A heartbreaking farewell to Dave Wills

Opening Day 2023 arrived with a subdued mood in the Tampa Bay area. The sudden passing on March 5 of Rays radio broadcaster Dave Wills brought a jolt of sadness that will not dissipate for some time.

Wills had spoken to the the Roush-López Gulf Coast Chapter for its January meeting. He held court on all things Rays with his trademark booming voice and ever-present joy on full display.

Chapter member Steve Nadel had helped to arrange

the appearance through friend Mike Caragliano, a radio engineer and a colleague of Wills.

“Of all the announcers he has met, he said he found Dave Wills and Andy Freed to be the friendliest and easiest to

work with,” Nadel said.

That was evident from the start as Wills spoke via Zoom.

In describing the approach he and Freed brought to their jobs, it was clear why the duo had such a bond with listeners.

“One of the lines that (Andy) said a long time ago was, ‘We just try to be good company,’” Wills told our group. “The other thing we talk about: We might not lead the league in wins but we’re gonna lead the league in fun.

“I hope it plays out that way. I live in life’s candy store. I get paid to watch and talk about baseball.”

Wills’ perspective was as spot-on as his on-air analysis. Our group joins so many others in recognizing Dave Wills’ voice was silenced far too soon.

It’s time to retire No. 21 for Clemente

On September 15th, Major League baseball celebrated Roberto Clemente Day. Like Jackie Robinson Day, April 15th, players took to the field wearing Clemente’s number 21. This is an annual event that started in the 2020 season to focus on the emergence of Latin-born players in the 1960s. It is viewed as a continuation of Robinson’s efforts to integrate baseball.

Eight years after Robinson broke the color barrier, Clemente used the foundation of Robinson’s civil activism to improve the quality of life of players’ color. It was not easy for Clemente. Clemente endured the same segregation and Jim Crow laws that Robinson experienced. Segregation was a foreign concept to the Puerto Rico native where the society had been unified. During this time, baseball was moving in forward motion in social

advancements; however, southern states legislature movements had stalled and were outdated. Efforts were made to soften Clemente’s Latin brand. Media referred

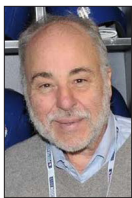

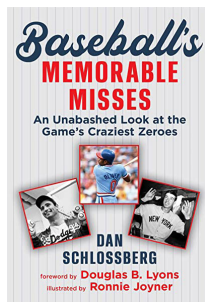

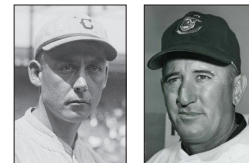

to him as Bob or Bobby instead of Roberto, which he detested. Clemente was born in Puerto Rico but made it his life's mission to represent all Latin nations and their people.

Clemente was an undeniable force with a bat and a glove. During his 18-year career with the Pirates, Clemente was a two-time World Series champion, 12-time Gold Glove Award winner in right field and 15-time All-Star. In addition, 1966 National League MVP, first Latin American player to reach the hallowed 3,000-hit mark which resulted in being first player from Latin America inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1973. We celebrate him, today, for his off-field humanitarian contributions and his efforts to end segregation within baseball. Selfless to the end, Clemente died in a plane crash attempting to bring aid to earthquake victims in Nicaragua.

With all of Clemente's accomplishments on and off the field and now with an annual celebration of life, is it time to retire his number league-wide? These triumphs do mirror Robinson's achievements. Additionally, both have annual awards named after each other which are presented by MLB at the end of each season. The Jackie Robinson Award is given to the best rookie in each league. The Roberto Clemente Award is bestowed to a player who best represents the game of baseball through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy, and positive contributions, both on and off the field. Both players had immense effects on civil and social movements

and hall-of-fame worthy careers. But what does Robinson have over Clemente? Why doesn't MLB retire number 21 league-wide, like they did to Robinson's 42? Clemente has two champions over Robinson's one. Robinson didn't reach 3,000 hits. The closest statistic for these Hall of Famers is the career batting average being off by four points, Robinson batted .313 and Clements had .317 average. Furthermore, Clemente had 99 more home runs. Another comparison is at the MLB Network. Content is produced in studios labeled Studio 42 and Studio 21.

Retiring of a number is a great honor. Retiring it league-wide involves a monumental impact on the game and society. There isn't a criterion for retiring a number. Each franchise commemorates players for various accomplishments. In fact, there are 189 players with retired numbers in the MLB. Granted, some numbers are retired more than once for different franchises (i.e., Greg Maddux with the Cubs and Braves). Compare the 189 retired numbers to the 263 players in the Baseball Hall of Fame. Fewer players have had a number retired than have been inducted into the Hall of Fame.

So, will fans see Clemente's 21 retired league-wide? Is the number 21 the new 42? Does it stop there? Many years ago, there was talk about retiring Babe Ruth's number 3 league wide. Ruth did challenge social norms of the time and posted monster numbers. Will there ever be an equal to Jack Roosevelt Robinson and his physical and mental capabilities?

This chapter is named for Edd Roush (HOF class of 1962), a longtime resident of Florida's west coast and the grandfather of founding member Susan Denlinger; and Al López (HOF class of 1977), the godfather of the game in Tampa and its surrounding areas. It was established in 2020.

Who was the only player to win Batting Titles in 3 different decades?



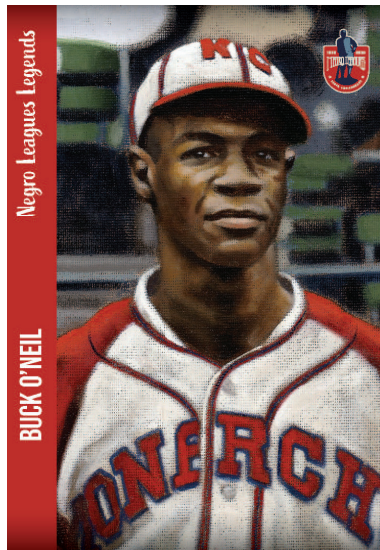
IN THE CARDS by Bobby Salerno

WHILE always being a lifelong baseball fan since I was 8 years old, my knowledge about negroes in baseball was fairly limited back to the time of Jackie Robinson's breakthrough to the majors in 1947.

It wasn't until I viewed the fabulous HBO movie *Soul of the Game* (1996), which chronicled some of the plights of Negro Leagues players, that quenched my thirst all the more, and I've been a fan of Negro Leagues history ever since.

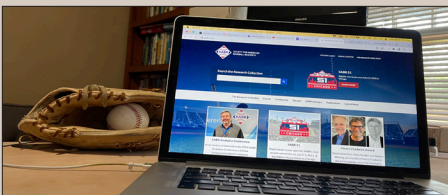
