III MAJOR LEAGUE NEWS NOTES/MATERIALS

- 1. St Louis goes back to grass! Busch Stadium will convert its playing surface to the real thing for the 1996 season. Three pages of misc. articles available. $\overline{\text{TSN}}$ noted that Cardinals played better on grass in 1994 (19- $\overline{14}$ vs. 34-47), but they hit better on turf (.270 vs .246).
- 2. The "Park of Dreams" has been unveiled in New York. This project was conceived by the company that makes erector sets. The park created from thousands of fans' suggestions has 45,000 seats, natural grass, movable dome, traditional and high-tech scoreboards, and irregular distances. It will be on display for three months after 11-17-94. (3 pgs)
- 3. Yankees increased the 4300 best seats from \$17 to \$25! (1 pg)
- 4. Red Sox have expressed interest in a major convention/stadium complex. Boston Herald, 11-11-94 (1 pg)
- 5. Hosuton Astrodome will mark the 30th anniversary with another Houston-NY Yankee game on 3-30-95. The original game had the dome's first ab by Mickey Mantle.
- 6. The Kingdome accident that killed two workers was caused by the basket atop a crane striking the roof.
- 7. The latest Coors Field newsletter has great shots of the park nearing completion. For a copy write Denver Metro Major League Baseball Stadium District, 1660 17th St., Suite 100, Denver, CO 80202.
- 8. Latest Tiger Stadium Fan Club newsletter outlines the newest plan by the team to fund a new park. It also surveys MI law-makers on the stadium financing issues. Write PO Box 441426, Detroit, MI 48244-1426 for a copy.
- 9. The Bostonian Society is planning a marker to note the site of the South End Grounds. If you have an opinion on its exact location on today's landscape (and if you have some good info on the park not readily available elsewhere) write Phil Bergen at 206 Washington St., Boston, MA 02109.
- 10. Bob Boynton reports that Jack Murphy Stadium will add 11,500 seats for football and the 1998 Super Bowl, destroying the baseball aesthetics. SD <u>Union-Tribune</u> piece of 1 pg available.
- 11. The Packers leave County Stadium in Milwaukee and will not play football in that city for the first time in 60 years. There is some confusion as to the effect on a new baseball park: will it be cheaper or not?

- 12. New Park Fever continues within established projects and future possibilities:

Marge Schott of the Reds now prefers No. KY as the site for a new park and entertainment area while the city of Cincinnati wants to keep the team downtown. (3 pgs)

The Giants have extended their lease at Candlestick for five years, but still yearn for a downtown facility, also part of an entertainment facility. (1 pg)

The sale of the Pirates and future stability will increase efforts for a new ballpark in the downtown as part of a city revitalization program. (1 pg)

The predicted departure of the Rams from Anaheim Stadium will not help matters there for the team wants to develop a baseball-only facility. Talks are ongoing with the city.(1 pg)

Much discussion in Seattle over a renovated Kingdome for the Seahawks vs. the needs of the Mariners for a baseballfriendly facility. The baseball lease is through 1996. (6 pgs)

The new park/stadium in Atlanta "is starting to pick up pace," says Brian Powers. "The column grid is clearly visible ... (and) some of the lower level seating terraces are scheduled to be in place (by end of October). Thanks too go to member Michael Hinkelman who is keeping tabs on the Atlanta project.

13. With football leaving several baseball facilities, there will not be many joint facilities left by the end of the decade. In some cases, baseball may be leaving (see the San Diego situation). As of this day, I count ten sharing situations with Denver baseball moving out and Green Bay foot ball gone. By the end of the decade there could be just a few with new ballparks in Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Miami, Seattle, Phila., and San Francisco.

In fact, we don't want literal illustration in our films because that sets up a merely one-to-one relationship of the word and picture. We hope that 'one and one' eventually equals 'three' in our films--a new relationship between word and picture--and not two."

The boxes at Brotherhood Park therefore will be used very rarely, until they can be placed in full view of the grandstand."
