901 in several publications. However, a thorough check of all box scores for the season turned up only 27 home runs. This was still good enough to lead the minors.

Bob Unglaub, playing for Williamsport of the Tri-State League, hit fourteen home runs in 1906. This topped John Ganzel's total of thirteen. The Tri-State League, however, was not a member of the National Association.

Joe Bauman led the minors four times, including three consecutive years, 1952 through 1954. Ed Breckinridge, Perry Werden, and Bunny Brief each led the minors three times.

Leading the minors in home runs is not a ticket to stardom in the majors. Of the 118 players on the above list, 29 never played a game in the majors and another 29 played in fewer than 100 major league games. Joe Bauman, the four-time leader, is one of those players who never reached the majors. Only Oyster Burns, Gavvy Cravath, Buck Freeman, Frank Howard and Ryan Howard led a major league in home runs.

Notes

Facts about home run title holders

- Ray Perry led his league in home runs for seven consecutive seasons, a minor league record. Perry led the Far West League every year the league was in existence from 1948 through 1951. In 1952 he won in the Cotton States League then moved back west where he led the California League in 1953 and 1954. During that seven-year stretch, Perry hit a total of 232 homers, including one in the Pacific Coast League where he appeared in a few games for the San Diego Padres early in the 1952 season.
- Buck Freeman led the majors in home runs twice: the National League in 1899 and the American League in 1903. Freeman also won five minor league home run crowns: the New England League in 1894, the Eastern League in 1897 and 1898 and the American Association in 1907 and 1908.
- Nephew of golfing legend Sam Snead, J. C. Snead, led the Western Carolinas League in home runs in 1962. He then went on to join the PGA Tour and later the Seniors Tour, and was a success on both.
- Rip Collins tied with Mel Ott for the National League home run crown in 1934. He also tied for the crown in 1928 in the Three I League. Collins won outright home run titles in the International League (1929) and the Pacific Coast League (1939).
- In 1973, Romel **Canada**, an **American** hailing from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, led the **Mexican** League in home runs...which was over twenty years before the three countries ratified **NAFTA**.
- At least five pitchers have won home run titles. Two deadball-era pitchers led the California State League: Benny Henderson took the league title in 1907 with three home runs and pitcher-outfielder Eddie Householder did it in 1910 with nine. Then in 1921, Jack Bentley led the International League. He compiled a stunning 12–1 record in 119 innings for the Baltimore club. Five years later, in 1926, Dick Wykoff of Salina in the Southwestern League hit a league-leading 26 round trippers which complimented his 25–6 record very nicely. Roy Sanner, playing for Houma in the Evangeline League, arguably had the finest combined batting-pitching year ever by a moundsman. He won the 1948 Evangeline League triple crown with 34 home runs, 126 RBI and a .386 batting average. As a pitcher, he had a gaudy 21–2 record, with 251 strikeouts and a 2.58 ERA. Those are figures of which legends are made.
- Frank Roth, who played for Evansville of the Three I League in 1901, was credited with hitting 36 home runs. The figure was not only good enough to lead the Three I League but also all the minor leagues that season. Years later, however, an exhaustive search of the two Evansville newspapers revealed that Frank Roth had only socked 27 that year. The good news is that he still had the most home runs in the minors that year.

Players Who Led Two Different Leagues in the Same Season

Charles “Count” Campau hit three home runs for Detroit of the International Association in 1890. The league folded in early July and Campau’s three homers turned out to be good enough to tie him for the league lead. Shortly before the league folded, Detroit sold him to St. Louis of the American Association, then a major league. In his second game with the Browns, he hit a homer and he went on to lead the league with nine.

Lew Whistler led the Texas League in home runs in 1888 while playing for San Antonio and Houston. Late in the season, the league reorganized by adding New Orleans and played a short schedule under the name Texas–Southern League. Whistler appeared for both Houston and Galveston in the new league and tied for the league lead with two home runs.

Ed Kallina of Sherman was tied for the league lead with six home runs when the Lone Star League folded on May 16, 1929. He then joined Midland of the West Texas League and led that league with 44 homers.

Fred Sington, playing for Columbus of the Southeastern League, was leading the league in home runs when the league went out of business on May 23, 1932. Sington then hooked on with Beckley of the Middle Atlantic League and won league home run honors with 29.

Sington was an All-American tackle at the University of Alabama and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame. Three fellow members of the College Football Hall of Fame led a league in home runs. Larry Bettencourt led the Texas League in 1930, Ken Strong led the Eastern League in 1930 and Beattie Feathers led the Appalachian League in 1943.

Buck Freeman led a minor league five times as well as leading both the National League and the American League.

Socks Seybold led a minor league four times while three C's—Campau, Colavito, and Collins—each led three times.

Rudy York led a minor league two times but waited sixteen years to capture his second title.

Moses Solomon

Moses Solomon was given the name “The Rabbi of Swat” when being compared to Babe Ruth, “The Sultan of Swat.” Solomon ruled supreme for one brief and brilliant year. He hit 49 round-trippers in 1923 for Hutchinson in the Southwestern League. This was the highest total ever recorded in the minor leagues. He would have hit a nice round number of 50, but one was rained out on August 26.

