PRESERVATION NEWS

Baltimore: Thanks to committee member Gordon Thomas, they knew to look for the 1954 time capsule when tearing down Memorial Stadium. Court battles kept the facility alive for a short stretch as competing proposals were issued to save some or all of the stadium, but the final plan to knock down all of the stadium and save just the memorial facade won the day. Gordon sent us a full folder of material, so ask for the small (10 pgs) medium (25 pgs) or large (50 pgs) package. Most of the thirty-one acres will become a senior housing development.

Washington, D.C. Former SABR executive director, George Case, worked with a number of SABR people to arrange a symposium and marker ceremony to remember Griffith Stadium on September 25, 2001. We have a

great file of materials and local stories on the events from Gordon Thomas. The stated plan was for a marker by the front door of the current Howard University Hospital on the ballpark site, plus four markers close to the original sites of the plate and three bases. And an exhibit on the park was set for the lobby. A belated thanks to anyone from our committee and SABR who had a hand in this worthy effort. We first suggested this project in the mid-1980s! (up to 20 pgs)

Houston With both its baseball and football teams at other sites, the Astrodome lacks a steady tennant, but it can say that it is one of the top 100 engineering projects of the 150 year history of the American Society of Professional Engineers. The engineers cited many bridges, buildings, dams, and other structures that changed both the engineering profession and the American landscape. November/December 2002 Civil Engineer (1 pg)

Pulaski, TN Steve Carroll reports that this city's Calfee Park was voted a state historical landmark.

Muskegon, ML Marc Okkonen reported in 2001 that the city's Marsh Field, built in 1916, was being considered for a marker. The oldest minor league park in the state, it hosted high school, amateur, and professional minor league baseball, and the All American Girls Professional League and several major league teams played games there. Details available (2 pgs).

Pittsburgh. Story in October/2002 Smithsonian shows the famed photo of the college students on the Cathedral of Learning roof reacting to the 1960 World Series, and it shows the same site today, plus a profile of the man (George Silk) who took that shot

(2 pgs). Today, the park site is covered by a University of Pittsburgh building.

Boston The Boston Braves Historical Society commemorated the naming of Braves Field Way on October 6, 2002, with a ribbon cutting ceremony at the site.

Brooklyn The Brooklyn Dodgers newsletter says that the Canarsie Casket Company, owner of the old Ebbets Field Flag Pole, was considering selling it to Brooklyn Cyclones at Coney Island, the new team and park for Brooklyn.

Newark The city's new ballpark was renamed Bears & Eagles Stadium to honor the two teams whose glory years of the 1940s made that city a baseball hotbed. Yogi Berra, formerly of the Newark Bears of the International League was on hand for the May 8, 2001 ceremony and he was joined by Larry Doby of the old Newark Eagles of the Negro Leagues.

Montreal Steve Carroll reports that old Jarry Park remains in that city, in use as a tennis stadium, and completely enclosed. The public swimming pool that used to be visible beyond right field is still in use.

Toldeo Preservation, the magazine of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, cites the new Toledo park, Fifth Third Field, as the latest example of ballparks being used on the minor league level to revitalize older, mid-size and small cities. (2 pgs) May/June 2002

Miami. In the spring of 2001 they began to tear down Miami Stadium, the late 1940s park that hosted so many black and Cuban players in the 1940s and 1950s. The park was renamed for Bobby Maduro in 1987.

Chicago The City of Chicago, through its Landsmark Division, is seeking expertise, advice, and possible witnesses to build a case to make Wrigley Field a Chicago landmark. Mr. Terry Tatum of the Landmarks

Commission at (312) 744-9147 e-mail of ttatum@cityofchicago.org is the contact person for this project. A public hearing may be held in mid-March. Owners of parks have traditionally fought such designations, fearing restrictive rules on future expansion, renovation, or even abandonment. However, certain financial benefits can come from this designation with tax credits for improvements, etc. Mr. Tatum has asked for a letter of support from our Committee. Unless any of the membership objects—and pending no objections from the SABR office, I will be happy to do so. If you have something to contribute, contact Mr. Tatum.

Boston Local non-profit group seeks to pick up dropped 1998 project to build a mini Fenway Park in Quincy, MA. Started by former Red Sox infielder Tim Naehring, the project was dropped after he left the Sox with an elbow injury. A local group seeks to build the 3000-seat, half-scale Fenway, with all distinctive touches such as a Green Monster. Patriot-Ledger, (2 pgs) 4-16-02

Daytona Beach Friends of Daytona Baseball, LLC, is rehabilating the historic baseball park in Daytona Beach where Jackie Roibinson broke professional baseball's color barrier in 1946 with the Montreal Royals. The \$20 million renovation will make the ballpark, a potential revival point for the entire community of Daytona Beach. The 1915 ballpark will remain in use during the renovation. (2 pgs)

<u>Cleveland</u> An often discussed plan to restore the crumbling ruins of League Park and make it a a community center/first class baseball field has arisen again, and workers tearing through the old grandstand discovered a forgotten underground tunnel that connected the field to the dugout. The old ticket office now serves as a community center, but part of the restoration plan is to bring the first floor to its original appearance. Several articles from the local papers (7 pgs)

Brooklyn Thanks to local SABR and Committee members, the old wall at Washington Park, now a part of the Con Ed yard in Brooklyn, is saved--again, from being torn down. Several meetings among the company officials and SABR members brought out several issues and ways to preserve the wall, one of the oldest extant pieces of a professional ballpark. Boston. The Sox have been sold since our last newsletter, and the plans for a new park have lost most of their steam since then too. An aggressive restoration/renovation/expansion program has become more attractrive. Thanks and praise go to the Save Fenway Park group that has been waging a steady, informed, and intelligent battle to preserve the park and all that it represents for baseball in Boston and the country.
