# Henry Mullin Found

- 13. James E. Powell I'm 90% sure he died in Montana and I am hoping to nail him soon.
- 14. John Russ Bob Bailey recently identified

his first name. We just need his death.

- 15. Hugh Daily One of the most baffling cases of all time. I found a letter in a 1939 TSN from someone who was wondering what happened to him. (No, it wasn't written by Joe Simenic.) The one-armed pitcher was our January 1990 Mystery of the Month.
- 16. Luis Castro Was last known to be living in Georgia in 1915. Was born in Colombia but I suspect he died in the US.

## Let's Get Gettinger

Our Mystery of the Month for May is Thomas Gettinger, a player I have been working on for several years. Gettinger was born in 1869 in Frederick, Maryland under the name Gittinger. His parents were Lewis and Eveline Gittinger. He had a brother, Frank, and three sisters, Mary, Margaret, and Josephine. As far as I can determine, none of his family died in Frederick.

On September 18, 1894, Gettinger married Katie Dwyer at St. John's Episcopal Church in Mobile, Alabama. Gettinger lived in Mobile for the most part until 1918, although he did move back to Frederick for a couple of years around 1908. In July of 1895, Gettinger's son, Louis, was born in Mobile. As far as I know, this was Tom and Katie's only child.

Katie came from a rather large family. She was the daughter of Edward and Mary Dwyer. She had two brothers, John and James, and three sisters, Elizabeth, Sallie, and Mary. James and John apparently died young and are buried in

Mobile. I have been unable to locate the rest of her family.

In 1918, Tom and Katie moved to Pensacola, Florida where Tom got a job as a sanitary officer with the police department. At the present time, that is where Gettinger stands. If anyone has any contacts in Pensacola, I would appreciate you letting me know.

## **Homer Vernon Smoot**

Homer Smoot's professional baseball career lasted through the first dozen years of the twentieth century with five full years spent as a starting center fielder with the St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati Reds.

Born in the hamlet of Galestown on Maryland's Eastern Shore in 1878, Smoot played for Washington College in Chesterson in 1897. He first broke into the national sports weeklies' box scores with the Allentown club of the Atlantic League in 1900, poling a triple and two singles on Opening Day. The league collapsed in June, but Smoot soon signed with Worcester of the Eastern League. He was unable to break into that club's starting lineup and was loaned to Providence. After only ten days with the Grays, he was recalled due to an injury to Worcester outfielder Jack Sharrott. Although he saw only limited duty in 1900, in 1901 he blossomed into a star by leading the EL in batting with a .356 average.

With the major leagues at war, Smoot was able to jump his Worcester contract and sign with the Cardinals after the end of the season. A sour-grapes sports writer from Worcester warned St. Louis that "Homer can neither run bases nor throw" but did admit that he was "a gentleman and thoroughly good fellow."

Installed in center field and the top half of the batting order, Smoot quickly disproved these accusations and became a key player on the Cardinal team, able to flag down a fly ball or race around the bases after a good hit. He led all NL outfielders in putouts in his rookie year, and he tied or led the Cardinals in home runs in three seasons. But he could not be called a power hitter, since none of his fifteen career HRs in the NL is known to have gone over the fence on the fly. He finished his big league career with a .290 batting average in 680 games played. A mild-mannered man, Smoot rarely argued with the umpires and was popular with fans and teammates alike. When he won a dramatic 8-7 game on July 22, 1903, with a two-out, two-strike, three-run home run in the bottom of the ninth, the joyous crowd swept onto the field and whisked the self-conscious Smoot up onto its shoulders for a hero's ride to the clubhouse. During the same homestand, Smoot twice scored the winning run in extra innings and saved another game with a spectacular, leaping backhanded catch after a long run to deep center field.

Smoot was traded to Cincinnati for utility man Shad Barry on July 20, 1906. When the Reds overhauled their roster after the season, Homer was sold to Tolcdo. He spent the next four and one-half years in the American Association with Tolcdo (1907-09), Louisville (early 1910), and Kansas City (June 1910 - June 1911). Then he was sold to Wilkes-Barre (New York St. Lg.) in July 1911. In June 1912 the 34-year-old outfielder, who suffered from inflammatory rheumatism, was suspended "at his own request" because he was not in condition to play. His replacement in the Wilkes-Barre outfield was Joe Delehanty, who ironically had been a teammate of his way back in Allentown in 1900.

Smoot coached Washington College in 1913 and managed Salisbury in the Eastern Shore League (near his birthplace) in 1924. His son played in the Cardinal chain briefly in 1927. Homer died of spinal meningitis in 1928, two days after his 50th birthday.