The 23-year-old slugger was to all appearances the answer to John McGraw’s quest for a “Jewish Babe Ruth.” McGraw was anxious to compete with the Yankees in the heavily Jewish residential areas of the Bronx and upper Manhattan. Moses was a native of New York City, which also whetted McGraw’s enthusiasm. The Giants paid \$4,500 for Solomon.

Solomon was brought up to the Giants at the tail end of the 1923 season. He was joined by two other rookies, the not so well-known Bill Terry and Hack Wilson. Each of the three played in several games. Terry hit .143 and Wilson hit .200, while Solomon hit .375.

But then what happened? The king abdicated. The clouting collapsed. His fielding was atrocious. He couldn’t catch. He was soon exiled to the minors.

He did have a fairly good minor-league career, with a career batting average over .300. He whacked more homers in his one year at Hutchinson than he did for the rest of his combined career. He quit in 1930 at 30 years of age. He then moved into the real-estate game, where he became richer and happier.

Joe Hauser

Joe Hauser is the only minor-league player with two 60–home run seasons. He hit 63 for Baltimore in the International League in 1930 and bettered that mark with 69 while playing for Minneapolis of the American Association in 1933. Joe finished his career with 399 home runs in the minors. It’s too bad that he couldn’t just hit one more—.400 looks so much more impressive than 399.

Joe had a promising major-league career ruined by a broken leg during spring training in 1925. This caused him to miss the entire season. In his first three seasons in the majors, with the Philadelphia A’s, Joe hit .304 with 52 home runs. He came back after his injury and played for three more years in the majors but was never the same hitter.

However, he went on to have a long outstanding minor-league career, mostly in the high minors. He led his league in homers for four consecutive years, from 1930 through 1933. He had a minor-league career batting average of .299. Joe was always falling one short.

Joe is well remembered by SABR members at the 1988 SABR convention in Minneapolis. He was one of our guests. He stayed in the hotel lobby late one night regaling members with stories and answering questions. He was 89 years old at the time and still had a sharp mind.

Joe Bauman

Joe Bauman was one of the greatest minor-league sluggers of all time. He passed away several years ago at age 83. He lived just long enough to see his Organized Baseball season record of 72 home runs broken by Barry Bonds. In a way, it would have been nice if he had gone a little earlier knowing that he still owned the record.

Joe had his 72-homer year in 1954 while playing for Roswell in the Longhorn League. To go along with his home runs, he hit an even .400, scored 188 runs, hit 35 doubles, and had 224 RBI. He was walked 150 times and was plunked with 9 pitched balls with only 99 strikeouts. All of this in only 498 at-bats. (The Longhorn League played a 140-game schedule.) You would have to call that a fairly good season.

Skeptics might say, “Yea, but he was playing in one of those post World War II leagues in the Southwest where they used a juiced-up ball.” The eight-team league hit 930 home runs. Thus, Joe hit 7.7 percent of all the league homers. The skeptics will then say, “Well, he probably played in a bandbox park.” Jim Day, with 14, had the second-highest total on the team. The second-highest total for a lefty teammate (Joe batted left) was 8, by Pat Stasey.

Bauman hit 337 home runs during his minor-league career. However, he missed seven years during what should have been his prime playing time. He retired at age 34 due to a nagging ankle injury.

Joe started his pro career with Newport of the Northeast Arkansas League in 1941, and he moved up to Little Rock of the Southern Association for three games at the end of the season. With the war getting into full swing in 1942, Joe took a defense job with Beechcraft in Wichita, Kansas. Beechcraft sponsored a baseball team in a fast semipro league and Joe, naturally, played on the team. He joined the navy in 1943 and spent the next three years mostly playing for navy baseball teams.

After the war in 1946, Joe signed with Amarillo, of the West Texas–New Mexico League and he hit 48 homers to lead the league. He returned to Amarillo in 1947. He was promoted to Milwaukee of the American Association, a Boston Braves farm club, in 1948. After one game with Milwaukee, the Braves sent him down to Hartford of the Eastern League, where he spent the season. At this point in his career, his record was not overly impressive.

He was very unhappy with the contract offered him for the 1949 season, so he decided to stay home and run a gas station. He also joined a strong semipro team, the Elk City Elks. Most of the players on the team had played minor-league ball at some time. The strong opposition included a number of Negro teams featuring such players as Cool Papa Bell, Buck O’Neill, and Ernie Banks. Over three years with the Elks, Joe hit 78 home runs in 786 at-bats.

After the 1951 season, Bauman was talked into returning to pro ball. The Artesia club of the Longhorn League purchased the rights to Joe from the Braves and signed him for \$500 per month. Joe played for Artesia in 1952 and 1953, leading the league in home runs both years with 50 and 53, respectively.

Bauman then bought out his contract for \$200 and signed with nearby Roswell in the same league for a bonus of \$1,000 plus \$1,000 per month. After his great season in 1954 with Roswell, Joe “slumped” to 46 homers with a .336 average and 132 RBI in 1955. He wound up his career with Roswell in 1956 after 52 games.

He continued to live in Roswell for the rest of his life.
